Reproductive Rights in the Church

We not only

have reproduc-

tive rights, we

have reproduc-

tive obligations!

The truths found in the Bible never become obsolete. They speak to us just as timely as they did to those who first read them. Truth simply does not change, and each of us has an obligation to ensure that our treasury of eternal truths is shared with others. This truth is so clearly stated in Paul's

epistle to Timothy, his son in the faith. "And the things that you have heard from me among many witnesses, commit these to faithful men who will be able to teach others also" (2 Tim. 2:2).

If God had intended for there to be ongoing revelation for every generation until the return of Jesus, there would have been no need for anyone to teach anything to others. The Divine plan was obvious. Truth would be revealed supernaturally as the

church began, but there would be a natural continuation of truth as each generation taught the next.

Paul recognized that the end of his life was near as he wrote this second epistle to Timothy. He had finished his work, and the crown of righteousness awaited him (2 Tim. 4:6-8). Timothy's work was not ended. Having heard the truth, he had to be committed to learning it precisely. It then became his responsibility to find faithful men and give the message to them. These men were to be faithful. They were to be trust-

worthy in their responsibility. Like Timothy, they had no right to add anything to what had been given to them. They had no right to remove or change the message in any way. They were simply to take the message from the first century and begin a chain of unending and unchanging truth to be given to every generation until the end of time. It is worthy to note that the word "man" used by Paul is not the word indicating males. It is the word anthropos (from which we get our word

"anthropology"), indicating that all mortals, male and female, are to be faithful in transmitting God's truths from one generation to another.

The church is reproducing itself. Older Christians are to teach younger Christians. Older women are to teach younger women. Elders are to insure that younger men are being trained to replace them. The same is true of deacons, Bible class teachers,

godly husbands and godly wives. A failure to do this brings chaos and perils to the church. Those younger than us hear us teach and, perhaps equally important, they see how these truths are lived in daily situations.

We hear a lot about reproductive rights in our society. There is no area where this phrase has greater importance. We not only have reproductive rights, we have reproductive obligations. Think about this. What are you doing to reproduce the church in those around you?

Measuring Your Priorities

I want to ask a question that is one of those questions that often has the "automatic" or "expected answer" to it. "Well, of course, that's my answer. How could it be any different?" But, could you take a moment and evaluate? Could you take a moment and measure your answer

against God's yardstick? In other words, if God were asked the same question about you, how would He answer?

Here's the question: "What is most important in your life?" I know, I know. That is such a recurring and almost stereotypical question for a preacher to ask. But, don't think about it as a preacher's question. Think about God asking you that question. Think about the fact that it's one of those questions to which God already knows the answer before you give it. Will the answer that you give match the "actual" answer? The answer that God is looking for is not the one that would come from your lips and sound good, but the one that comes from your life.

To find the answer to what is most important in your life, God would look at how you spend your time. That would tip Him off right away. We have more control over our time than we might accept or admit. Measure out the 168 hours you have each week. Just by looking at how you use your

time, God would be able to tell right away what is most important to you. Would it be Him? Would it be His cause on this earth? Redeem your time and use it for God (Eph. 5:16)!

To find the answer to what is most important in your life, God would look at how you spend your money. He would know right away. Again, we have more control over our money than we might accept or admit. Look at every dollar you earn, have and spend. By looking at your bank account

and your receipts, God would be able to tell right away what is most important to you. Would it be Him? Would it be His cause on this earth? Take control of your money and use it for God (Prov. 3:9).

To find the answer to what is most important in your life, God would look at what you spend your time thinking about. Our thoughts are not unknown to God, but they are fully within our

control. By looking at what you think about, what you want and what occupies your heart, God would be able to tell right away what is most important to you. Would it be Him? Would it be His cause on this earth? Take control of your thoughts and focus them on God and His will (Prov. 4:23).

We spend our time on what is most important to us. We spend our money on what is most important to us. We spend our thoughts on what is more important to us. Using God's measuring rod, where are your priorities? Truly?



Living Water

You have probably seen this, a pool of shallow water that has no fresh source. This pool does nothing. It seems to be a petri dish of single-cell organisms and an unnamable slimy substance. It is not fit for use or consumption without serious rehabilitation. By Josh Blackmer This is what we call stagnant water.

Growing stagnant spiritually is a relatively easy process. There are no steps, no programs and no support groups. You simply do nothing. I am not assuming that you, the reader, are stagnant. It is so easy to become so and being aware of the possibility may prove to be a preventative measure.

God clearly has the expectation that we water or stagnant should grow. In Hebrews 5:12, "For though by this water? time you ought to be teachers, you have need again for someone to teach you the elementary principles of the oracles of God, and you have come to need milk and not solid food." We need to grow in our knowledge. In Hebrews 6:1, "Therefore leaving the elementary teaching about the Christ, let us press on to maturity, not laying again a foundation of repentance from dead works and of faith toward God." We need to grow in maturity. We do all of this by our close contact with the Word of God. In Ephesians 4:15, "But speaking the truth in love, we are to grow up in all aspects into Him who is the head, even Christ," and in 1 Peter 2:2, "Like newborn ba-

bies, long for the pure milk of the word, so that by it you may grow in respect to salvation." The Bible is clear that with the Word of God we are equipped for every good work (2 Tim. 3:16-17).

We know what God expects, but how do we do it? If we make regular Bible study a priority, things could change. If we would be at services every time the doors were open, thinks would change. If we were to actively seek out relation-

> ships with members of the church instead of people in the world, the water might become a little less stagnant. If we were to see people as souls needing Christ, our stagnant pool might be all the more clear. If we would strive to be pools of living water, our pool may be useful again.

When Christ was with the woman by the well, he told her, "But whoever drinks of the water that I will give him shall never thirst; but the water that I will give him will become in him a well of water springing up to eternal life" (John 4:14). We should be a source of living water to those around us. We are not a stagnant dead pool. We are sons and daughters of the Most High. He has given us the source to be an influence on our family, our friends, our coworkers and even each other. When we become stagnant, we do more than just damage ourselves. We become a foul, contaminated source instead of what God intended us to belight, salt and living water.
