It was 490 years before Christ when the Greeks began to overthrow the oppression they suffered from Persia. In a major decisive battle, the Greeks defeated the Persians and one of the victorious soldiers, Pheidippides, ran more than 20 miles from the battle site to Athens. Arriving in the city, he

proclaimed, "We have won!" and then fell dead. You may have heard of this battle, for it was fought at Marathon, and this event gave rise to the modern marathons.

Running was part of the lives of those in the first century as it is today. Last year, there were over 1,100 marathons run in the U.S. involving more than 500,000 runners. Consider the spiritual lessons the Holy Spirit draws from this ancient and modern practice of running and the parallels between participation in races and our involvement in the Christian race.

Runners must give their all in order to be successful. In 1 Corinthians chapter 9, Paul talks about how so many begin the race but only the most dedicated ones win it. He then said, "Run so that you may obtain it." There is the prize awaiting the Christian, but to obtain it he must give all that he has and finish the race.

Runners must run lawfully. In every race, there are rules, and they must be followed. The course is specified and only those who follow the rules have any chance of winning. Paul said, "If anyone competes in athletics, he is not crowned unless he competes according to the rules" (2 Tim. 2:5). God has given us a race to run, but he has established the rules and we must comply with them.

Runners must not carry unnecessary "baggage." Those ancient runners trained by wearing weights attached to the legs and ankles. On the day of the race, they removed the

> weights and their legs seemed extra strong when the race began. The writer of Hebrews applies that to Christians in our race. "Let us lay aside every weight and the sin which so easily ensnares us" (Heb. 12:1). One cannot hold on to Jesus when his hands already grasp worldly things.

> Runners need to model themselves after others who have shown their abilities. This is why

God describes our race before many witnesses and then adds, "Looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith" (Heb. 12:2). We have a perfect model who has already finished the race. He has shown us how to do it. Our responsibility is to keep our focus on Him. It is as simple as looking at how He did it, then making sure we follow His example every day.

So, let's run the race knowing that the perfect example has shown us how. Let's finish the race, and as we die, proclaim, "We have won!"



What's NASCAR Got to Do With It?

I guess you could say that I used to be a NASCAR fan. For several seasons, I watched nearly every race. Initially, I watched them alone, but after a while Traci started watching them with me. It was something we enjoyed doing together. By David Sproule Thanks to some kind and generous friends,

we were able to go to several Saturday night races in Daytona. It was a fun part of our lives.

But, as time went on and life began to fill up with other things, NASCAR gradually began to fade. fill up with other With the advent of the DVR, I started to fast forward through most of the races. Then, it got to where I would just check the website on Monday to see who won. Finally, it just completely faded from my life.

I tried watching a race not too long ago.

There was some nostalgia to it, but that one race just didn't have the satisfaction it once did. At one time, I knew the faces and names of NASCAR. I knew much of the organization, activities and strategies of the sport. But when I went back and watched that race a while back, there were lots of new faces, names, leaders, activities, strategies, etc. There was still some of the old, but now there was a lot of new stuff which was unfamiliar to me. Feeling distanced from the sport, I did not watch long and haven't watched another race since then.

As life began to things, NASCAR gradually began to fade.

I'm not writing this to tell you about me and NASCAR. I'm writing to draw a parallel between this illustration and what happens with many people and their faithfulness in worshiping God. Go back and read this illustration with that parallel in mind. Many people start out as "worship fans" and attend nearly every service, knowing the faces, names, leaders and activities of the church. But, then they allow "other things" to fill up their lives and displace the central priority of

> worship. They gradually start to find "reasons" not to be at worship (any "reason" will do). Over time, it eventually fades from their lives.

> Occasionally, these folks may "pop in" for a worship service, but they have lost touch with the church so much that they don't know the new people, have not kept up with the other folks and activities of the church, and they just feel out of place with

the unfamiliarity. Without a strong personal drive, they will often distance themselves even further.

There is a major difference to note between these matters, though. NASCAR (and things like it) is completely insignificant in the grand scheme of salvation and eternity in heaven, while worshiping God is directly tied to one's salvation and eternal dwelling. The place of worship in one's life is a reflection of the place of God in one's life. How much is it a part of your life? Do you need to get back "on track"?

As we finish the race and as we die, let us proclaim, "We have won!"



For Refugees Have Fled

Syria, most of us know very little about their uncivil civil war or the political policies and reasons for its existence. You may have heard about the millions of people fleeing the country. In 2011, when the conflict started, there were 100,000 refugees. By Josh Blackmer That number has grown exponentially to 3.8

million that have fled the country and 7.2 million that moved to other parts of the country internally. It is estimated that it will reach well over 4 million by the end of the year. They are all running for their lives from the atrocities of war that has claimed an estimated 200,000 lives of both civilians and militants. We see the pictures that are coming out of this country. People are scared, crying, dying and holding lifeless bodies of loved ones. Some Syrians and His heavenly city have said that just doing day-to-day things is a

matter of life and death in their own neighborhoods. Hope is lost. That is why millions of people are seeking refuge.

We know nothing about what it means to be a refugee. We can imagine and sympathize and hurt for those in that situation, but we pray that we will never know. Some of the early church knew what it meant to seek refuge. Christ foretold of the destruction of Jerusalem, "then those who are in Judea must flee to the mountains. Whoever is on the housetop must not go down to get the things out that are in his house. Whoever is in the field must not turn back to get his cloak. But woe to those who are pregnant and to those who are nursing babies in those days" (Matt. 24:16-19)! Peter writes a letter and addressed it to "those who reside as aliens, scattered throughout Pontus, Galatia, Cappadocia, Asia, and Bithynia, who are chosen" (1 Pet. 1:1). James also addressed his letter to the "dispersed abroad" (Jam. 1:1). It was something that the early church and those that taught had to do to survive (Acts 14:4-7).

This element in the life of the early church was used in the Hebrew letter, " ... we who have taken refuge would have strong encouragement to take hold of the hope set before us. This hope we have as an anchor of the soul, a hope both sure

and steadfast and one which enters within the veil, where Jesus has entered as a forerunner for us..." (v. 6:18b-20a). Again in chapter 11, "...having

confessed that they were strangers and exiles on the earth... they are seeking a country of their own... they desire a better country, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; for He has prepared a city for them" (v. 13-16).

You and I are resident aliens who seek refuge from the present evil in God and His heavenly city. Remember that the danger is real, and it is life and death. We have a hope that the fears of this world, or even death, can't take from us.



Do you agape Jesus?

I could ask, "Do you love Jesus"? But, I think that it has a different ring to it to ask, "Do you agape Jesus?" As humans (and especially Americans) we have equated "love" with an emotion that we feel. Of course, we need to have an emotional affection for Jesus, but that is not the question here, nor is it the word that is used most frequently for our response to Jesus.

Do you have an unselfish, unconditional devotion to Jesus that seeks His best, His needs and His desires? That is the exact devotion that Jesus had (and has) for us (Eph. 5:2; Gal. 2:20). But, do we have that for Him? If we do, it will be evident in our lives. If we agape Jesus, we will keep His commandments and will keep His word (John 14:15, 21, 23). It will not be driven by an emotional response (which can wax and wane), but by an action-based response to an unselfish desire to fulfill the ultimate desires of our Lord.

Do you agape Jesus? It is an answer that will not come from your lips but from your life. -DS



Some folks look around at the denominational world today (and often at specific groups) and exclaim, "Wow! It is really something all the ways in which they are doing good and glorifying God." Let me ask you a question—how do we know that it is "something"?

> Jesus placed a great emphasis on "abiding in Him," especially in John 15. He affirmed that he who does not abide in Him "cannot bear fruit" and actually "can do nothing" (15:4-5). Jesus then explained that to abide in Him is to have His words abiding in you (15:7). John would later write, "He who keeps His commandments

abides in Him" (1 John 3:24). Putting this together, if someone does not keep the commandments of Christ, then He is not abiding in Christ and consequently "can do nothing." At least, he "can do nothing" that would be acceptable to Him.

Only those who abide in the doctrine of Christ have God's approval (2 John 1:9). Only those who do the Father's will can enter heaven (Matt. 7:21). There may be someone who is doing "something," but if they are not abiding in Him and His word, He says it is "nothing." - DS


