Why Sheep Leave the Fold

God's people were destined for the Babylonian captivity, and the prophet Ezekiel continually reminded them of the consequences of all they were doing. In Ezekiel 34, he shows why some sheep leave the fold.

Many people think of the twentythird psalm as the "Shepherd's psalm." There

is another chapter we could rightly think of as the "shepherds' chapter." Ezekiel 34:1-6 addresses the responsibility of Israel's shepherds—if I were an elder I would read If I were an elder tified, many Christians come under the judgment of this chapter every month—but it helps us all see why | would read the | Christ who said, "Whoever causes one of these little some Christians (sheep) leave the church (fold).

Some sheep leave the fold because they chapter" every are sick. The cause of the sickness is not given, but people leave the Lord because of personal problems which makes it so hard to grow spiritually. It can so easily happen to new Christians, but it also impacts those who have been in the church for years. That's the nature of sin. It brings sickness and ends with death.

Some leave the fold because they are broken. This is much like those who leave because of sickness, but the word "broken" may indicate a more sudden onset of the "sickness." Jesus described the seed on the stony ground as the person who "...hears the word and immediately receives it with joy, yet...when tribulation or persecution arises because of the word, immediately he stumbles" (Matt. 13:20-21). Sin is powerful, and it can easily break the spirit of any of us.

Some leave the fold because they are driven away. Every sheep in His flock has a responsibility toward every other sheep. It is so tragic when older Christians' words and actions actually drive people away from the church. Ezekiel described them as those who "...have pushed with side and shoulder, butted all the weak ones with your horns and scattered them

> abroad" (34:21). While thinking their actions are jusones who believe to stumble, it would better for him if, with a heavy millstone hung around his neck, he had been cast into the sea" (Mark 9:42).

Some leave because they love goats. While month this is not specifically mentioned by Ezekiel, this truth is shown simply by seeing the attraction sin has to those who have returned to the sinful world after their salvation (2 Pet. 2:20). Paul speaks of how evil companions (goats) corrupt the godly. Some are not willing to seek new friends in His fold.

Each of us has a God-given responsibility to the rest of us. Whenever you see a brother or sister beginning to stumble, you cannot sit idly by and watch it happen. We have the great Shepherd who leads us and watches over us, but we must each feel a personal obligation to all of those in His fold.

Every Word in Acts 2:38 Is Significant

It is truly perplexing and inexplicable how so many well-meaning folks have been taught and convinced that immersion is not essential for one's salvation from sin. Of all the doctrines of the New Testament, that one is exceptionally clear, to the point that God considers it one of "the elementary prin-

ciples of Christ" (Heb. 6:1-2). Let us consider just one verse (Acts 2:38), and let us look at how the "small" words The "small" of the verse teach a "major" Bible doctrine.

"Them." The verse begins, "Then Peter said to them." Only the KJV and NKJV have the word, "Then," which is significant, but look at the word, "them." To whom is Peter speaking? He is answering a group of sincere Jews who had been "cut to the heart" and had asked, "What shall we do"? (2:37). There is no greater question! Therefore, Peter's response was

going to be THE answer to the most important of all questions!

"And." The word "repent" is understood (i.e., a change of mind that leads to a change of life). The word "baptized" is understood (i.e., immersion into water). The little word "and" is a copulative, coordinating conjunction, which joins two items of equal grammatical or syntactic importance. Therefore, repentance "and" baptism are inseparably connected in accomplishing their joint purpose!

"In the name of." This phrase was used by New Testament Christians and inspired men to emphasize that the authority of their words and actions was not their own. Peter and John were asked in Acts 4, "By what power or by what name have you done this?" (i.e., healing the lame man). Note carefully that the "name" by which they did this act was the "power" by which they did it. Peter replied, "By the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth...this man stands here" (Acts 4:7-10).

> Therefore, the act of immersion (and whatever purpose is assigned to it) is by the authority of Jesus Christ and not by any man!

> "For." The English word "for" is from the Greek preposition "eis," which is found over 1,700 times in the Greek New Testament. Every use of the word is always prospective, looking forward (and never looking backward in a causal sense to mean

"because of"). Greek-English Lexicons clearly define the word in Acts 2:38 to mean, "to obtain, to denote purpose, indicating motion into a thing, in order to, so that sins might be forgiven." Jesus used the exact same expression in Matthew 26:28, "This is My blood of the new covenant, which is shed for many for the remission of sins." Therefore, the "purpose" of immersion is "in order to obtain" the remission of sins!

The inspired answer equally necessitates repentance and immersion by Christ's authority for the remission of sins!



Lessons from Galilee: "I will make you become fishers of men."

Deny self,

It has been called by many names: Chinnereth (Num. 34:11), Lake of Gannesaret (Luke 5:1), Sea of Tiberias (John 6:1) and most commonly to us, the Sea of Galilee (Matt. 4:18). Measuring 13 miles north to south and 7.5 miles east to west, it is not sea By Josh Blackmer size. With an area of 64 square miles, it is

much smaller than the 730 square miles of Lake Okeechobee. What is so special about this lake? It was a central silent figure in the early ministry of Jesus. We will begin a series of lessons that highlight four major events that took place on this jewel in the desert.

take up the cross Jesus left Nazareth and began His Galilean ministry. Matthew reminds us of the prophecy from and follow Him. Isaiah, "...Galilee of the Gentiles. The people who walk in darkness will see a great light; those who live in a dark land, the light will shine on them" (Matt. 4:13-16; Isa. 9:1-2). Jesus began living in Capernaum of Galilee. He taught and did many miracles in the area. Early in His time there, we have the second calling of four fishermen. John records that these men had been called in Bethany and were with Jesus even at the wedding feast in Cana of Galilee (John 1:35-2:2). We do not know the circumstances as to why they went back to fishing. We know that they did the same thing after Jesus' death (John 21:3). The events of this rabbinical style calling are recorded in Matthew 4:18-22; Mark 1:16-20 and Luke 5:1-11.

Matthew and Mark give us a very abbreviated version of the event. The disciples were on the shore of the lake mending their nets. Jesus asked to use one of the boats to teach from. The crowd was pressing Him and the water provided natural amplification. After the lesson Jesus, instructs Simon to launch into the deep water and let down the net for a catch. Simon Peter let Jesus, not a fisherman, know that they have fished all night, the best fishing time, and caught nothing.

> However, because of who Jesus is, Peter obeys. Peter makes one of the biggest catches in his life. The net begins to break and James and John were called over in their boat, and the catch was so large that both boats began to sink with the load of fish. They were overtaken with amazement and Peter threw himself at Jesus's feet and essentially said what Isaiah had said, "Go away from me Lord, for I am a sinful man!" (Isa 6:5; Luke 5:8). This is when Jesus calls

them into the rabbinical styled relationship as their teacher, "I will make you to become fishers of men" (Luke 5:11).

All three accounts tell us that they leave everything (boat, nets, father and fish) and follow Jesus. Accepting this relationship was an honor and it meant that they would accept His teaching and interpretation of the law. When we chose to follow Jesus, we did the same thing. We left the old man of sin (Rom. 6:6) to follow His word (John 12:48). We must deny self, take the cross and follow Him (Matt. 16:24).


