It is obvious that God did not remove Himself from the world when Adam and Eve turned away from Him. It is obvious that He did not remove Himself from the world when Noah's generation totally forgot about Him. It is obvious that He continued to be a part of the nation of Israel when His

chosen people so often left Him. God longs to be a part of His creation. The tragedy is that His creation often does not want to be a part of God and His holiness. Has God re-

God's eternal plan was to establish the church. What might not be immediately obvious is that from the time sin entered the world His plan was to ultimately find its perfection in the coming of Jesus and the establishment of the church. Paul describes it using these words, "That in the...fullness of

the times He might gather together in one all things in Christ" (Eph. 1:10). Both Jew and Gentile were to be reconciled "to God in one body through the cross" (Eph. 2:16). His plan was to establish His one body and that body is the church (Eph. 1:22-23).

God's eternal plan was for the church to reveal Him to all mankind. The beauty of this plan is seen in the Sermon on the Mount. In the beginning of the Savior's work, He talked about the attitude His followers should have. They were to be poor in spirit, to be meek, to hunger and thirst for righteousness, to be merciful, to be pure in heart and to be peacemakers. When those who followed Him had embraced these beatitudes, they would become the salt of the earth and the light in His world.

God's eternal plan was for you to reveal Him by being the salt of the earth and the light of the world. This is where each of us must realize that while we might think our

> lives do not matter, God does not see it that way! He never removed Himself from the world, and He has no intention of removing Himself today. The only way this plan could fail is for us to remove ourselves from the world. We must not let Him down!

land? That de-God's plan is powerful, for both salt and light are powerful. Salt seems so small and so insignificant, but food without salt is "tasteless." Even the smallest light means so much in the midnight darkness. Hidden lights placed under a bushel are worthless, and salt "...if it loses its flavor is...good for nothing" (Matt. 5:13).

> Is God's plan working in America today? That depends on you! Think about this. What if every Christian in this land were exactly like you in the way you are seasoning and lighting the world? God longs to be a part of this great land, and His eternal plan to be a part of it includes each of us. God help us to be His salt and His lights!



There Is Only One Doctrine of Christ!

When the Holy Spirit readied Paul to pen his first letter to a fellow preacher regarding the responsibilities of an evangelist, what do you suppose would be a main point of emphasis in that letter? Immediately after the customary greetings, Paul wrote that he By David Sproule had urged Timothy to remain in Ephesus to

"charge certain men not to teach a different doctrine" (1 Tim. 1:3). God has defined His "doctrine" (i.e., His body of acceptable and expected teaching) and there is "no other doctrine" for man to seek, teach or believe.

Paul emphasizes this point (i.e., "the" singularity and defined nature of the doctrine of Christ) by employing the definitive article "the" over 100 times in the book of First Timothy. How important is the definite article? How can we know that its use iden-

tifies and specifies only ONE object? Consider these verses. "Now to THE King eternal, immortal, invisible, THE only God" (1:17). "We trust in THE living God, who is THE Savior of all men" (4:10). He is the THE blessed and only Potentate, THE King of kings" (6:15). How many Gods are there? How many Saviors? How many eternal Kings? ONLY ONE! The definite article identifies and specifies only one.

Now, consider the use of the definite article as applied to the doctrine of Christ and the Holy Spirit's charge that no other doctrine be taught. Some English translations will vary, but these numbers are based upon the New King James Version. Five times in First Timothy, Paul emphasized "THE doctrine" (1:10; 4:6, 16; 5:17; 6:3). Ten times he emphasized "THE faith" (1:2, 19; 3:9, 13; 4:1, 6; 5:8; 6:10, 12, 21). Five times he emphasized "THE truth" (2:4, 7; 3:15; 4:3; 6:5). Two times he emphasized "THE word" (4:5; 5:17). Once he emphasized "THE gospel" (1:11). Now, let me ask you a question: If

> the use of the definite article with "God," "Savior" and "King" identified and specified that there is ONLY ONE, how many acceptable doctrines (i.e., teachings) does God have when it is preceded by the definite article more than 20 times in one book? ONLY ONE!

The last chapter of the book begins in similar teach or believe. fashion to the first chapter of the book. Chapter 1 begins with a charge that "no other doctrine" is to be

taught. Chapter 6 begins with a condemnation of "anyone" who teaches "a different doctrine" (ASV) and "does not consent to wholesome words, even the words of our Lord Jesus Christ, and to the doctrine which accords with godliness" (6:3).

Friend, I plead with you. Let us all "come to THE knowledge of THE truth" (2:4) and "fight THE good fight of THE faith" (6:12). There is only one "doctrine which accords with godliness" (6:3). May we learn it, know it, love it, study it, teach it, defend it, live it and never be ashamed of it!

You come in contact with this almost on a daily basis. Every time you pump gas or buy fruits and vegetables weighed at the register there is a sticker from your friendly Florida Department of Agriculture. They inspect the systems that measure to make sure they measure accurately anything

that is sold commercially. According to their website, the state standards of length, mass and volume are directly traceable to the national standards maintained at the National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) in Gaithersburg, Maryland. So, while every state maintains the standardized units of measurement, they are also maintained on the national level. Why is this important you ask? "A false balance is an abomination to the LORD, But a just weight is His delight" (Prov. 11:1). "Differing weights and differing

measures, both of them are abominable to the LORD" (Prov. 20:10). It is clear that God does not like an unjust scale, and the state of Florida has that under control. What does this have to do with me?

We have been given a standard of measurement and have been charged with the task of handling it correctly. "Be diligent to present yourself approved to God as a workman who does not need to be ashamed, accurately handling the word of truth" (2 Tim. 2:15). Placed within your hand and heart

is the word of God and with it the responsibility of handling this unit of measurement correctly—to not add to or take away from the message of the book (Rev. 22:18-19).

With that in mind, have we ever acted unjustly in how we measure righteousness? Or how we measure the actions of others? Or how we measure and draw out the plans for the church? Or how we meter out love, forgiveness and grace? "For in the way you judge, you will be judged; and by your

standard of measure, it will be measured to you" (Matt. 7:2). "But if you do not forgive others, then your Father will not forgive your transgressions" (Matt. 6:15). It can be easy, because of our own desires, to set a secondary standard that is either above or below the standard that God has already set. In this, we can err.

In Leviticus 19:34-35, we read this exhortation, "The stranger who resides with you shall be to you as the native among you, and you shall love him as yourself, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt; I am the LORD your God. You shall do no wrong in judgment, in measurement of weight, or capacity." As if to say that one way they could love their neighbors as themselves is with just weights and balances. One way you show love to those around you is by practicing justice and truly measuring by the standard of God, not some arbitrary standard that you have set up. We must use this on a daily basis.

Concerned about my appearance

How much time and money have each of us spent on things that pertain to our appearance? We spend money on services and products for our hair, eyes, teeth, skin, nails, etc. We spend time bathing, cleaning, washing, brushing, combing, shaving, fixing, ironing, etc. There is nothing wrong with spending our money and time on things pertaining to our appearance, and most of us are thankful that eve-

ryone else is paying attention to how they look (and smell).

All of these things (and more) affect our appearance in the eyes of God? "For am I now seeking the approval of man, or of God?" (Gal. 1:10). That's a sobering question! — DS

There is a woman in the Bible who was described (by the Holy

Spirit, no less) as being "full of" something. Could that be a good thing? If someone were to describe you and used that phrase ("he/she is full of..."), how would they finish that statement? Would it be complimentary? Or would it be denigrating? Check this out: "There was a certain disciple named Tabitha...This woman

was full of good works and charitable deeds which she did" (Acts 9:36).

What would the Holy Spirit say that you are "full of"? What would your friends say that you are "full of"? What would your enemies say that you are "full of"? Are you full of good works? Are you full of kind words? Are you full of graciousness? Or are you full of yourself? Are you full of hatred and nastiness? When you're full of something, that is what naturally comes out! – DS


