You Are Never Alone!

Life is often so frustrating that we can easily forget the truth that the child of God is never alone. The last two chapters of the book of Acts so vividly illustrate this. Imagine that you are Paul on his way to Rome to be tried before Nero Caesar. Look at the contrast of the faith he had and how so many

would view all that was happening if they had been Paul.

Paul was not alone on the ship. I am not referring to those Christians who were traveling with him (even though they provided so much of the comfort God provides for His children), but about God's providential presence in these trying days of Paul's life.

It would have been so easy for Paul to quesalone! tion God in what was happening. The mockery of the trials he had endured kept him a prisoner in Judah. As far as Roman laws were concerned, the Roman governor, Festus, admitted there were no charges to be brought against Paul (Acts 25:25-26), and King Agrippa said, "This man is doing nothing deserving of death or chains" (Acts 26:31). Yet, here he was headed to appear before vile Nero.

Look at what was happening on board the ship. Paul could have been put in the charge of any Roman centurion, but he was assigned to the care of Julius. It should not surprise us that Paul found favor in the eyes of the centurion. Paul was not alone on the ship! Though a prisoner, he was given "shore leave" to be with the brethren at Sidon. Luke said, "Julius treated Paul kindly and gave him liberty to go to his friends and receive care" (Acts 27:3).

Paul was not alone during the storm. On this voyage to Rome, a violent storm arose and "...all hope that we would be saved was finally given up" (Acts 27:20). Life is so distress-

ing, but at such times, we must remember that Chris-God's providence tians are never alone. In the darkness of night, an angel of the Lord appeared to Paul with the message of hope. What we may overlook is that the angel had been with Paul all the time he was on the ship (Heb. 1:13-14). We are never alone.

> Paul was not alone when shipwrecked. It should not surprise us that "...the natives showed us

unusual kindness...and made us all welcome" (Acts 28:2). It might be worth considering if the presence of God's children might have something to do with this special treatment. Christians are never alone!

Now, step back from looking at this brief period of Paul's life and think about God's presence in your life. God does not keep us from being wronged by others or from "shipwrecks" in our lives. His providence works in another way. His plan involves this eternal truth—you are never alone!

- I am missing out on drawing closer to my God!
- I am missing out on communing with Jesus!
- I am missing out on showing my love to God by giving!
- I am missing out on being fed from God's Word!
- I am missing out on hearing my brethren say, "Amen!"
- I am missing out on hearing my brethren sing!
- I am missing out on seeing my brethren smile!
- I am missing out on enjoying some sweet fellowship!

- I am missing out on growing in my faith and devotion!
- I am missing out on encouraging my brethren!
- I am missing out on being uplifted by my brethren!
- I am missing out on the best handshakes and hugs!
- I am missing out on being around the greatest people!
- I am missing out on experiencing a foretaste of heaven!
 - I am missing out on starting my week off right!
- We miss a whole I am missing out on what really matters!
 - I am missing out on being in God's presence!

There is no way to fully capture or itemize every blessing that a Christian enjoys and shares when he assembles with his Christian family. But, we must come to understand and appreciate that we miss a whole lot more than just "a service" when we

choose to not assemble with the church. We miss out on the only thing that matters in this life! How successful could I be in convincing someone else (let alone God Himself) that Christ and His church are FIRST in my life if I allow other things (which are NOT first) to take precedence over my so-called "First"?

But here's something encouraging to consider. When I do attend worship services every week, I get to experience everything listed above (reverse each one) that others are missing. Go back. Read each item above. And rejoice!



The Dark Night of the Soul

"Jesus has a very special love for you. As for me, the silence and the emptiness is so great that I look and do not see, listen and do not hear" (Mother Teresa, 1979). Born Agnes Bojaxhiu, most know her as Mother Teresa of Calcutta. Dubbed "The By Josh Blackmer Saint of the Gutters," the Catholic church

seeks to name her a saint in their church. With that attention, excerpts from her diaries and personal letters that were published in a Time Magazine article, Mother God is our refuge Teresa's Crisis of Faith (David Van Biema, 8/23/07), are coming to light again. and strength, A

"When I try to raise my thoughts to Heaven, very present help there is such convicting emptiness that those very in trouble. thoughts return like sharp knives & hurt my very soul. I am told God loves me and yet the reality of darkness & coldness & emptiness is so great that nothing touches my soul" (Agnes Bojaxhiu). Her personal correspondence suggests that this was a struggle that she had for more than 50 years before her death, and it never left her. A 16th century Catholic author named this malady of faith the "dark night" of the soul. We don't know the source of darkness that was in her. There could be several reasons: her devotion to a man-made institution (Matt. 7:21-23), emotional disability or depression. All of these could have played a factor in her deep despondency toward God. What we do know is that she was

someone the world thought was so close to God, yet she felt so far from Him. Are you ever in danger of feeling the same?

Consider these words of David. "As for me, I said in my alarm, 'I am cut off from before Your eyes'; Nevertheless You heard the voice of my supplications When I cried to You. O love the LORD, all you His godly ones! The LORD preserves the faithful And fully recompenses the proud doer. Be strong and let your heart take courage, All you who hope in the LORD.

> How blessed is the man to whom the LORD does not impute iniquity, And in whose spirit there is no deceit! I acknowledged my sin to You, And my iniquity I did not hide; I said, 'I will confess my transgressions to the LORD'; And You forgave the guilt of my sin. Selah" (Psa. 31:22-24; 32:2,5). Whether it is from guilt or lack of faith that we find ourselves separated from God, He is the one we need to turn to. "God is

our refuge and strength, A very present help in trouble" (Psa. 46:1).

If you are struggling with clinical depression, I would advise you to seek professional help. However, if you are dealing with matters of faith, you must draw near to God (Heb. 7:25; 10:22; Jas. 4:8). The words of God are a breath of fresh air to those who are weary in faith and long to be closer to Him in the comfort of trust. "This is my comfort in my affliction, that Your word has revived me" (Psa. 119:50, 25, 28, 82).

97% of conversations that start negatively...

It was recently noted by some researchers, who study the ins and outs of twenty-first century relationships, "If partners start a conversation in a negative manner, 97% of the time that conversation will end negatively." Haven't you known that to be true in your own experience?

Of course, God told us that about 3,000 years ago. Consider some of the heavenly wisdom on this subject. "A soft answer turns away wrath, but a harsh word stirs up anger...A fool vents all his feelings, but a wise man holds them back...A wrathful man stirs up strife, but he who is slow to anger allays contention...As charcoal is to burning coals, and wood to fire, so is a contentious man to kindle strife...It is honorable for a man to stop striving, since any fool can start a quarrel" (Prov. 15:1; 29:11; 15:18; 26:21; 20:3).

How should I start a conversation that I know could go negative? The key ingredients are agape love, humility, prayer and a good dose of James 1:19-20. Give these a try! - DS


