Is There Eternal Suffering in Hell?

How could a loving God ever consider casting man into a lake of fire and leaving him there to suffer for all eternity? This is not an easy question to consider on many levels, but it is one which intrigues the minds of so many. Is it possible that we may not see the horrendous nature of sin and what divine

justice demands for punishment? Is it possible that we may have developed a wrong view of God by overemphasizing His goodness, and that wrong view of Him is part of the problem? Whether we can answer these two questions or others which might come to mind really is not the issue. The underlying issue is, "What does God reveal that He will do with the wicked?"

Every sin will be punished. The writer of Hebrews looked at the Old Testament and said, "The

word spoken through angels proved steadfast, and every transgression and disobedience received a just reward" (Heb. 2:2). The Holy Spirit of God affirmed that *every* sin committed for the thousands of years since Adam had been justly rewarded. Our God delights in forgiveness and rejoices in showing mercy (Micah 7:18), but He is also just. The issue before us is, "What does He reveal that He will do with the wicked?"

The sin of angels is punished by God with continuing suffering. Both Jude and Peter (Jude 6; 2 Pet. 2:4) describe the

rebellion of angels. What did a loving God do with them? He did not simply destroy them, but He bound them with chains in the darkness of hell awaiting a coming judgment where they will be cast into an everlasting fire (Matt. 25:41).

The rich man who refused to share with the beggar, Lazarus, suffered in the fires of Hades. What did a loving God do with this selfish, rich man? Taken from his body, he was in

torments, begging for one drop of water to cool his tongue. His words, "I am tormented in this flame" (Luke 16:24), show what love and justice demanded from both Lazarus and the rich man.

Those who worshipped the beast suffered consciously in the fire of God's judgment. "If any man worship the beast . . . he himself shall drink of the wrath of God. . . . He shall be tormented with fire

and brimstone . . . And the smoke of their torment ascends forever and ever; and they have no rest day or night" (Rev. 14:9-11). How will a loving God deal with the man who rebels against Him? Certainly not simply casting him into the lake of fire where he will immediately burn up and cease to exist. It is the loving God who speaks of fire and brimstone lasting forever and ever and never having any rest from that punishment.

Remember the issue is, "What does God say about hell?" The options are clear—eternal bliss with God or eternal darkness with weeping and gnashing of teeth. Your choice!

But, if there is just one person who looks at you and follows your example, that makes you a "leader." Where there is a "follower," there is a "leader."

Now, what kind of leader are you? What kind of example do you set for others to follow? For the non-Christians being led by your example, where are you leading them? What about Christians? What about teens and children being led by your example? Where are you leading them? It is sobering to think that we lead by example—whether we realize it or not! -DS

Status symbol

It is hard not to be influenced by status symbols. Status symbols are typically some visible denotation of one's social or economic prestige. It might be a certain label or logo on clothing, a designer purse, a fancy car, a particular university's diploma, the latest phone, exotic vacations, etc., etc. The perception is that those possessing certain symbols have reached a status above "others" and it would be appropriate for those "others" to recognize it.

While Christians ought to be immune to such material pursuits, they rarely are. We want to be noticed. We want to be accepted. We don't want others to look down on us.

May we firmly fix in our minds the only "status" that matters is our status with God. How does God see us? What have we attained in His sight? While some outward manifestations of our "status" with God exist, may we be reminded that God's view of our status starts with the condition of our heart (1 Sam. 16:7) and our relationship to His Son's blood (Eph. 2:13). -DS

10 Variables a Successful Marriage Formula Has to Have



What are the variables that are found in successful marriages? What type of marriages last not only five years, but until "death do us part?" Let's examine some necessary ingredients.

1. Sense of Humor and a Short Memory. Anyone that has been married for a lengthy period of time can tell you that a sense of humor is certainly required to get through the trials and tribulations of marriage. You had better be able to laugh together, and especially at yourself. When it comes to trouble, keep a short memory; lose the grudges and smile.

2. Conflict and Tension. Say what? That's right, most healthy marriages require periods of conflict and tension in order to balance the relationship. Like steam escaping from a pot so the pot does not explode. Conflict and tension also serve a role in the sexual relationship ("make-up sex") of a marriage as well. Love only grows stronger when it has endured a storm.

3. Open Communication. One of the deadliest poisons to a marriage is when the couple has stopped talking. When a couple has a lack of communication, it leads to suspicion and suspicion leads to stress and worse. Married partners should be able to share everything with each other, and through that help each other navigate life successfully.

4. Teammates and Partners. Going hand and hand with communication is the spirit of teamwork and partnership. A couple should balance the best traits of each person to form the best possible team to take on the challenges of marriage, parenthood and life in general. Great teams play to each member's strengths. The same applies in marriage.

5. Rock Solid Trust. Trust is hard to earn and easy to lose. It must be held as sacred. None among us are perfect and we will make our mistakes, but in a successful marriage, trust must not be broken. It is an enormous leap of faith to align personal destiny equally with another, and without trust in that person you will never make it. You have their back and they have yours; never allow anything to come between. And neither spouse ever lies to each other, no matter how uncomfortable the conversation. Lies are the WMDs to trust.

6. Positive Compatibility. Simply put, sex can't sustain a relationship long-term. In order to establish an environment where a marriage can reach full potential, it is essential we choose partners with whom we share many compatible traits and values. We have to actually like being with that person. We're good friends with them. We need to share the same hopes and dreams. Compatibility goes far beyond the bedroom.

7. Passion and Commitment. Passion is a burning desire to be successful at a stated goal. The commitment to do whatever it takes to reach the finish line. It takes great sacrifice by both partners to reach the level of commitment necessary to make a marriage last. We are tested and tempted constantly by other options, and that will not change. Deep passion and unwavering commitment for, and to, the marriage is how you reach a golden anniversary.

8. Emotional Security. This is usually an overlooked aspect of human need. The requirement we have to keep a place where we feel safe and secure from the outside world. A marriage that is working well is just that. The "us against the world" mentality where we feel needed and wanted. When you listen to sports players talk after they win champion-ships, someone will always say, "We closed ranks and it was us against the world." A successful marriage works the same way.

9. Unbreakable Respect. When two people are in love, they have a mutual respect and desire for each other that overrides any shortcomings and traits in the other person. There is an unbreakable respect and passion for that person. This should last not only when things are going great, but when the hard times come as well. When tragedy strikes or when people change. When respect leaves a marriage, the people involved will usually follow not far behind.

10. God-centered. God must be in the center of each marriage for it to blossom and reach its full potential. Remember, you are a conduit of God's love for your spouse. When a husband and wife are tapped into the bottomless ocean of the Lord's grace, love and mercy, they are eager to have that overflow onto each other. Pray for strength, guidance, and wisdom to love each other well.
