Report from Palm Beach Lakes for **September 27, 2019**

Update on the Churches in Abaco and Grand Bahama

Every week seems somewhat the same, but every week is so different in its own way. We are amazed at the response from our own members—so many are actively in-

volved—and from the response from churches and friends and coworkers throughout America. Even more uplifting is to see how God, having heard the prayers from the Bahamians, is opening doors we never dreamed would happen.

Each week the Bahamian Christians send us the list of their most pressing needs. These reports arrive by Wednesday and by Thursday of the next week the items they re-

quested arrive in Freeport. That's an eight-day turn-around and it is working in such a remarkable way! This week, it addition to being involved in the work in Freeport, we also sent a container to the brethren in Nassau. The church in Nassau is doing two things with the supplies we send: (1) they are using them to help the church in South Abaco (as they have more

direct access to them), and (2) they are using them to help the brethren who had to relocate to Nassau from Marsh Harbour, after Dorian decimated that city.

It now appears that very soon we will hopefully be involved in the work in Marsh Harbour. The port there is not yet open because of the massive winds near the eye of the hurricane that were in Marsh Harbour for over thirty hours. The homes of almost every member of the church were heavily damaged and many have fled to other places in the Bahamas, especially Nassau.

The doors may be slowly

opening in Marsh Harbour. It looks like that this next week one of the leading men in the church in Marsh Harbour will return to his damaged house to assess the situation with the church building, the members' homes and to begin to head up the relief work. Once he is there, we will know more.



Update on the Relief Efforts

In addition, we are working with the church in Moore, Oklahoma, who oversees the Bahamian preacher in Eight Mile Rock, in bringing help to those in that area. The church in Eight Mile Rock is about fifteen miles from the port at Freeport. Hopefully this next week we will be sending one container, possibly two, to aid in their work.



The workload is increasing. Our first container was sent less than two weeks after the hurricane and contained generators, chainsaws and food. This was followed with clothes, household supplies, cleaning supplies, and building supplies. Our involvement has increased so that this week we sent a total of three containers. Their needs change so rapidly and

it is wonderful to see so many members at Palm Beach Lakes working so diligently to handle these situations. It would not be possible without God's help and your support of these efforts.

Our Bahamian brethren are getting highly organized in handing out what we send to them. They are using the church bus, trucks and their own cars to deliver what we send. Their lives are slowly improving and one great blessing is that this week the church building in Freeport had power restored to it. Fortunately, parts of Freeport were not flooded and the church building in Freeport had no flooding. This will be a great blessing to them, giving them a secure base to store and distribute what you are sending. There will be some opportunities for us to help in a more personal way in Freeport soon, but more about that next week.

Insight Into the Work in Marsh Harbour

Some of the finest Christians anywhere on this earth were part of the church in Marsh Harbour. Many of them will be returning to that city as conditions improve. Imagine how they feel, having left their homes and every earthly possession as the fled. We have great hope for the future of that church.
