Eyes of Faith Looking Inward

Paul's words that we should "...walk circumspectly" (Eph. 5:15) would be easily understood by those who first read this in the King James Version. It simply means that as we walk we should be looking about and carefully considering all that is happening. It begins with us looking upward, to establish

the right relationship with God. Then we should also look around us, to see opportunities to let our lights shine before others. The first and second greatest commandments are summed up in these two actions. However, we must never forget the third direction to look—look inward.

We should look inward because it is the source of outward actions. The greatest commandment about loving God is tied to the core of our

souls. We are to love Him with all our heart, all our soul, all our mind and all our strength (Mark 12:30). Service to God without involving the entirety of the inward man misses the mark. Walking circumspectly (looking around us) demands we look inward to measure the depth of our devotion to the Master.

We should look inward because it is the entry step to becoming a perfect (mature) man in the eyes of God. James speaks of the extreme difficulty of controlling the tongue and then adds, "If anyone does not stumble in word, he is a perfect man, able to bridle the whole body" (James 3:2). Jesus said, "For out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaks" (Matt. 12:34). The road to spiritual maturity is obvious. Look inward, bridle the tongue, and spiritual maturity lies before you.

So this week as you commune with the Lord at His table, look inward to examine yourself as you eat and drink with Him (1 Cor. 11:27). Obviously, when we eat together, we

look backward to the cross remembering Him. We look forward to His return as we show His death, but involves far more perhaps most important is that self examination we do. In His wisdom He has given us a regularly appointed time to look inward.

> Paul also urged the Corinthians to look inward for another reason. "Examine yourselves as to whether you are in the faith. Test yourselves" (2 Cor.

13:5). Our walk with Him involves far more than knowing the faith, it demands we walk in it. Look inward! Are you walking in the truths of His word.

Our songs often describe our lives as we walk looking about. We may struggle and sing of our determination to walk one step at a time. Yet, we make each of those steps. One day the final step will be taken and that step is into our eternal home. God help us to "... walk circumspectly."

It is fascinating to read about the apostles laying hands on early Christians, in order that they might receive a miraculous endowment of the Holy Spirit (Acts 8:14-18). It is exciting to know that a variety of these gifts were thus imparted, including the work-By David Sproule ing of miracles, healings, prophecy, tongues,

The question that must be answered is-are miraculous, spiritual gifts still in existence today and of God came, the being exercised by followers of Christ? Scripture is our only source of authority to answer this question, and the most extensive section of Scripture that discusses spir-

itual gifts is in First Corinthians 12-14. While we think of chapter 13 as extolling the greatness of love, the emphasis of the chapter is the abiding nature of love in contrast to the temporary nature of spiritual gifts.

Scripture emphatically affirms the end of the spiritual gifts. While "love never fails," the miraculous endowments of the Spirit would "fail," "cease," "vanish away" and "be done away" (13:8-10). God could have combined these thoughts and just used one word, but in order to emphasize His point, He accentuated the ending of the gifts multiple times.

Scripture emphatically identifies what was ending. Paul selects a sampling of the spiritual gifts listed in chapter 12 to specify for the readers what was actually "ceasing" and "vanishing away." God explicitly stated that "prophecies," "tongues," miraculous "knowledge," et al. would "be done away," and would not "abide" perpetually throughout the Christian age.

When the lation of the will

Paul's writing, he spoke in the present tense-"we know in part and we prophesy in part" (13:9). What they had in Paul's day was "in part." Look at the first gifts would cease two words of verse 10, "But when..." "But" emphasizes a contrast-the "in part" would not last.

"When" tells us when. "But when that which is perfect has come, then that which is in part will be done away" (13:10). The "perfect" was the "complete" of the "in parts." The revelation of God's will, at that time, was "in part." But when the "complete" revelation of the will of God came (i.e., the completed New Testament), the spiritual gifts would cease.

Spiritual gifts could only be imparted by an apostle and had a limited purpose for the days of "in part" revelation. But now, the miraculous gifts of the Holy Spirit have ceased!

Our walk than knowing the truth. Look inward!



You, O Man of God

The title "man of God" had an interesting usage in the Old Testament books. It was used in reference to men who were used in special ways for God. Moses was named a man of God (Deut. 33:1). It is easy to see how he was used for God. Samuel, the judge that anointed Saul and David, was a man of God.

King David, arguably the best king Israel ever had, was a man

of God (Neh. 12:24). Elijah and Elisha, the prophets, 17:24; 2 Kgs. 8:7). There were also other people who were not as well known as these that were named as men of God.

The parents of Samson had an interesting run in with an angel they assumed to be a man of God in Judges 13. After Samson's mother saw the

angel, she went and "told her husband, saying, 'A man of God came to me and his appearance was like the appearance of the angel of God, very awesome'" (13:6). Manoah, Samson's dad, also thought he was a man of God and offered him food (13:15, 16). It wasn't until the angel went up into heaven on the fires of the offering that they realized that this was an angel and not a man. This highlights an interesting concept: they saw the angel and thought first, "He is a man of God like the appearance of an angel, very awesome."

background and history that is tied to the title, man of God.

We can clearly see that the title "man of God" was a special thing. It was used for prophets, judges and a king. So when we look into the New Testament, we see that it is only used twice (both times by Paul in the letters to Timothy). We know Timothy, who was a young man when he started his journeys with Paul. He had grown up with a Jewish mother and grandmother teaching him the Law and the Prophets (2 Tim. 1:5). Paul writes to him, "But flee from these things, you man

of God, and pursue righteousness, godliness, faith, were both also among the men given this title (1 Kgs. We may miss the love, perseverance and gentleness" (1 Tim. 6:11). Paul never says here, "You are a man of God like the ones of old." However, this phrase is something that Timothy would notice, especially since it was used twice. "All Scripture is inspired by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, for training in righteousness; so that the man of God may be adequate, equipped for every good work" (2 Tim.

3:16-17). When we read these passages, we may miss the background and history that is tied to the title, "man of God." Timothy reads these letters and his mind goes back to the men of God that he grew up hearing about—the men that shaped his nation's history and God's redemptive plan. Now he would be named among them, as a special servant, a man of God. In the same way, we can take up that mantel today. These verses leave the door open to future men who would seek to be a special servant and named among the men of God.

Humanizing unborn babies

Did you see the Super Bowl commercial of a soon-to-be dad eating a bag of Doritos, while an ultrasound was being performed on his unborn child? The commercial showed the unborn child reaching for the Doritos in whatever direction the dad moved his hand.

Well, wouldn't you know it, somebody didn't like the ad. Specifically, a pro-choice group called NARAL tweeted that the ad used "antichoice tactic of humanizing fetuses." Yes, you read that right. There are people upset over the "humanizing" of an unborn baby. Think about that. Would they feel better if the un-

born baby was "monkeyized" or "lizardized" or "alienized"? How far has the abortion crowd gone that they cannot call an unborn child a "human"?

In order to defend an ungodly position that one is bent on staking out, that person must often reach to inexplicably irrational lines of argumentation. God views the human baby outside the womb as absolutely equal with the human baby inside the womb (Luke 1:41; 2:12, 16)! - DS

Have you received sight?

As He prepared to feed five thousand men, Jesus "looked up to heaven" (Mark 6:41). Think about that action, that posture, and its purpose. Looking up. When Jesus came to Bethsaida in Mark 8, He put His hands on a blind man, and the man "looked up" (8:24-25). It may seem simple, but again, think about that action of looking up. How could a blind man "look up"? In

> Mark 10, Jesus asked blind Bartimaeus what he wanted. "Rabboni, that I may receive my sight" (10:51). "And immediately he received **his sight**" (10:52). It is interesting to note that the very same Greek word that is translated "look up" is also translated "receive sight."

In the Bible, some who were physically blind "looked up" to heaven and "received sight." Those expressions are the exact same word in Greek, therefore, one could not receive his sight without looking up. Think, then, about the application. When one who is spiritually blind "looks up" to heaven, he "receives sight." We must look to Jesus (Heb. 12:2)! We must look into the word of God (Jas. 1:25)! We must look to the reward (Heb. 11:26)! Are you looking up? - DS
