I remember my high school chorus teacher talking to

the class about producing harmony. She said something that has stuck with me, which not only applies to creating harmony in singing but to creating harmony in life. She told us that each singer has equal responsibility for the harmony of the group. Of that is that my focus must be on making sure that I myself am singing the right note, with the right dy-

namic, in the right tempo, etc. Sure enough, for harmony to be created, I myself must sing my part correctly. But, that was not what my chorus teacher emphasized to us that day.

Being in harmony is not only or even mostly about making sure that I nail my part. My chorus teacher, who was very capable and accomplished in her field, told us that creating harmony is as much about listening as it is about singing. At first, that didn't make sense. When I'm singing, I've got to be concerned about my singing. How can I possibly listen (and why would I) to other people singing, when I've got to concentrate on my part? But, you see, harmony is not about being in harmony with yourself. Harmony is about being in harmony with others. A chorus is not a soloist but a chorus. For one singer to be in harmony with the others, that singer must learn to listen to the other singers, and not just those singing the same part, but listening to those singing all of the other parts.

True harmony will only be produced when I the others.

The lesson in our chorus class that day has helped me to be a better singer (not in quality of voice but in awareness of all singers). But, even more than that limited application, the lesson in our chorus class that day has helped me to be a better person. In order for harmony to exist in relationships, it is not always course, the natural thought to have when hearing learn to listen to about what I'm doing and making sure that I'm nailing my part as perfect as I can. True harmony will only be produced when I learn to listen to the others

around me and hear their parts.

Harmony is so beautiful when you hear it (and see it)! Are you paying attention to the other parts around you? Harmony among brethren truly is "good and pleasant" (Ps. 133:1).

He did it all with a big yellow bird on Sesame Street. He recently did an "Ask Me Anything" ses-By Josh Blackmer sion on a popular website. During that ses-

sion, a person asked him about his most meaningful interac-

tion with a child while filming on or off air. Mr. Spinney responded with a story of a letter from May our communication the parents of a 5-year-old boy dying of cancer. They wrote asking him to call their child. Big Bird was his favorite and always seemed to cheer him up. Spinney said that the boy was so ill and knew he was dying. When he called, the boy was very happy and asked, "Is it really you, Big Bird?" Spinney replied, "Yes, it is really me."

They spoke for about ten minutes, and the child said, "Thank you for calling me Big Bird. You're my friend. You make me so happy." Spinney received a letter some time later telling him that the boy passed away shortly after talking to his friend Big Bird.

Mr. Spinney's comment after the story was this. "I could see that what I say to children can be very important." I know that the importance of what we say to a child isn't a new revelation, but the story highlights its importance. The ten minutes he took to make that call made all the difference for the boy and that family. What if we took the time to talk to children? To talk with them as though they mattered, as a friend? They like the attention of older people or the "big kids," as some children that shall not be named called our young adults.

Two conditions require two compliances

Jesus met a blind man and did something rather unusual. "He spat on the ground and made clay with the saliva; and He anointed the eyes of the blind man with the clay" (John 9:6). Then, he told the man what to do: "Go, wash in the pool of Siloam" (9:7). There are two conditions in that statement: "Go" and "wash." Both conditions had to be met in order to receive the blessing.

Note what the text records: "So he went and washed, and came back seeing" (9:7). The man complied with both conditions and received his sight. Note what the man reported: "Jesus made clay and anointed my eyes and said to me, 'Go...and wash.' So I went and washed, and I received sight" (9:11). He heard two conditions, so he complied with both conditions.

There are two conditions specified in Mark 16:16 for man's salvation: "Believe and be baptized." If the blind man had skipped one of Jesus' conditions, he would have remained blind. If a lost man skips one of the Jesus' conditions, he will remain condemned. It's pretty simple! - DS
