How Big Is Your Problem?

No one ever said that life would be easy. From infancy nothing seems to go right. We are seemingly placed in a crib where we must cry endlessly, awaiting someone to notice that we are hungry, lonely or need our diapers changed. Later, there is that horrible task of learning to walk with the incessant

tumbling and falling that is part of the process. Add to that the great "injustice" brought into our lives by parents and siblings. Life is not easy. Little do we realize that this just the beginning of a life filled with problems.

As we reach maturity, those first problems become insignificant with the problems which surround us. Look around you right now and think of what is happening. Life is not easy. It is characterized by insurmountable problems.

However, there is something a Christian has which makes life vastly different from those in the world. It does not matter what is happening, for the eyes of our God are over us, His ears are open to our prayers and His face is against those who trouble us (1 Pet. 3:12). Our problems often seem far greater than our abilities to deal with them, but we must remember that our God is greater than our problems.

Paul described the limitless power of God in his letter to Ephesus. "He is able to do exceedingly abundantly above all

that we ask or think, according to the power that works in us" (Eph. 3:20). Read that passage slowly and notice the character of God. God is able. He is able to do what we ask. He is able to do what we ask or think. He is able to do more than we ask or think. He is able to do abundantly more than we ask or think. He is able to do exceedingly abundantly above all that we ask or think.

> The emphasis this year at Palm Beach Lakes is, "With God We Can." The emphasis this month is "With God We Can Anchor Our Hope in Christ." That hope is the anchor of our soul (Heb. 6:19) in the midst of adversity. Paul said we are saved by this hope (Rom. 8:24). Hope is not a wish that we might overcome, it is an expectation. It is not an expectation because of our ability, but because of His!

When Paul was traveling to Rome, his ship was caught in a tempestuous storm. For two weeks, they were driven by the ferocious winds and no one knew where they were. Luke described the situation as, "All hope was lost." Yet, read Acts 27:21-25 carefully and see the hope Paul had in this situation. God was greater than his problems! That same God is your God, and He is greater than your problems!

The next time you look at what is happening in your life just remember that the question is not, "How big is your problem?" The question is, "How big is your God?"



A "Stirring" Relationship

There are some people who see a bee hive and very carefully pass it on by. Then, there are others, who see a bee hive, walk over and shake it up, and then flee the scene without giving it another thought. Some folks just like to stir up trouble.

Unfortunately, stirring up trouble is not limited to an activity with a bee hive. Too often, a husband

or a wife will tend to stir things up unnecessarily. Children can also be "natural talents" at stirring up matters. And, regrettably, some brethren in the church have a knack for creating a stir wherever they go. Take a few minutes and consider some "stirring" passages, especially from the wisdom of Proverbs.

"A harsh word stirs up anger" (Prov. 15:1). Our words, and the tone with which they are spoken,

can have a very harmful impact on others. Perhaps that is why James says, "The tongue is a fire" (3:6). Have you ever said something that, intentionally or unintentionally, stirred up a fire of anger? May God help us to guard our mouths!

"Hatred stirs up strife" (Prov. 10:12). Hatred is such a strong emotion and can cause us to say and do things that, perhaps, we would not normally do. Perhaps that is why John says, "He who hates his brother is in darkness and walks in darkness" (1 John 2:11). Have your emotions ever overtaken

your behavior and stirred up strife? May God help us to guard our emotions!

"An arrogant man stirs up strife" (Prov. 28:25, NASB). There is something particularly repulsive about pride. Perhaps that is why the first item that Solomon lists that God hates is "a proud look" (Prov. 6:16). May God help us to guard our attitudes!

"A hot-tempered man stirs up strife" (Prov. 15:18). Short fuses are known for blowing up quite easily and rapidly. Perhaps that is why Solomon said, "He who is quick-tempered exalts folly" (Prov. 14:29). May God help us to guard our tempers!

To help us guards our mouths, God tells us that "a soft answer turns away wrath" (15:1). To help us guard our emotions, God tells us that "love covers all sins" (10:12). To help us guard our attitudes, God

tells us that "he who trusts in the Lord" (rather than himself) "will prosper" (28:25). To help us guard our tempers, God tells us that "he who is slow to anger allays contentions" (15:18).

God's Word is so complete! When He tells us not to stir something up, He tells us how! In your home, in your church family, in your relationships, if you're looking for something to stir up in others, then "let us consider one another in order to **stir up love and good works**" (Heb. 10:24)! We will be enriched as a result! The church will be enriched as a result!

"It's so pretty and shiny, I want one!"

We have all done this at some point. We see that item that we need, want or must have. It has the latest "this" and the best "that." It is faster, stronger and better than the old one you currently own. So, how do we respond to that? Do we take the bait? By Josh Blackmer Is this item that much better? Does it de-

serve my focus and desire? What do I do when covetousness attacks?

I am not speaking against working and providing for families and loved ones but rather against covetousness. We know covetousness is wrong. Both Ephesians and Colossians call covetousness idolatry (Eph. 5:5; Col. 3:5). Idolatry is the worship or love of anything other than God. John wrote, "Do not love the world nor the things in the world. If anyone loves the world, the love of the Father is not in him. For

all that is in the world, the lust of the flesh and the lust of the eyes and the boastful pride of life, is not from the Father, but is from the world. The world is passing away, and also its lusts; but the one who does the will of God lives forever" (1 John 2:15-17). Understanding what covetousness is helps us identify the solution. Covetousness is an idolatrous love of the world and things. Loving God and doing His will is our way of escape.

We are not simply trying not to covet but rather we are working on contentment. Don't focus on not coveting. Focus on being content.

Christ warns us against greed. "Then He said to them, 'Beware, and be on your guard against every form of greed; for not even when one has an abundance does his life consist of his possessions'" (Luke 12:15). He goes no to tell the parable of the man that had so much that he said to himself, "Take your ease, eat drink and be merry." God's response was, "You fool" (Luke 12:16-21)! Paul wrote to Timothy, "For the love of money is a root of all sorts of evil, and some by longing for it

> have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many griefs" (1 Tim 6:10). Greed is something that we sabotage ourselves with.

> Our best antidote to covetousness is contentment. "Godliness with contentment is great gain" (1 Tim. 6:6-9). Hebrews also states, "Make sure that your character is free from the love of money, being content with what you have; for He Himself has said, 'I will never desert

you, nor will I ever forsake you'" (Heb. 13:5). God says, "Be content with what you have, and I will be there with you." We are not simply trying not to covet but rather we are working on contentment. Don't focus on not coveting. Focus on being content. One Christian brother wrote, "I have learned to be content in whatever circumstances I am" (Phil. 4:11). Anyone can covet. Contentment is something we learn.

13 Things Loving Fathers Do for Their Children



"He saved me," said thirteen-year-old Gracie Johnson, after her parents, sister, and two cousins were tragically killed in a rock slide. She was speaking about her dad, Dwayne Johnson. The family had gone for a hike along the Agnes Vaille Falls trail in Buena Vista, Colorado. Recent rainfall had made areas of the mountains unstable. As they were walking, one witness described what sounded like loud thunder cracking and boulders the size of cars coming down the mountain as the Johnson family stood helplessly in their devastating path. In an act of heroism, Dwayne dove on top of Gracie as a shield, saving her life and surrendering his own.

In situations like that you have no time to think, instinct takes over. Dwayne Johnson's natural instinct was that of a loving father. Loving fathers are self-sacrificing and protect their children. Here are 10 more things loving fathers do for their children:

1. Loving fathers...love their children's mother. Love your wife without reservation — you can't do much more for your kids than that. If you are divorced, treat your children's mother with respect, even if it is not reciprocated. Never return disgrace with disgrace.

2. Loving fathers...love them unconditionally. Make sure that your children know you love them no matter what. Don't confuse this with permissiveness. Unconditional love does nothing to encourage the wrong kind of behavior. In fact, kids who are secure in their father's love tend to act out less, not more.

3. Loving fathers...grow up. We're talking about the us here, not the kids. Children don't want another buddy; they want a dad. They want someone who thinks things through, makes tough decisions, and engages life with responsibility. Someone they can count on.

4. Loving fathers...are there. "Quality time" is all well and good, but it has nothing on quantity time. Make the time. Everyone has the same 24 hours available. Make yours count.

5. Loving fathers...provide. As best you can. Material provision can be tough when jobs are lost and tough times hit. However, you can always provide a stable home with love and affection.

6. Loving fathers...discipline. Children appreciate an even hand, balance, accountability, and love-drenched discipline. It's called consistency and, without clearly defined boundaries, it is very difficult to grow up.

7. Loving fathers...value education. Don't just read to them; read with them. Don't just fuss about grades; get involved with their homework. Don't just talk about learning; be a hands-on advocate.

8. Loving fathers...raise them to leave. The simple goal of being a family and parenting our children doesn't look any more complicated than this: Raise them well equipped to leave home and to establish faithful lives.

9. Loving fathers...teach them to take responsibility. Kids who learn how to duck responsibility and avoid cost will – sooner or later – fall flat on their faces. Loving fathers make sure their children know how to own up, clean up, and move forward.

10. Loving fathers...teach them to love this life. The best predictor of happiness in children is happiness in their parents. If we learn how to love this life and then give that blessing to our kids, they will be well prepared for satisfaction.

11. Loving fathers...exemplify Christ. Children need to see Jesus every day. Most of all, they need to see Jesus in the life of their father. As they follow you and your example, they need to be following Jesus.

12. Loving fathers...take to church. Fathers take their children all sorts of places: school, the mall, the movies, the doctor, friend's homes, etc. But there needs to be a priority in the home — we go to church. Nothing can or must interfere with this decision. Help them to love the church and they won't stray from it later in life.

13. Loving fathers...take to heaven. Everything the father does with and for his children must be focused on one ultimate goal: heaven! Nothing else matters! No other achievement and no other reward matters when compared to heaven! True success is not measured by earthly attainments! True success is measured by heavenly attainments!

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"...always abounding in the work of the Lord..." (1 Cor. 15:58)
