"That's Not in My Bible"

I once heard of a Christian having a Bible study with a friend about what one must do to be saved. He opened his Bible and urged the friend to read several passages which clearly revealed God's plan of salvation. The friend's reply was, "There are none of these verses in my Bible." She went and

got her Bible, and she was exactly right. She had literally cut out every one of the verses from her own Bible and thrown away those which she did not like.

As strange as it might seem, this was not the first time this ever happened. Less than 20 years before Jerusalem was destroyed and taken into Babylon, Jeremiah was pleading for all men, even the king, to change and return to God. A copy of the book of Jeremiah was brought to King Jehoiakim and

read in his presence. "And it happened when Jehudi had read three or four columns, that the king cut it with the scribe's knife and cast it into the fire that was on the hearth, until all the scroll was consumed in the fire" (Jer. 36:23). His view was that if you do not like what God says just cut it out of the Bible.

Human nature does not change that much. While no one is actually cutting verses out of the Bible, their actions show that their hearts are so much like Jehoiakim. There are several ways to "cut verses out of the Bible."

There are some who, knowing that God would not approve of what they are doing, simply just never read the Bible. When encouraged by others to come to worship, they are adamant in the way they respond. They just cut God out of their lives.

There are also those who read the Bible trying to find verses which justify what they have decided is right. The Bible talks of those who read the Bible and then twist it to suit their

> own ideas (2 Pet. 3:16). While they do not literally have the scribe's knife in their hands, they have one in their hearts.

> Do you want to know His will for your life? Come to His word and "...hunger and thirst after righteousness" (Matt. 5:6). Remember His promise, "You will seek Me and find Me when you search for Me with all your heart" (Jer. 29:13). Jesus said it this

way, "If anyone wills to do His will, he shall know concerning the doctrine" (John 7:17).

Our hearts must be so different than the heart of Jehoiakim. Paul speaks of that person who, with an open heart, comes to the Bible and reads about Jesus. As he looks at the image of Jesus, he is changed into that very same image by the Holy Spirit of God (2 Cor. 3:18). Do you want God to change you? Then open your Bible and honestly seek Him, but make sure you do not have a scribe's pen in your hand!



Keep It in Perspective

Have you ever had a bad day as a Christian? Have you ever suffered some slight, some insult, some mild form of persecution because of your faith? ("Mild" in comparison to what we read of New Testament Christians suffering.) Have you ever allowed that experience to be magnified out

of proportion to the point that it became "the worst thing ever" or a "faith-debilitating attack"?

May I suggest that we keep things in perspective? First of all, contrast what we endure as Christians with what the apostle Paul endured. He was "afflicted in every way...persecuted...struck down...in stripes above measure, in prisons more frequently, in deaths often" (2 Cor. 4:8-9; 11:23; cf. v. 24-27). What we endure is not worthy to be compared with what the faithful of old endured!

More importantly than a contrast with Paul, we need to keep things in the same perspective as Paul did. Regardless of what he suffered, Paul announced, "Therefore we do not lose heart. Even though our outward man is perishing, yet the inward man is being renewed day by day" (2 Cor. 4:16). What determination! What contentment! Two verses later, he continued, "While we do not look at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen. For the things which are seen are temporary, but the things which are not seen are eternal" (4:18). Now that's keeping things in perspective!

But, I want you to consider the verse in between these two verses. Notice carefully the outlook that Paul kept in the midst of all that he endured. "For our light affliction, which is but for a moment, is working for us a far more exceeding and eternal weight of glory."

> Paul referred to his excessive persecution as affliction which was (1) momentary and (2) light. We wouldn't think of it that way, but Paul did! Momentary (i.e., for a limited and short time) and light (i.e., easy to bear)! We need to adopt that mentality!

Then, he said that these afflictions were not working against him but they were working for him! working for him! They were producing something far greater than

could even be described! Rather than focus on the "affliction," Paul focused his attention on the "glory" awaiting—a "glory" that was (note the sharp contrast) (1) eternal (not momentary) and (2) weighty (not light)! Paul uses a double expression to emphasize that this glory is "beyond all measure and proportion." There was no human way for him to describe the magnitude of the glory!

So, the next time that we have a bad day as a Christian, let's put it into perspective and focus our attention on the awaiting glory that is "exceeding exceedingly" glorious!

Honestly look at the His image, and God will change you into that image!

Understanding God's Message

The story is told of a man who liked to just open his Bible and read the first verse that came to him as though it were a message of God directly to him. The first verse he happened to turn to was Matthew 27:5, which says Judas "went away and hanged By Josh Blackmer himself." Since he was not sure how this

verse applied to himself, he flipped to another passage and the Bible fell open to Luke 10:37, "Then said Jesus to him, 'Go, and do the same.'" The man was quite upset, and he did not know how he could ever obey that, so he decided to turn to one more place. Again, he opened the Bible at random and to his horror his Law say? How do finger fell upon John 13:27, "Therefore said Jesus to him, 'What you do, do quickly.'"

While this may be a humorous story, there are some who are coming to the Bible this way looking to find a message from God and are leaving more confused. Not because God was not communicating, but rather they did not know how to read the message. Have you ever thought, "How can there be so many different ideas about the same book?" Two groups can study the Bible and come away with contradicting claims of God's truth. When Jesus was asked a question by a lawyer, His response was, "What does the Law say? How do you read it?" (Luke 10:26). Jesus spoke well in asking how the lawyer read the law. Everyone is reading the same book, but not all are reading it the same way. There are some basic things that we can keep in mind when reading that will help us understand the message.

Is it in the old covenant or new covenant? The old covenant is no longer binding today (Heb. 8:13). While the information is important, it is not binding on us today as an ecumenical code. What is the immediate context of the verse? You would find that information by reading the chapter. Then,

> you will need to find the context of the book that it is in. You will need to read that book and see how that verse fits in the overall message. See if you can put what you have learned into the context of the overall message of the Bible. You will also need to determine what form of writing is being used. Is it poetry? Is it narrative? Is it figurative? Is it prophetic? All of these will be read differently.

Finally, direct commands, examples and inference play a part in ascertaining God's will. Direct commands are the "thou shalt and thou shalt not" type. Examples are taken as authoritative as we seek to mimic the "form of doctrine" that was originally taught and practiced (Rom. 6:17). Inference is that which is implied. God so loved the world, and I am in the world, therefore God so loved me.

All of these play a part in us understanding God's will. Properly used, they will keep us from hanging ourselves.

Are you poor, or are you rich? Do you feel poor, or do you feel rich? When we think of the terms "poor" and "rich," we have a hard time thinking of them in any context other than financial, but it is interesting how the Bible often will use those words in a personal and spiritual sense.

As Paul detailed the dichotomy of experiences, circumstances and conditions that he had faced in his ministry, he lists this one as the final one: "...as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing all things" (2 Cor. 6:10). Materially, Paul was poor and often relied on the help of others for his substance.

However, his economic depravity did not prevent him from leading others to spiritual prosperity. And, in reality, while he recognized that he had "nothing" from man's viewpoint, he also rejoiced that he possessed "all things" that really matter.

What about you? It is possible to be a rich poor man! But it is also possible to be a poor rich man! May God help us to be rich toward Him and enjoy His riches (Luke 12:21; Rom. 2:4)! -DS

10 Ways to Keep Your Kids From Doing Dumb Things



Children, to put it mildly, can do the dumbest things and, even a thirty-second lack in judgment can haunt our children for a lifetime. Here are a few helpful ideas to keep your kids from doing dumb things and, hopefully, ease your pain.
