Your Family Resemblance

One of the fun things about Facebook is seeing pictures of kids, especially pictures of kids whose parents you knew when they were children. It's enjoyable to see eyes and smiles on the faces of children that look exactly like eyes and smiles from twenty or thirty years ago.

What makes children resemble their parents so

much? That is not a hard question to answer. Let's summarize it in this way: "When children look like their parents on the inside, they'll look like their par- ward characteris- Paul said, "I have been crucified with Christ; it is no ents on the outside."

The genetic makeup of children comes directly from their parents. The DNA code for the hair color, the eye color, the facial features, etc. all come from the father and the mother. A child's DNA on the inside is what determines how they look on the outside. That is why they look like their parents.

Of course, that works in another way, as well. The behavior of a child (on the outside) is a direct resemblance of how that child looks on the inside. If a child is insecure on the inside, it will show on the outside. If a child "full of himself" on the inside, it will show on the outside. As parents, we have a direct responsibility for and influence on the molding of hearts (the inside) and behaviors (the outside).

Let's make a broader and more significant application of this principle. If a human's outward characteristics are a reflection of inward genetic qualities, where do a Christian's outward characteristics originate? If you see a Christian who is humble, servant-hearted and eager to do good unto others, is that not a reflection of an inward "genetic code"? If you see a Christian who is sacrificial, selfless and profusely generous with time, abilities and finances, is that not an outward manifesta-

tion of an inward condition?

Consider the Scriptural perspective on this. longer I who live, but Christ lives in me; and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God" (Gal. 2:20). The fact that Christ is "in me" directly affects how I live "on the outside." Again in Second Corinthians 3:18 - "But we all, with unveiled

face, beholding as in a mirror the glory of the Lord, are being transformed into the same image from glory to glory, just as by the Spirit of the Lord." When a Christian makes it his habit to continually behold the glory of the Lord (by continually putting the Spirit/Word of the Lord inside him), he will be transformed into the image of the Lord "on the outside."

When the world looks at you, do they see the "family resemblance"? Do they see your Father in you? Do they see your Older Brother in you? Who do you look like?

Storm chaser or treasure hunter? One or the other!

Picture what the sky looks like right before a bad storm. Jesus talked of men being able to discern the weather by looking to the sky: "It will be foul weather today: for the sky is red and lowering" (Matt. 16:3). The word "lowering" is from a Greek word that means "a dark or gloomy appearance." You know what that looks like, right?

That same Greek word is found only one other time in the New Testament. In Mark 10, Jesus told the rich young ruler what he needed to do to inherit eternal life (i.e., sell his possessions and give to the poor), and the man "was **sad at this word**" (Mark 10:22). The word "sad" is that same word that describes "a gloomy man who broods over unwelcome thoughts" (H.B. Swete). The words of Jesus were unwelcome to this young man and made him dark and gloomy.

In contrast is the psalmist who said, "I **rejoice at Your word** as one who finds great treasure" (119:162). When you read and contemplate the Lord's instructions to you, are you gloomy at the word (like a storm cloud) or do you rejoice at the word (like finding a treasure)? -DS

"If she doesn't come to me first, I won't forgive her!"

Forgiveness. It is such a hard thing to do! It is such an emotionally-charged topic that it is hard to discuss and consider with any level of impartiality! We are quick to expect others to forgive, but we are slow in offering forgiveness ourselves! Jesus taught significant and numerous lessons about forgiveness, but consider just this one verse for a moment in Mark 11:25.

"And whenever you stand praying..." Got the picture? You're talking to God. What is one thing you ask of God almost every time you talk to Him? If you're like me, it's for forgiveness. (In fact, at the end of the verse, Jesus implies that seeking forgiveness is part of the prayer.) Right after that opening phrase ("And whenever you stand praying..."), the ASV, NASB and ESV all have one word – **"forgive."** Forgive who? Forgive what? Jesus tells us. **"If you have ANYthing against ANYone."** Is there ANYone whom I have a right to not forgive? Is there ANYthing which I have a right to not forgiven? NO! And, NO!

Brother and sister in Christ, Jesus said, if you have ANYthing against ANYone, forgive! - DS

Equipping & Edifying Families

8 Secrets of Conflict Resolution



In his book, *Learning to Live with the Love of Your Life… And Loving It!*, Dr. Neil Clark Warren provides eight secrets to working through conflict with your spouse.

1. Marriage is a "We" Business

Dr. Warren says, "Any couple who gains a 'we' perspective eventually experiences great success in marriage." Shift the focus of your marriage to a "we" mentality, especially in conflict.

2. Deal with the Issue as Quickly as Possible

Deal with conflict by getting problems out in the open and addressing them head-on. Don't let issues fester below the surface.

3. Stick to the Subject

If you are in the middle of an argument with your spouse, stay focused on resolving that current conflict. Don't throw old fights or problems into the discussion.

4. Don't Intimidate

Some people become more concerned with "winning" a fight than working through the conflict. They may become mean, intimidating or threatening in order to stay in the fight. In Dr. Warren's words, "Intimidation may result in victory for an individual, but I've never seen it produce victory for the marriage."

5. No Name-Calling

Establish a rule with your spouse that there will be no name-calling during a fight. Name-calling will only lead to more hurt and emotional distance between the two of you.

6. Turn Up Your Listening Sensitivity

While it may be hard to actively listen to your spouse when your emotions are running high from an argument, you must take the time to try and see their point of view. This is key to the road to resolution. When your spouse feels listened to, they will be more willing to listen to what you have to say, as well.

7. Practice Give and Take

"What we must understand is that marriage is a partnership and therefore requires both give and take to be successful," says Dr. Warren. Be willing to compromise on certain issues that are more important to your spouse. Choose your battles wisely.

8. Celebrate Every Victory

Recognize the victories when you and your spouse successfully work through a conflict together. Focus on the progress you have made as a couple and the new strengths that you have together as a result.
