Eyes of Faith Looking Outward

Walking

When one reads Paul's letter to Colosse in the King James or the New King James translations of the Bible, he finds a word not commonly used. Paul urged those saints to live holy lives by saying, "See then that you walk circumspectly, not as fools but as wise" (Eph. 5:15). The English word

"circumspectly" is a compound word with the first part being found in words like "circle" or "circumference." The second part of the word is used in the word "inspect." Paul was urging the Christians to be careful how they walked by always looking around them. Christians must use the eyes of faith to look outward. demands that we

Christians, look around you to see people. see all that is This is precisely what Jesus did. He was constantly around us aware of those around Him and the needs each of them had. He saw the woman taken in the act of adultery with eyes so different from those who so harshly judged her (John 8:3-7). He saw the grieving widow of Nain who was on her way to bury her only son (Luke 7:11-16). He saw little children whom others thought should not "bother" Jesus, and He strongly rebuked the way they looked at children (Mark 10:13-16). As you walk, make sure to see the people around you.

Christians, look around you to see lost souls. Jesus' disciples returned from Sychar, a city of Samaria, and found Jesus at the well where He had taught the Samaritan woman. Most Jews had strong racial prejudice toward Samaritans but not Jesus. The woman did not stay at the well for she returned to her city to tell them about the Messiah. They were coming out to meet Jesus when our Lord said to His disciples, "Lift up your eyes and look at the fields for they are already white for harvest" (John 4:35). The disciples had just been in the city but saw no souls, only food. As you walk, make sure you lift up your eyes to fields ready for harvesting!

> Christians, look around you for struggling brethren who need you. The church at Corinth had dealt with the brother who had taken his father's wife. They had come together and publicly given him back to Satan (1 Cor. 5:1-7). Their actions had caused the man to repent, but the church needed instructions about how to treat this brother who obviously

was struggling so much. Paul writes a second letter to them and talks about Satan's devises. Christians need to look around and see how Satan is working, particularly with weak brothers. How should we treat them? Paul says forgive them, comfort them and help them overcome their sorrow.

Fellow Christians, look upward to see all that is there, but never forget to look around you. The treasures await us, but to attain them, we must look around us!

Keep It in Context!

Has anyone ever taken you out of context? Have you ever said something and then that statement was later used in a way that you never intended? That has probably happened to most people at some point in their life. Isn't that frustrating! Is there anything more exasperating than someone mak-

ing it sound like you said something that you didn't say?

When you think about how unjust that is and how it makes you feel when it happens to you, consider how God must respond when people take His word out of context and make Him say what He never intended to say! Don't take this lightly, because God does not! Taking Him out of context is a serious offense! False doctrines and dreadful misunderstandings result when the context is ignored! Consider just a few examples.

When reading verses in the Old Testament book of Ecclesiastes, realize that the entire book has a context. Many a verse has been misunderstood and misused from that book because individuals did not know and/or respect the overall context of Solomon's revelation. Solomon had used the wide resources at his disposal to personally experiment with all facets of life, in order to find lasting satisfaction and the true meaning of life. The key to properly understanding the book is to understand that he is presenting his findings purely from a human (i.e., earthly) perspective. Thus, when he says, "I have seen all the works that are done under the sun; and indeed, all is vanity and grasping for the wind" (1:14), his emphasis is on the futility of human effort apart from God! That is why his conclusion is, "Fear God and keep His commandments, For this is man's all" (12:13). Keep it in context!

> When reading verses in the New Testament book of Revelation, realize that the entire book has a context. Many a verse has been misunderstood and misused from that book because individuals did not know and/or respect the overall context of the revelation. John wrote to the seven churches of Asia that which Jesus revealed to him—"things which must shortly take place" (1:1). "Must" means must. "Shortly" means shortly. Jesus "sign-i-fied" His revelation to

John (1:1), by revealing it in "signs" and symbolic language (not to be taken literally). When that key to the book is understood (i.e., that the book is written in figurative language) and then properly applied, it will prevent (and demolish) many false doctrines that rely on a literal translation of the book, including even the numbers in the book. Keep it in context!

Don't you hate it when someone takes you out of context and makes it sound like you said something you never said? How do you think God responds when it is done to Him?

Don't Be Beige

ple who are content to blend in. These people walk through life like beige socks, uninspired and bored. Then, there are those who expect more. They are exciting; Be tra they have pizzazz."

This made me think about the "beige" Christians out there. You know the ones I'm talking about.

Those that are just there. They go through the motions, but there is no life in them. They are the ones that sing "I'm Happy Today" with neither a smile nor a frown. They know just enough to be intellectually plugged into Christ. Yet, they think very little about how their lives are woven into the large tapestry of God's redemptive plan for mankind. When Jesus cried out, "It is finished!" in John 19:30, the plan was complete, but the story did not end. We have a part in that eternal story!

then the Romans, there was little time for boredom. Paul records some of his challenges in 2 Corinthians 11:21-28, some of which are not recorded anywhere else but in this passage. His life was not boring. As followers of Christ, our lives will stand out in contrast to the social norms and accepted morality of the day. Jesus calls us light in the Sermon on the Mount, "Let your light shine before men in such a way that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father who is in heaven" (Matt. 5:16).

The power to rebuke

When properly applied, the action of "rebuke" involves one, who is in a position of authority, severely censuring another. The Greek word for "rebuke" (epitimao) is found in 29 verses of the New Testament, and interestingly, 27 of the 29 verses are in Matthew, Mark and Luke.

The Bible tells us that Jesus "rebuked the wind" (Luke 8:24). Isn't that a cool thing to think about Jesus doing? He didn't just calm it. He rebuked it! The Bible tells us that Jesus "rebuked the fever" with which Peter's motherin-law was suffering (Luke 4:39). Again, what a thought! He didn't just reduce the fever. He rebuked it! The Bible tells us that Jesus "rebuked the unclean spirit," to show His power over the demonic world (Luke 9:42). I like how the KJV reads in Matthew 17:18--"He rebuked the devil." Jesus has authority over the devil!

The next time the storms of life surround you, the next time the fever of anger begins to boil within you, the next time the devil seems to have hold of you, remember that Jesus has the power to rebuke all evils from your life and bring about His wonderful peace! -- DS

Equipping & Edifying Families

10 Ways to Fight Fair With Your Spouse



Do you know the difference between peacekeeping and peacemaking? Peacekeeping is about avoiding conflict at any cost. It's ultimately a selfish motive because the status quo is desired above all else. Peacemaking understands conflicts can be a healthy stepping stone to an improved relationship. It seeks time and effort to resolve problems, not ignore them.

So are you a peacekeeper or peacemaker in your marriage? One leads to relational decline. The other to relational strength. Give peacemaking a chance by following these 10 fair fighting rules.

1. Be kind.

Kindness may well be the strongest card you can play in a disagreement. Conflict can be defined by hostility and contempt or it can be defined by kindness and respect. The choice is yours.

2. Use "I" statements.

Take ownership of your feelings and actions rather than blaming your spouse. "I need some help because I keep getting confused about the kids' schedule," works better than "You're always late. I'm sick and tired of it."

3. Make an appointment.

Try a loving handwritten note: Let's talk about last night...I need to apologize... I'd like us to have a calendar planning session...There's something I need your help with... I've screwed up and we need to fix this...

4. Stay on topic.

Laying out an annotated history of your spouse's shortcomings is counterproductive and simply fuels the fire. When fighting, don't wander into other unaddressed issues before the current one is resolved.

5. Resist the urge to keep score.

Score keeping assumes a winner and a loser. The point of fair fighting is to promote the relationship. There are no losers when the relationship is strengthened.

6. Take the high road.

Always respond gracefully, particularly in the face of disgrace. Returning fire is a shortcut to escalation. The high road is the first step toward reconciliation. It sees conflict as an opportunity to grow.

7. Never devalue feelings.

It's okay to say, "I'm not sure it's helpful to accuse me of..." But it's always wrong to say, "It's stupid of you to be upset!" Acknowledge that your spouse is upset. "I understand your feelings are hurt." The pain, hurt, anger, disappointment, and anguish are all real.

8. The only person you can change is yourself.

It's difficult to be angry with someone who is humble. It's easy for anger to escalate when you only see shortcomings in your spouse.

9. Never use the children as leverage.

Enough said. Quick note: It's important for kids to know that you have reconciled. It's perfectly acceptable, and perhaps healthy, for your kids to see you in conflict. However, they need to know the final outcome and how it got worked out, otherwise they will live with anxiety.

10. Have rules of engagement.

Rules are helpful on so many levels. They recognize fighting as a natural part of the relationship. It formalizes the premise that you're not interested in playing the blame game and outline safe parameters for working out issues.
