## No Mortal, Not Even the Pope, Can Forgive Sins

If only the pope

can forgive the

sin of abortion,

few have any



As the pope's visit to America approaches, he has announced that this year local priests can absolve individuals of the sin of abortion. Prior to this announcement, forgiving this sin was restricted to those of a higher rank in the Catholic church. It is difficult for many to understand these matters.

The Roman Catholic church teaches that there are

"levels" of sin. There are those lesser sins called venial sins which, when committed, do not destroy one's relationship with God. Those who commit them are still friends of God, but the relationship is tarnished. While one can confess these sins to a priest, it is not necessary for this to happen.

Then, there are mortal sins which separate **chance of heaven** one from God. There are many of them (the list in-

cludes extreme anger, hate, lying, cheating, extortion, murder, and many sexual sins—contraception, adultery, fornication, homosexuality, etc.). Forgiveness of these almost always demands confession of these sins to a priest.

Among these mortal sins and evidently elevated to a higher level is the sin of abortion. The Catholic church teaches that if it occurs the result is automatic excommunication from the church. As noted above, it cannot usually be forgiven by the local priests and demands a higher level of forgiveness. Those who believe the clear teaching of the Bible are so perplexed by this. Forgiveness of sins lies in the heart of the one who has been sinned against. No mortal, not even the pope, has ever been given the right to forgive sins. "Sin is the transgression of the law" (1 John 3:4). It is the law of God which has been transgressed. The Jews fully understood this and said, "Who can forgive sin, but God alone" (Mark 3:7)? The pope cannot give forgiveness for the sin of abortion for he has

not been sinned against.

Some might say, "But did not Jesus give Peter the right to bind and loose on the earth?" This view misinterprets the words of Jesus in Matthew 16:19. Such a view makes Peter (and the "church") greater than God! God did not have to wait for Peter to bind and loose, nor does He have to wait for the pope to absolve sin. Read Jesus' words in the New

American Standard Bible, for they absolutely reflect the Greek words Jesus used and the words Peter would have understood. "Whatever you bind on earth shall have been bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall have been loosed in heaven." The binding/loosing took place first in heaven.

If only the pope and those high in his church can forgive the sin of abortion, the world is doomed because only Catholics, and very few of them, have any chance of heaven.

God help us all to get back to the Bible!



### A Christian's Work Ethic

entitlement mentality permeating our nation has made it hard for businesses to find good workers and for custom-

ers to receive reliable, timely and courteous service.

So, how is today's Christian to function in the workplace? Should the Christian be like all the other workers, or should the Christian stand out from the rest? Should the environment affect the Christian or should the Christian affect the environment? The work ethic of a Christian must stand in stark contrast to the trending ethic of our day.

**God expects Christians to work.** "Let him labor, working with his hands what is good" (Eph. 4:28). "Work with your own hands, as we commanded you" (1 Thess. 4:11). "If anyone is not willing to work, let him not eat" (2 Thess. 3:10). The words for "labor" and "work" cannot be defined as merely "having a job" or as "going to work." The words themselves demand actual work, labor, toil.

God expects Christians to work hard. "Whatever

your hand finds to do, do it with your might" (Ecc. 9:10). In the context of a Christian's responsibility in the workplace, God commanded, "And whatever you do, do it heartily, as to the Lord and not to men...for you serve the Lord" (Col. 3:23-24). God calls upon His children to give it their all at work.

God expects Christians to set the standard for others in the workplace. Even if others deride the boss or find ways to "get around" doing the actual work, Christians must do

> what is right. We must "be obedient" to our bosses "with fear and trembling, in sincerity of heart, as to Christ; not with eye-service, as men-pleasers, but as bondservants of Christ, doing the will of God from the heart, with goodwill doing service, as to the Lord, and not to men" (Eph. 6:5-7). In the workplace, our work must done as if we were doing it unto Christ, for ultimately, we please (and serve) Christ.

Christians are to represent Christ, even at work. What if Jesus had your job? What if Jesus were to go into work for you tomorrow? How serious would He take it? How hard would He work? How would He respond to tasks from the boss? Would you envision Jesus lazily watching the clock and reading through His social media, or do you see Him giving His all to the work? My work ethic should emulate what the work ethic of Jesus would be, for I belong to Him and represent Him!

His love for her is one that has inspired both writer and poet, song and sonnet. The true story of a man that loved his bride more than life itself, more than any earthly treasure. Even, it seems, more than she loved him. It was clear to most that she By Josh Blackmer did not deserve his love or such devotion. To

the same crowd, she appeared a common one, but he spoke of her as one set apart, a beautiful city on a hill for all to see. He spoke to thousands about the attributes of his beloved. He told them that everyone should know her and that she is a blessing to all acquainted with her. He spoke of her as though he knew her so intimately. "Such a great treasure," he would say. "Be prepared for our wedding," he would admonish, though no one had ever seen her. There were many who liked hearing about his bride, yet

others did not. For envy and jealousy the bridegroom was taken. He was savagely beaten and died a gruesome death. Throughout his painful demise he spoke of her. He loved her and for his great love, he died.

This allegorical depiction of Christ, the Bridegroom, and the church as the bride highlights a very sacrificial love. It is a literary device that is used several times in the New Testament. On one occasion, John the baptizer mentioned Christ as a bridegroom and himself as a friend of the bridegroom (John

As we contemplate this great love story, let us exercise diligence to graft it into our own story of love.

3:29). Jesus used this imagery twice in Matthew 9:15 and Matthew 25:1-12. These all tell of a responsibility to the Bridegroom. The Holy Spirit through the pen of Paul mentioned it again in Ephesians chapter 5. Paul, talking of the mystery concerning Christ and His church (Eph. 5:32), deepens our understanding of the relation between husband and wife.

In the short section of Ephesians 5:22-33, there are several commands. The wives are called to be in subjection to

and show respect for their husbands (5:22, 33) "as to the Lord." That includes the expectation that husbands will be the head of the household and leading in spiritual matters. The command to husbands is to love "just as Christ." These three words are repeated twice, showing men how they are to love their wives. In verse 25, "Just as Christ...gave Himself for her." We are to have a sacrificial love for our wives. One that would take self out of the

way and practice those things that would promote her wellbeing. We are also to have a love that "nourishes and cherishes...just as Christ" (5:29). This is a love that builds up and protects. It is not bound by just the physical needs but also speaks more to her spiritual needs.

As we contemplate this great love story, let us exercise diligence to graft it into our own story of love. By putting into practice those commands concerning marriage, we are given insight into the mysteries of Christ and His church.

## 10 Ways to Teach Your Children to Overcome Obstacles



Life can be well described as an obstacle course, with impediments that get re-arranged every time we start a new day. This fact is one of the elements that makes for rich experience, not only in our careers, but also in our personal lives.

Unfortunately, many children learn too early that obstacles are either there for someone else to deal with, or simply not worth the trouble. Consequently, too many young people leave school and enter the workplace without a good grasp on the possible.

The obstacles are not going away, and our children need to understand the art of the possible. We have this great opportunity to be involved in preparing young people to live complete and fulfilling lives. A huge part of this happens to be the question, "How can I teach my child to overcome obstacles?"

**1. Be a role model.** Kids learn most of what they know about problem solving by watching their parents deal with difficulty. So demonstrate the deep satisfaction that comes with negotiating a challenge.

**2. Equip them with the right tools.** Tools such as motivation, self-confidence, perseverance, faith, strength of character, sound judgment, and experience in solving small problems.

**3.** Play problem-solving games as a family. Scavenger hunts, board games, word puzzles. This helps kids understand that obstacles are an important element of a rich and fulfilling life experience.

**4. Understand the difference between "childhood" and "irrelevancy."** This is very important! Too many parents offer children neither responsibility nor the respect of expectation. Two truths come out of this point:

- When we expect nothing of our children, then that's exactly what we get. Rather than solve problems, they will likely cause them.
- Children who are not allowed to contribute to family life tend to develop other skills instead and those are typically destructive.

It's important to act as if our children really are an integral part of family life, and that they really do have something of value to contribute.

**5. Provide children with practice.** Introduce obstacles that kids can deal with; teach them how to develop strategy; encourage them to persevere; and then make a big deal of it when they succeed. Involve children with planning family outings, working out details on vacation, and handling the logistics for other family events.

**6.** Do not reinforce giving up. Never solve a problem for your child that they can (with guidance) solve themselves. Instead, nudge and encourage so that "hanging in there" for success is experienced as much more rewarding than conceding defeat.

**7.** Be there when failure threatens to overwhelm. This is the other side of the coin. There's no benefit to abandoning children to failure when the struggle is too huge. Can you help them re-direct? Can you steer them toward success, then back off? Can you be realistic, and counsel with them when an obstacle simply will not budge?

**8. Facilitate solution-oriented conversations at the family table.** "Hey, kids, what do you think about such-and-such?" "I've got a challenging situation – any ideas?" "We've decided to slice 10% off the family budget – let's all talk about what we can do together to make this work."

**9. Volunteer with your children.** Find a facility where so-called "handicapped" individuals work hard to overcome obstacles. Participate in community or church projects that call for creative thinking – then let your kids take the lead.

**10. Don't forget balance.** Sometimes it's appropriate to ask for help when an obstacle won't budge. We don't drill our own teeth for a filling, most parents need assistance when it comes to funding a college education, and some of us really shouldn't mess with our own plumbing. Don't let your children confuse stubbornness with tenacity and perseverance.
