What If God Had Lied?

One of the most remarkable aspects of the nature of the Almighty God is one thing which He cannot do! Think of His power to speak the world into existence and it immediately happened. Think of that same power when His voice will roar from heaven and the entire universe will cease to be. Yet

there is one thing He cannot do—He cannot lie.

Imagine trying to serve a lying God-one whose words just cannot be trusted. We seek to deal with sin, but how do we know He was not lying when He revealed the plan of salvation? We seek to honor Him by worshiping every week with the five avenues of worship He gave to us, yet how do we know if He was lying when He gave us these things? Imagine trying to honor a lying God who speaks of sin, salva-

tion, prayer, purity, holiness, kindness, peace and providence. He cannot lie (Titus 1:2) and that changes every relationship we have with Him. Our God is a God of truth!

The truthful God has given us the words of truth. On the night of Jesus' betrayal, He spoke of the Father and truth. While He had been with those apostles for over three years, He had given them part of God's truth. He said, "I have given to them the words which you have given Me" (John 17:8), but there was more truth which they had to learn. He told those

apostles that when He went to the Father, the Father would send the Spirit of truth to the apostles (John 14:16). The Spirit which dwelt in them was to guide these men into all truth (John 16:12-13). The result of that is the Bible. Jesus summed it up best when He said, "Your word is truth" (John 17:17).

The truthful God has given us the words of truth and they are eternal. David said, "The truth of the Lord endures forever" (Psa. 117:2). The word of the Lord is forever fixed in

the heavens (Psa. 119:89) and every single precept of God endures forever (Psa. 119:160). God cannot lie; He has given us His words of truth and not one syllable of any word has been lost.

The truthful God wants to write His truth on our souls. Knowing truth is not just memorizing it. His plan is to take the eternal truth and make it part of our nature. Moses said, after he had given the law,

"And these words which I command you today shall be in your heart" (Deut. 6:6). Most Jews felt that if they know every detail of the law (and even some that were not there), God was pleased with them. There is a vast difference in knowing the law and knowing the Lawgiver. There is a difference in knowing about the Lord and knowing the Lord.

God help us to take His eternal truth from the One who cannot lie and love the truth, hide it in our heart and walk in His truth.



How Much Should I Forgive?

One of the hardest things to deal with as a Christian is when a "brother sins against you." In a perfect church, no one would mistreat or sin against a brother, but the church is made up of humans who make mistakes in thoughts, actions and words. So, By David Sproule how much should I be willing to forgive?

In Matthew 18, Jesus dealt with the very difficult topic

of when a "brother sins against you," and He gave the proper steps for one to follow in handling the matter in a Christ-like manner (18:15-20). After discussing this with His disciples, Peter came and asked, "Lord, how often shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? Up to seven times?" (18:21). In an effort to illustrate the magnitude of one's responsibility to forgive and the length one must go, Jesus told the parable of the unforgiving servant.

Read Matthew 18:21-35 and be reminded of the servant who was forgiven a large debt by the king but refused to turn around and forgive a fellow servant of a much smaller debt. Let's put some values on the amounts to give it some perspective to us in the twenty-first century.

The first servant owed the king "ten thousand talents" (18:24). The Roman talent in this case was worth 6,000 drachmas, and a drachma was worth about 19 cents, so the

total sum owed to the king was about ten million dollars. That's a lot of money in any culture, but think what it meant to Peter. The average daily wage was about 17 cents, so it would have taken (if giving the king every cent earned every day) about 200,000 years to pay the debt. When the servant pleaded with the king, the king forgave the huge debt (18:25-27).

Contrast that with the rest of the narrative. Having just been forgiven \$10,000,000 or 200,000 years of debt, that

servant went out and found a fellow servant who owed him 100 denarii. A denarius was the average daily wage for a working man (20:2), so the second servant owed 100 days' wages. Contrast owing 100 days' wages with owing 200,000 years' wages (or over 60,000,000 days), and you'll understand the extreme disproportion that Jesus was illustrating.

Now, what was the point? Peter asked how often he should forgive a brother who sins against him. Jesus responded by emphasizing the extreme level to which servants of the Lord have been forgiven by our Master (a debt that would take 200,000 years to pay, if such were even possible), and how comparatively "small" the debt is for us to forgive brethren who sin against us. Forgiveness is not typically easy to extend to another (because we have been hurt, and often deeply hurt), but it must be done, for the sake of our own soul. Our heavenly Father will punish each of his servants, who, "from his heart, does not forgive his brother" (18:35).

If God has ever lied we would have no way of knowing how to serve Him!



Darkness and Light

It was completely dark on the island. The generators had gone out, and Easter Island was plunged into darkness. With no nearby city lights and only the moon and stars overhead, I lit a candle in my small room. It reminded me of World War 2 and By Josh Blackmer the "Blackout Regulations." This was a gen-

eral mandate—that all windows should be prepared with heavy cloth, cardboard or paint to keep light from shining into the night. It was an effort to prevent light from the cities aiding enemy bombers. They understood this simple truth, even the smallest of light can be seen from miles away. Because of this, stiff fines were enforced for those who violated the blackouts. Though today these blackouts have been rendered futile by modern technology, the truth still remains.

Jesus put it this way, "A city set on a hill cannot be hidden" (Matt. 5:14). He goes on to say in that same context, "Let your light shine before men in such a way that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father who is in heaven" (Matt. 5:16). Some of you may already be singing, "Hide it under a bushel. NO! I'm gonna let it shine ... " Could it be that simple?

Those who are living and practicing the teachings of Christ are called "light." Examine this passage, "For you were formerly darkness, but now you are Light in the Lord; walk as children of Light (for the fruit of the Light consists in all goodness and righteousness and truth), trying to learn what is pleasing to the Lord" (Eph. 5:8-10). And another, "But you, brethren, are not in darkness, that the day would overtake you like a thief; for you are all sons of light and sons of day. We are not of night nor of darkness; so then let us not sleep as others do, but let us be alert and sober" (1 Thess. 5:4-6). Those of the

> light are characterized as good, righteous, truthful, alert and sober. We are to be those people that please God.

> There are fewer things in life with greater contrast than light and darkness. We are to be that light that stands out in the dark world. "Do all things without grumbling or disputing; so that you will prove yourselves to be blameless and innocent, chil-

dren of God above reproach in the midst of a crooked and perverse generation, among who you appear as lights in the world" (Phil. 2:14-15). We must realize that we will be different from those we come in contact with daily. It is for their good and our own that we shine. There are zero shades of grey with God. You are either darkness or light. Choose light.

It was completely dark on the island. Now there are two that have chosen the light, pray that there will be more.

That thought is just too much! To understand what I'm going through and to help me through it, God had to become just like me! Oh, how horrible for Him! Oh, how wonderful for me! – DS



So, what is THE characteristic that makes a Christian stand out from everyone else? Above everything else, what is THE one piece of evidence by which a person could be identified as a Christian? Is it his devotion to sound doctrine and pure, unadulterated truth? Is it his ability to quote Scripture upon Scripture? Is it her faithful, uncompromising attendance at every

> Bible class and worship assembly? No, it is not any of these things or even all of them combined!

Jesus made it abundantly clear: "By this all will know that you are My disciples, if you have love for one another" (John 13:35). There it is! He didn't use any hard words or confusing sen-

tence structure! He laid it out plain and simple! I must possess and demonstrate agape love for my brethren (in word and deed, 1 John 3:18), or I cannot be identified as one of Jesus' disciples!

Do I comfort, encourage, admonish, serve, care for, pray for, give to and bear the burdens of my brethren? Am I kind, forgiving, humble, compassionate and hospitable? Am I a Christian? - DS
