America seems to be obsessed with physical fitness. There is obvious profit in getting our bodies fit, but when compared to getting our souls fit, there is little profit. Paul said, "Bodily exercise profits a little, but godliness is profitable for all things" (1 Tim. 4:8). By Dan Jenkins However, the Bible does show that some-

times running is truly profitable. Look at the following.

"But he left his garment in her hand and fled and ran outside" (Gen. 39:12). Bible students will recognize these words describing how young show that some-Joseph dealt with the temptation of sexual sin. He knew what sin was and literally ran from the arms of the woman trying to seduce him. So many lives would be so different if men ran away from sin. Running can be profitable sometimes.

"They ran to the tent; and there it was, hidden in his tent, with the silver under it" (Josh. 7:22). The Israelites had just come from destroying Jericho. When Achan took God's treasures and hid them in his tent, disaster struck. When it became obvious what Achan had done, righteous men ran to deal with sin. We need to learn the immediate danger of sin and deal with it as soon as possible. We need to learn to run and deal with ungodliness in the midst of His people.

"Write the vision and make it plain on tablets, that

he may run who reads it" (Hab. 2:2). Habakkuk, the messenger of God, was sent to deliver heaven's message to the Jews. God told him to write the message so plainly that when men heard the message they would immediately flee from the coming judgment. Two points become obvious. First is the importance of Christians clearly presenting God's message. Political correctness never works when it comes to heavenly truths. The second point can never be forgotten. When we learn of

> the coming judgment of God against sin, we must turn away and run from it. Running can be profitable.

> "So Philip ran to him, and heard him reading the prophet Isaiah . . ." (Acts 8:30). The man from Ethiopia was seeking for God, and Philip ran to teach him. Think about this for a moment. What is the only response we should have in trying to take the gospel to the lost? Running can be profitable.

"Let us run with endurance the race that is set before us" (Heb. 12:1). The Jewish Christians addressed in this book had begun their walk with the Lord so well, but after time passed, their devotion cooled. The Spirit's message to them was to remind them of the only race which truly matters. Hence the words "run with endurance." We must never give up in this race. Running can be profitable.

May we run the race that ends with a crown of life!

There is an interesting statement made about Abel and Cain in Genesis 4. These two sons of Adam and The only way to Eve brought an offering to the Lord, and the Lord's dissimilar response to these two offerings is recorded in verses 4 and 5: "The Lord respected Abel and his offering, but He did not respect Cain and his offering." The Lord respected one man and his wor- respect of God as 10:17, "So then faith comes by hearing, and hearing ship; and the Lord did not respect the other man and we offer our lives his worship. What was the difference?

If there is any respect available on this earth for which I ought to strive daily, it is the unequaled respect that I can have from heaven. Can you believe it? We can have the respect of God? How can we be extended the regard and respect of God? The fact that I need it is unquestioned; the fact that I can receive it is extraordinary; the fact that I must have it requires my utmost attention.

The Lord Himself explains to us the difference between Abel's offering and Cain's offering. We are not left to surmise or wonder about it. In Hebrews 11:4, we have the divine commentary on Genesis 4. "By faith Abel offered to God a more excellent sacrifice than Cain, through which he obtained witness that he was righteous, God testifying of his gifts..." The difference between Abel's accepted (respected) offering and Cain's unaccepted (un-respected) offering was "faith." Abel made his offering "by faith," and evidently, Cain did not. But, what does that mean?

> How was Abel's offering "by faith"? Does that mean it was just his best guess, or he believed in his offering more than Cain believed in his? No. To understand an action done "by faith," we need to know the origin of faith. Paul stated in Romans by the word of God." Abel's offering, to which God had respect, was done by faith, which came when he

heard the instructions of God in His Word.

Put this together and we see how we can also be the recipients of heaven's respect. First, we must hear the Word of God (Rom. 10:17). Next, we must have a receptive heart that believes the Word (Rom. 10:9-14). Then, that faith must act (Jas. 2:14-26). It must obey (Rom. 1:5; 16:26). It must do what the Word says (Jas. 1:22-25). This is the only way to receive the respect of God, and it is the only way to continue to receive the respect of God as we offer our lives to Him daily!

Milestones of Faith

I look forward to seeing them when I drive. They are on the highways or the Florida Turnpike, in every State of the Union and in most countries. They are little reminders along the path that I am closer to my destination. Every mile or every exit off the highway, I am that much closer to home—mile

markers.

In ancient times, they were called "milestones." The Romans built the most elaborate road system of the ancient civilizations. Some sections are still in use today. Take that, FDOT. Along those roads are milestones carved in Latin with the name of the current Caesar and distance to the next town or village. Why are they so important?

Milestones mark the next point on a path

or a significant point reached on a journey. When the Hebrews crossed the Jordan River into the Promised Land, a memorial was erected with twelve stones. Joshua chapter four records the event. "Let this be a sign among you, so that when your children ask later, saying, 'What do these stones mean to you?' then you shall say to them, 'Because the waters of the Jordan were cut off before the ark of the covenant of the LORD; when it crossed the Jordan, the waters of the Jordan were cut off.' So these stones shall become a memorial to the sons of Israel

forever" (Josh. 4:6-7). These stones marked an important event in the path to the Promised Land and in the lives of those that were present that day. They were so important that they were instructed to teach their children of the event. Those twelve stones were a testament that God gave them access into the Promised Land—something that Joseph saw from a distance (Heb. 11:13, 22). When we look back on our lives, we can see milestones along the way. These milestones,

when aligned with the word of God, are part of the life lived in faith. Each milestone prepares us for the next.

The Israelites were not ready to enter the Promised Land when they left Egypt. They had to go through the process of learning to trust in God before they could cross the Jordan with Joshua. The same is true for maturing in the faith. We must be

preparing for crossing the Jordan into our promised rest. If our life is lived as a process of faith, then each moment prepares us for the next. So, when we come to the end we can say, "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the course, I have kept the faith; in the future there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the Righteous Judge, will award me on that day; and not only me, but also to all who have loved His appearing" (2 Tim. 4:7-8). We can meet death as another milestone along the path to our heavenly home.

It is definitely true that "whatever a man sows, that he will also reap" (Gal. 6:7). It is true agriculturally, and it is true personally. This works in two directions: one can reap good from some good he has sown, and one can reap evil from some evil he has sown. When we see someone "reap the evil that he had coming," sometimes we might get a charge out of that and perhaps "enjoy" that he finally got his comeuppance. But, is that a Christian response?

The wise man wrote, "He who is glad at calamity will not go unpunished" (Prov. 17:5). Then, "Do not rejoice when your enemy falls, And do not let your heart be glad when he stumbles; Lest the Lord see it, and it displease Him" (Prov. 24:17-18). So, to snicker or not to snicker? – DS

Have you ever received a pass or coupon or some favor on your birthday? Students might sometimes receive a "homework pass" on their birthday, so that they don't have to do an assignment. > Some Christians have brought that way of thinking (i.e., receiving certain favors or rewards on our birthdays) into their Christian walk. I have heard of Christians who decided to take Sunday as a "Day for Me," to celebrate, relax and "enjoy

what I like," and so they did not attend worship that Sunday. In their minds, it was an "excused absence" for their birthday.

There is nothing unscriptural about celebrating birthdays and receiving favors and rewards. However, when our "celebration" or our "Me Time" overrides our devotion (and obligation) to the One who gave us life, we need to sit down, reflect and earnestly examine ourselves! – *DS*

10 Ways to Survive (and Thrive) in a Difficult Marriage



First, it's important that we understand that the concepts of "difficult marriage" and "good marriage" can be compatible. Fact is, the best relationships involve challenge because challenge is typically a prerequisite for experiencing the best.

If your marriage does not involve challenge (and even conflict) then you are, in all likelihood, barely scraping the surface of what is possible in terms of a life-charged relationship. Life is always a work in progress, and so are the best marriages. Use these "10 Ways to Survive (and Thrive) in a Difficult Marriage" as you work out your commitment to create the best relationships possible.

1. Understand that the word "commitment" is the most important element in the meaning of love.

Great relationships are predicated on long-term faithfulness. Time is not just a great healer; time also provides the space we need to work things out.

2. Take a look at this Biology 101 definition of "life" and apply it to your marriage.

- Life is that which distinguishes something vital and functional from something that is dead.
- Life is a force associated with animation, or vigor.
- Life is a state characterized by metabolism, growth, the ability to react, reproduction and constant adaptation via internal change.

3. Tweak your perception.

Real life is challenging and life without challenge is, by definition, "life-less." All of us enjoy a little calm. But try viewing difficulties in your marriage as opportunities to grow. Perception can be reality.

4. Consider the fact that there are always two alternatives to every situation.

We can either elevate the experience...or make it worse. Your response sets the trajectory and sets into motion what is possible.

5. Connect with a support group.

You and your spouse both need to be surrounded by deliberate encouragement and loving accountability. To find that, you need to surround your marriage with couples who are in strong relationships.

6. Commit to positive change - yourself.

The only person you can change in a marriage is yourself. Positive personal growth can be the catalyst for positive change in the relationship.

7. Hold yourself accountable.

Do you want your spouse to change? Change yourself first. When we are willing to be the change we imagine, we have already opened the gate for positive change in our spouse.

8. Never blame.

Resist the urge to blame your husband or wife for difficulties, even when you know you're doing your best. The assignment of blame is always a step backwards.

9. Always affirm.

Don't lie (because insincerity always falls flat). However, when we find positives and then follow them with heart-felt affirmation, we demonstrate both compassion and belief. Belief is a strong asset to a marriage.

10. Love with increasing eloquence.

Always aim to raise your own game. Love your spouse with creativity and energy. Love with the heart of a servant.
