The One Who Stands Between Us and The Almighty

We can truly

say, "O how

blessed we are

that Mediator!"



His friends were no help. True enough, they had heard of his plight and had come to him, but they only looked at him as he suffered and said nothing. How heartless this seemed but little could this man understand how it was destined to get worse. They just looked at him for seven days, and when

they finally talked to him, it was a heartless harangue of accusations. They told him that the adversity he was experiencing was because of the vile, sinful life he was living. Their words and his response to them occupy nearly 40 chapters in the Bible. This man was Job.

In the ninth chapter of Job, this man of patience proclaimed the majesty of God. God's wisdom because we have suffering. This is where Job found himself. was such that the wisdom of any man was not worthy to be compared to His. His power seen through-

out His creation caused those who really observed it to cower in fear at its magnitude. God is so great, and the wisest and strongest of mankind could never stand in any arena before Him. Job could not understand the nature of His suffering, but he did understand the magnitude of God.

In the midst of his suffering, Job described his own inability to comprehend how God could ever know what human suffering was like. He said, "For He is not a man, as I am, that I may answer Him, and that we should go to court together. Nor is there any mediator between us who may lay his hand on both of us" (Job 9:32-33). A mediator is that individual who stands between two individuals and, because of his ability to understand both parties in a conflict, brings peace. Job could not figure out how the Almighty could ever feel what Job was feeling. Job was covered from head to toe with painful boils, yet God had never felt this kind of pain.

> We may sometimes find ourselves in a similar situation when we ask, "Why am I suffering so much? What is the reason all this is happening to me?" Such questions acknowledge that He exists and that He is sovereign, but we are hurting so much we find ourselves longing to know what God knows about our

The reality is that the Almighty is almighty in wisdom. He does understand us, but what is the as-

surance to us that He does understand? Job said, "O that there were a mediator," and we can say, "O how blessed we are because we have a Mediator." One of the results of the Word becoming flesh is the absolute assurance we have of one who can truly go between us and the Omniscient One.

Meditate on these words, "He had to be made like His brothers in every respect...for because He Himself has suffered when tempted, He is able ... " (Heb. 2:17-18). (More about this next week.)



"The Tongue of the Wise Promotes Health"

There is much in Scripture that warns against and even condemns the improper use of our tongue. It certainly has the potential to defile our whole body, kindle a fire and curse men (Jas. 3:2-9). We should study carefully and heed closely the Divine admonitions, for we shall be judged by those

things which proceed from our mouths (Matt. 12:36-37).

However, there is much good that we can do with this little member. While it can "condemn" us, it can also "justify" us (Matt. 12:37). What sorts of things can you do on a daily basis with your words that can cause the lovingkindness of God to shine upon you? Remember that "the tongue of the wise promotes health" (Prov. 12:18). What can you say on a daily basis to promote health?

Say, "Please!" Name one person with whom you might interact who does not deserve every ounce of your respect. "Please" says that I am no better than you. It conveys humility and kindness, which is the law which ought to govern the Christian tongue. Make "Please" a regular part of your vocabulary.

Say, "Thank you!" Name one person who does not need to know that you noticed them and what they did. From the person who goes out of their way for you to the person

who is merely fulfilling their assigned obligation, every person deserves to hear you say express your thanks. In a day of "gimme" and "entitlement" attitudes, the Christian should stand out in his recognition of others. Make "Thank you" a regular part of your vocabulary.

Say, "Have a nice day!" Name one person who does not need a positive response from you. Even those who knowingly (and even unknowingly) say something that could poten-

> tially ruin your day deserve a pleasant word of encouragement. Perhaps you can be the one to turn someone's day around. Make "Have a nice day" a regular part of your vocabulary.

> Say, "I appreciate you!" Name one person who does not need to feel appreciated. The world around us beats us up one day and then beats us down the next day. Christians have an opportunity to

make a difference and build someone up, even folks who may be hard to encourage or might not deserve it in our minds. Make "I appreciate you" a regular part of your vocabulary.

Say, "God is good!" Name one person who does not need to be reminded that nothing else matters without God. These three simple words can help others to have a little light in their dark day or even open doors of opportunity to teach others. Make "God is good" a regular part of your vocabulary.

Does your tongue promote health? Give it a try!

There is much good that we can do with this little member!



"I'm too busy"

You may be too busy to even finish reading this article. How many times have you said it? Someone tries to make plans and you are "too busy" to do anything. Solomon wrote, "There is an appointed time for everything. And there is a time for every event under heaven" (Ecc. 3:1). Lately, there

doesn't seem to be enough time for anything and even less time for everything. What are we doing with our time? When we

If we look at a few numbers it might help us put things in perspective. The United States Department of Labor and the Bureau of Labor Statistics conducted the American Time Use Survey from 2003 to 2014. When the U.S. Government is not awarding grants on studying the effects of Swedish massages on rabbits or studying to see if

"hangry" spouses are more likely to stab the voodoo doll of their significant other, they are studying what we spend our time doing. (These were actual studies.) This study served to research what the average American household was doing with the 24 hours they were given each day. From the data collected, they made some interesting finds. This information includes people from 15 years of age and up. Employed individuals worked an average of 7.8 hours a day. On average, men spend 6 hours a day on leisure time, and women spend 5.2

hours a day on leisure time. Just to clear things up, men work .4 hours longer than women on average. That evens out on the leisure time. Individuals 75 years of age and above spend 8.1 hours a day in leisure time. Those with children under 6 spend about 8.4 hours a day providing some form of child care.

What did we learn? Employed individuals with children under the age of 6 spend 16.2 hours a day working and

taking care of children. Those that work and do not have children spend between 13 hours (female) and 13.8 hours (male) on work and leisure. Those that are over 75 can do whatever they want. We all have 24 hours in a day. Granted, we may have more or less time depending on our stage in life. Also, some jobs are more demanding than others. However, we tend to do those things that are important to us. When we say we are too busy, we are saying that it is really not a priority for

us right now. Those things that we make a priority are the things that we accomplish. I would encourage you to take a look at your calendar and see what your priorities are. Are they work, family, hobbies or time with the Lord and His people?

This is not meant to be a chastisement but rather a call to contemplation about where we are spending our time. Satan can make things look so important which, in the long run, will not matter. Thinking about our time and priorities in view of eternity helps keep things in perspective.
