Purchased People Are Peculiar—Are You?

I remember when I was a child hearing Christians misuse the King James rendering of Peter’s words in 1 Peter 2:9. “You are a peculiar people.” Whenever there was a social misfit or a person “whose eyeballs don’t line up with the holes in his head,” someone would say, “Well the Bible says we are to be peculiar, and he is the “peculiarest” person I have ever known. They failed to understand that in 1611, when the translation was made, the word “peculiar” was used to describe those who have been purchased. However, Christians actually are different.

Christians are different in how they treat other Christians. Early in the second century, a Roman official described Christians and ended his description by saying, “But oh how they love each other.” We do. Each week when services end, I marvel at just how many stand for such a long time to visit with their brethren. The building is filled with love. So many times this has been expressed to me about the love you have for fellow Christians.

Christians are different in how they care for each other. We send cards to each other. We pray for each other, and this is seen so often in posts on Facebook when so many say to a hurting Christian, “I am praying for you.” We encourage each other. We exhort each other. We lift up when there is

adversity in our lives. We care for others because He cares.

Christians are different in the moral values which rule our lives. I recall a Christian whose boss told him to lie as to whether he was in the office. The Christian refused and said, “I will not tell a lie. You need to know that if I will lie *for* you, I will lie *to* you.” Our world is filled with liars, but Christians are different. We cannot seem to forget those closing words of Revelation 21:8. Our values are so different!

Christians are different in our views about marriage. We enter marriage with a view of the lifetime commitment to our mates. Even in the struggles which come in marriage, we rarely even think about the “D word”—it is not in our vocabulary. We have not bought into the world’s view of same-sex “marriage” because He who created marriage retains the right to define it!

Christians are different in how we are entertained. We do not spend time like others who “rejoice in iniquity” (1 Cor. 13:6) nor do we find pleasure in seeing the world’s ungodliness (Rom. 1:32). The choices we make about recreation are not the same choices our friends make.

Let’s face it—Christians are different. Because of this it might pay you to see if your salt and light are salt without savor or lights hidden from the world. If your friends do not see you as “peculiar,” you might should make some changes.

Save Face: Close the Mouth

How often do our mouths get us in trouble? All too often, I’m afraid! These fires of deadly poison (Jas. 3:6, 8) have tremendous power (Prov. 18:21) and will have a tremendous impact on our eternal destinies (Matt. 12:36-37).

In this technological age, our “words” are not limited to the utterances that come from our vocal cords, but they include the communications that come from our finger tips (and thumbs) when in contact with a keyboard. In the world in which we live—with instantaneous news, quick-to-judge media, viral social media posts, and the wide-open door for everyone to spout an opinion about everything—truly “sin lies at the door” (Gen. 4:7).

Fellow Christian, there is a verse that needs to be engraved deeply and durably upon our hearts. It might help if this verse was attached to our keyboards or etched into the screen on our mobile devices. How often do we hear, see or read a piece of information and almost instantaneously find ourselves sharing a post, commenting or just taking to the social media world with our own rant and diatribe about the matter? We do this all too frequently and without ALL of the information! Our all-wise God said, “He who answers a matter before he hears it, it is folly and shame to him” (Prov. 18:13).

Too many Christians are engaging in foolish and shameful messages. God says that it is folly for someone to speak about something when he does not have all of the information and has not heard or considered both (or all) sides of the matter. Brethren, the media will rarely ever tell you the whole matter—sometimes unintentionally, often intentionally. There is always an element to a story that we don’t know. To spout off without full understanding is an expression of shameful foolishness, both in the eyes of man and (more especially) in the eyes of God.

The Lord gave these very helpful instructions to Israel—If you hear someone saying something, “then you shall inquire, search out, and ask diligently. And if it is indeed true and certain,” then appropriate action can be considered (Deut. 13:12-14). This is a good rule to adopt in our own lives today.

It is not always a news or social media report. Sometimes a disgruntled coworker, a hurting friend or even a fellow church member will tell us about something that happened. Even if it is an appropriate conversation (cf. 1 Pet. 4:15), we must, we must, we must be “slow to speak” (Jas. 1:19) and let Proverbs 18:13 ring in our ears and in our hearts.

Want to save your marriage? Want to save your job? Want to save a friendship? Want to save the church? Want to save your reputation? Learn to restrain your words!

You shall inquire, search out, and ask diligently. And if it is indeed true...

“You, who unto Jesus for refuge have fled”

The concept of being a refugee would be hard for most of us to understand. Many of us have grown up in relative safety and security. The very idea that we would have to flee our homes, cities or country to protect our lives and those of our loved ones is hard for us to even imagine. Yet, all over the world that is a fact of life for millions. To leave their countries and to go to others that do not accept them or are hostile toward them is seen as trading one hardship for another.

David, the chosen of Israel, spent time as a refugee while fleeing from Saul. He spent a year and four months with the Philistines when he was running from Saul, “Then David said to himself, ‘Now I will perish one day by the hand of Saul. There is nothing better for me than to escape into the land of the Philistines. Saul then will despair of searching for me anymore in all the territory of Israel, and I will escape from his hand.’ So David arose and crossed over, he and the six hundred men who were with him, to Achish the son of Maach, king of Gath” (1 Sam. 27:1-2). It is for this reason that the Psalms are riddled with the concept of God as a place of safety and refuge. It is in 2 Samuel we have these words, “And David spoke the words of this song to the LORD in the day that the LORD delivered him from the hand of all his enemies and from

the hand of Saul. He said, ‘The LORD is my rock and my fortress and my deliverer; my God, my rock, in whom I take refuge, my shield and the horn of my salvation, my stronghold and my refuge; my savior, you save me from violence’” (22:1-3). This is also recorded in Psalm 18. While David was a man of war, his heart longed for peace and to be in a place of security.

A favorite song of mine tells of the refuge we have in Christ. “How firm a foundation, ye saints of the Lord, Is laid for your faith in His excellent Word! What more can He say than to you He hath said, You, who unto Jesus for refuge have fled?” The last stanza ends with strong confidence in our Savior. “The soul that on Jesus has leaned for repose, I will not, I will not desert to its foes; That soul, though all hell should endeavor to shake, I’ll never, no never, no never forsake.” This song ends with the sentiment of a passage from Hebrews, “I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee” (13:5).

So for you who seek a refuge, you can find no better place than in the love of God and our Savior. “For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor any other created thing, will be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord” (Rom. 8:38-39). Seek a relationship with God so that you may confidently say, “He is my refuge and my strength.”

Maybe we pick on Peter and Thomas too much

The apostles Peter and Thomas are sometimes remembered for only one thing—Peter’s denials and Thomas’ doubting. Hence, we sometimes give each of them a hard time for breakdowns in their faith. However, if that is all we know about these men, we do not actually know these men!



When Jesus predicted Peter’s three-fold denial, we sometimes focus on Peter’s hasty reply, “I will not deny You!” (Matt. 26:34-35). But, how did he lead into that vow? Think soberly about these words—“Even if I have to die with You...” Would you, could you have said that? Just a few months earlier, as Jesus intended to go and raise Lazarus in the perilous region where His life was being sought, Thomas declared (think soberly about these words), “Let us also go, that we may die with Him” (John 11:16). Would you, could you have said that?

We might give these men a hard time, but do we have that level of faith? Is following Jesus and being true to Him MORE important than our very lives? This demands a response. – DS

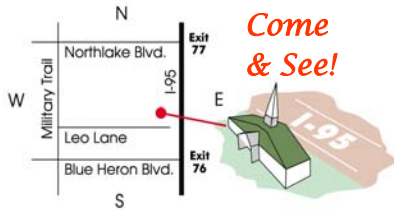
