Whatever Happened to Compassion?

The very thought of having Jesus as our mediator is overwhelming. The amazing distance between Jehovah God and a human seems like a chasm which cannot be crossed. Yet, Jesus did this very thing! He emptied Himself and took on the form of feeble, helpless mortals. He lived among us and having

showed to the Compassion is almost unknown among many in our society. The heartless slaughter of the people around unborn, the ruthless killings in schools and workplac-Him es and the beheading of "unbelievers" are all evidence of the absence of the godly nature of compassion. However, the problem is far greater than the extreme aspects of the heartless cruelties listed above. Study the life of Jesus and look at how often Jesus manifested compassion to those ordinary people around Him. Then, take time to look at yourself to find areas where you can be more compassionate like Him.

Jesus had compassion on the poor. In Matthew chapter 14, we read of the feeding of the 5,000. The very next day, Jesus rebuked the multitude because they only followed Him because they loved the loaves and fish He gave to them (John 6:22, 26). Yet, He fed 4,000 of them again. What is remarkable are the words found in Matthew 15:32. "I have compassion on the multitude, because they have...nothing to eat." So few of us would understand such compassion that He had on those whose motives were so wrong.

Jesus had compassion on scattered sheep. Mark records the feeding of the 5,000 and adds another thought to

> the compassion of Jesus. "Jesus when He came out, saw a great multitude and was moved with compassion for them, because they were like sheep not having a shepherd" (Mark 6:34). The Good Shepherd's heart was moved toward those who had no spiritual direction in their lives. Think about this and those "shepherd-less" people around you.

Jesus had compassion on widows. He was in village of Nain when He saw a widow ready to bury her only son. "He had compassion on her and said to her, 'Do not weep'" (Luke 7:13). There were those other religious leaders who saw helpless widows as a source of financial gain, even taking their houses from them (Matt. 23:14). Jesus' heart was so different from theirs.

So, take time to look at yourself. How compassionate are you to others? What changes do we need to make to have the compassion of Jesus?



What Is Your Vision for the Church?

All faithful Christians want the very best for the Lord's church. When Jesus commands us to "seek first the kingdom of God" (Matt. 6:33), we ought to find great joy in seeking to fulfill that charge on both a personal and collective level. With excitement and heartfelt devotion we can sing, "I love

Thy kingdom, Lord, the house of Thine abode; The church our blest Redeemer saved with His own precious blood; I love Thy church, O God!" What would

What would you like to see the church doing in the coming years? What sorts of things come to mind?

You might say, "I'd like to see the church grow more." I think all of us have that vision for the church. In some places, it is concern for the very continued existence of the church. In other places, it is concern for the dwindling numbers. Question: If that is your vision for the church, what are YOU doing to help the church to grow?

You might say, "I'd like to see the church be more friendly." Who could argue with that? Have you visited a congregation, where you walked in and walked out and no one spoke to you? There is definitely a need for more friendliness. Question: If that is your vision for the church, what are YOU doing to be more friendly, especially to visitors?

You might say, "I'd like to see the church even more devoted to Bible knowledge." This should definitely be a high priority today. With all that is happening in the religious world, political world, legislative world and entertainment world, the church needs more than ever you like to see to know the Bible. Question: If that is your vision for the church doing the church, what are YOU doing to be more Biblecentered and increase in knowledge yourself?

You might say, "I'd like to see the church be years? more concerned about each other." Sometimes such emphasis can be placed on world missions or helping the poor or attending services (which are all good and necessary activities for the Christian) that some local members may be neglected. We need each other. We need love and encouragement from each other. Question: If that is your vision for the church, what are YOU doing to show love for fellow Christians?

A stronger, healthier, loving, growing church starts with you. It doesn't start with better programs. It starts with you. Remember—what is it that a little leaven does?

Dangerous Lies That Lead to Infidelity



There was an old, stocky, raspy-voiced man named Rock, who used to work in a lock shop. He was a hardworking man, who did whatever his supervisor asked him to do. One of his most memorable tasks was the day he was asked to collect screws in the warehouse.

Apparently, the company was trying to save money and time for an in-house building project requiring screws. Rock's manager brought him into the warehouse and pointed to the high steel shelves. Then he asked Rock to remove all of the screws fastening the shelves to the walls. Rock diligently got out a ladder and went to work, moving right to left. With each screw removed, the shelves stood in place. Finally, he ascended the ladder and removed the final screw on the last shelf. As he looked at the final screw in his hand, the last shelf leaned and crashed into the one next to it. The rest went down like thundering dominoes discarding all of the contents in an enormously mangled mess. The manager came running in to find a pile of destruction. Behind the debris was Rock standing sheepishly on a ladder holding one screw in his hand. They stared at each other until Rock broke the silence, "This is your fault."

Marital affairs rarely happen randomly. They result from believing and justifying lies. In marriage, believing lies is like removing the fastening screws. It is dangerous, causes bad decisions and leads to broken marriages. Exposing lies for what they are keeps us from falling into their traps and knowing the warning signs of infidelity can keep the dominoes from falling. Here are some dangerous lies that lead to infidelity.

Lie: "I deserve to be happy." Marriage is actually not about happiness. It may be a part of it at times. The problem is that this attitude is selfishness, plain and simple. When this attitude is nurtured, spouse blaming becomes routine; bitterness is right around the corner. The list of negative qualities in the spouse gets longer and longer. All it does is attempt to justify the selfish attitude so the person is free to chase happiness or the greener grass. Marriage is about dying to self, and then giving and loving in good times and bad. That's why it's so difficult, but also so rewarding.

Lie: "There's nothing wrong with a little flirting." It's exciting. When someone finds you sexually attractive, it feels good, particularly when you feel the same way about them. No one wants to lose that feeling, they want it to continue. So they justify it by telling this to themselves accompanied by: It doesn't mean anything. It does. It's hurtful to the spouse because it trains the heart to wander. It's natural to have those feelings, but playing with them gives the wrong person an improper place in the heart. Flirting is like entering a river with a powerful current that ends at a large drop off.

Lie: "What she doesn't know won't hurt her." This attitude can take root in the person doing something they know would make their spouse upset. They recognize it's wrong and probably feel guilty, but don't want to stop. In an attempt to make themselves feel better, they simply tell themselves: It's not like I'm hurting anyone. It does hurt. Secrets cause disconnection. Spouses can intuitively sense when there is distance, no matter the degree. They may not address it, but they sense it. Believing a lie like this is just the beginning of allowing disconnection to enter the relationship. The distance just gets wider and wider until this person connects to someone else.

Lie: "I have sexual needs." Food is a need. Sex is not a need, it's a desire. An attitude such as this one gives sexual urges too much power. It is also a subtle way to justify pursuing sex outside of marriage. Once it's justified in the person's heart and mind, acting on it becomes easier.

Lie: "Our marriage problems are HIS fault." Marriage relationships consist of two people. One person might be more responsible, but not completely to blame. This is a convenient way to avoid responsibility. Anytime a person avoids responsibility, blames others, or justifies themselves, they become colder. Walls of defense get fortified and the separation begins. Note: There are occasions where one person is completely to blame, but those are rare.
