#### God Can Use What You Have

Sometimes we fail to see the big picture of our place in the kingdom of God. We look at those who are so talented and think that whatever talent we have is so miniscule that we have nothing to give to Him. We look at others who are blessed materially and wonder if God could ever use

what we have. The words of Jonathan seem so appropriate: "There is no restraint with God to save by many or by few." Consider what God has used to accomplish His victories. Few of these things had little worth.

Consider Moses' rod. There is no way to know how long Moses had used the rod in his hand at the burning bush, but there was no way he could have imagined how such a "worthless" thing could have such great value when God used it. That piece

of wood became a serpent to convince both the Jews and the Egyptians that Moses' message was from God. It turned water to blood and opened the Red Sea. God used what Moses had!

Consider David's sling. A sling has its use, but no one other than David could imagine the worth of such a "worthless" thing. Saul's armor was useless (even to Saul), but a young shepherd boy with great faith in the living God gave what he had to God's cause, and we all know the results. God used what David had!

Consider the lad's loaves and fish. None could have ever dreamed how enough food for a young lad could be enough food for such a great multitude. Andrew's question seems to be so realistic, "What are they among so many?" However, there is no restraint with God. His power is seen far more in Gideon's army of 300 than his army of 32,000. His power is seen far more in five loaves and two fish than a feast provided by ordinary means. God used what that lad had!

> Consider the widow's mites. As the Lord and His disciples watched the gifts being made at the temple, He made sure the disciples understood what was happening. Some gave out of their abundance, but the widow gave out of her poverty. Yet, our Lord said, "This poor widow has put in more than all" (Luke 21:3). She was like the Macedonians who gave to the Jewish saints out of their deep poverty (2

Cor. 8:2). They were the ones God saw as those sowing bountifully! God used what they had!

Consider what you have. Is there anything you have which could be used by God? What about your car? Your stove? Your computer? Your smart phone? Your "dumb" phone? Your pen? Your words? Your smile? Your end-seat at worship? Your warm greetings? Don't ever think that you have nothing to offer to God! Remember Moses, David, the lad, the widow. God will use what you have-if you will let Him!



#### Could You Go to a Church That Doesn't...?

Sometimes we grow so accustomed to things being the way we've always known them to be that we cannot think of doing them any other way. I remember pulling up to a gas station several years ago and a man asking me what kind of gas I wanted and if I By David Sproule wanted my windshield cleaned. Having

spent most of my life in a "Self Service" world at gas stations, I wasn't sure why this guy was bothering me about my gas. What I had always known was "Self Service," and I didn't even realize that "Full Service" still existed anywhere, and I wasn't sure that I even wanted

"Full Service." I was comfortable with what I had always known and always done. This is definitely not an exact parallel, but

sometimes when friends come and visit the church

of Christ, they quickly realize that there are some things that are different than what they've always known, and sometimes they are not sure that they could "go to a church that doesn't have thus-and-such or do this-and-that." When religious folks visit a church of Christ-folks who have grown accustomed to (or only ever known) mechanical instruments (like pianos, organs, guitars, bands, orchestras, etc.) and choral groups being used for music and singing during a worship assembly-these folks will often wonder how a church could exist without those elements in its worship and wonder if they could even personally be part of such a church. It is like they have pulled into a gas station with an old-style service-how could anyone be satisfied or comfortable with this "plain worship style"?

Why doesn't the church of Christ have instruments of music and/or choirs in its worship like so many other churches do? This could be answered in a number of ways, but let me kindly offer these thoughts for you. The church of Christ does not have these things in its worship for the same reason that it

> does not have: Saturday night worship services as an alternative to Sunday worship; speaking in tongues; healings; burning incense; holy water; reciting the Nicene or Apostle's Creed; genuflecting and making the sign of the cross; changing of the bread and wine into the actual body and blood of Jesus; women preaching; altar calls using the sinner's prayer; etc.

Again, the church of Christ is not going out of its way to see how different it can be from everyone else. Here's the simple and only reason these things are absent from our worship: they are not found in the New Testament as authorized avenues or elements of worship. The New Testament is the sole source of Divine wisdom for worship. Jesus taught that our worship must be done "in truth" (John 4:24), according to God's Word (John 17:17). So, it may sound overly simplistic (and maybe even naïve), but if something is not authorized by God in the New Testament, how could any man add it (Rev. 22:18)? Don't drive off too quickly. Think it over.

Wonder how a church could exist without those elements in its worship

#### Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good.

I think everyone has said this at some point in their lives, "But they started it!" It usually involves a "tit for tat" or "an eye for an eye" situation that escalated into something much more. What we are saying is the evil that I have done is justified because they started it. In that moment, we

have been overcome with evil.

Romans 12:9-20 gives us a list of things that we can put into practice in our lives in order to overcome or subdue evil with good. But, I will warn you. It is not easy. We will need to find real motivation for doing this.

"Let love be without hypocrisy. Abhor what is evil; cling to what is good. Be devoted to one another in brotherly love; give preference to one an-

other in honor; not lagging behind in diligence, fervent in spirit, serving the Lord; rejoicing in hope, persevering in tribulation, devoted to prayer, contributing to the needs of the saints, practicing hospitality. Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse. Rejoice with those who rejoice, and weep with those who weep. Be of the same mind toward one another; do not be haughty in mind, but associate with the lowly. Do not be wise in your own estimation. Never pay back evil for evil

to anyone. Respect what is right in the sight of all men. If possible, so far as it depends on you, be at peace with all men. Never take your own revenge, beloved, but leave room for the wrath of God, for it is written, 'Vengeance is mine, I will repay,' says the Lord. 'But if your enemy is hungry, feed him, and if he is thirsty, give him a drink; for in so doing you will heap burning coals on his head.' Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good" (Rom. 12:9-21).

> It is easy to focus on the "heaping of burning coals" aspect, because maybe we are still trying to get them back. That might be what you need for the first few times you put this into practice. In the end, the real motivation for doing this should be out of love for God and our enemies. The things that are mentioned in Romans chapter 12 are very mature actions or steps to be taken. The purpose is to keep

us from being over taken or subdued by evil. If we start taking our own vengeance, we are pulled down a path that leads to our own destruction. God says that vengeance is His and we can trust the He is the righteous judge.

I would challenge you to do two things this week. First, put these things from Romans 12:9-21 into practice. See how it plays out in your life. Second, trust God with vengeance and judgment. It will free you from a lot of undue burden.

# 10 Hardships in Marriage and How to Overcome Them



Every marriage faces hardship. It's a given. This list covers common troubles, but your situation is unique. The key point here is to face the difficulty – whatever kind of struggle it is – together with your spouse. Do you remember your marriage vows? *"For better, for worse..." "In sickness and in health..." "For richer, for poorer..."* These promises presuppose tough times. We went into our marriage with our eyes open, so there's really no excuse for not bringing everything we have to the table when things – once in a while – get dicey.

Here are 10 marital hardships and how to overcome them:

**1. Financial Struggle.** The stress associated with money problems can be overwhelming. But in the end, it's only money. And money has no power over your commitment to your relationship. Commit to a plan. Live simply. Never keep financial secrets from your spouse.

**2. Challenging Children.** Even the best behaved children in the world present challenges, and the number one casualty is always the relationship between mom and dad. So remember this: The marriage comes first. Not the kids, but the marriage. Nurture your relationship with your spouse and you will be better equipped to deal with whatever the kids dish out. Single parents, it's increasingly important to stay connected with your child's other parent as hard as that might be.

**3. Immaturity.** Great relationships are supposed to mature over time. If you still relate to one another the same way you did when you first married, then it's past time for the marriage to grow up. Get involved with other couples at your church. Love one another "out loud." Invest in the marriage as if your life depends on it – because it does.

**4. Unfaithfulness.** Marriages run into this hardship often. We may not sleep with other people, but we're all guilty of being unfaithful when it comes to time, attention, priorities, the way we use our resources, and so much more. One way to deal with this is to recommit yourself to your spouse. Make it clear where your priorities steer your time and attention.

**5. Moving.** It's a fact. Most Americans change careers several times. That often means moving across the state or across the world. Moving is a huge stress. Regardless if it's because of your job or if it's your spouse's job, make the decision to be 100% supportive and flat out refuse to whine. Do what it takes to get invested in the new community quickly. Find a church. Get involved. Live forward.

**6. Sickness.** We forget how much we rely on one another until someone breaks down physically. If you're the one still standing, do everything in your power to be a servant to your spouse. Sure it's tough to do everything, but your attempt with an obvious willing spirit is going to make all the difference.

**7. Depression.** Everyone goes through "the blues" at times in their lives. Here again, it's about having the heart of a servant, about going the extra mile, and about putting the needs of your spouse ahead of your own. Look to God for your source of happiness. Be a conduit of that joy to your spouse. And seek medical attention if necessary.

**8. Disinterest.** Sometimes it happens the first year. Sometimes it takes a decade or so. Regardless of where we are on the time spectrum, disinterest or boredom can easily set in. Not feeling special about the relationship is a hardship for everyone, but it doesn't have to be. Our job is to be intentional about the relationship. When was the last time you went out on a date? What about a day off devoted to each other?

**9. Career.** We have already talked about moving, but career issues can cause hardship without a change of location. Keep each other in the loop. Ask for each other's opinion about what you're up to. Do everything in your power to protect family time and to promote a work culture that respects family values.

**10. Empty Nest.** We invest a lot in the kids. If we're not careful, our relationship with our spouse gets neglected. Guard against that day by investing in your spouse now. Rather than mourn the children after they leave, try celebrating the freedom you now have to invest more time and interest in your marriage. Again, it's all about being intentional.
