Visual Manifestation That He Alone Is God

An American tradition is that if you have a rabbit's foot good luck will come your way. I am not sure where this idea originated, but mankind has so often looked to find a magic potion or icon of some sort that will help them in times of trouble—think of fourleaf clovers or crystals as examples of this.

The Jews thought they had the ultimate item to help them in the midst of trouble. When the Philistine army came against the Israelites, the Jews were losing the battle. What was their "rabbit's foot"? It was the Ark of the Covenant designed by God and which contained those tablets on which God had written the Ten Commandments. They brought it into the camp of Israel, believing it would help them win.

It didn't work! "The ark of God was captured" (1 Sam. 4:12). That ark had its purpose, but God never wanted it to be thought of as a good luck charm.

The Philistines could not decide what to do with the ark, but they finally decided it should be taken into the sacred house where their god, Dagon, was kept. The next morning their idol, Dagon, was found lying face down "bowing" itself before the ark of God. So, they stood Dagon upright again. Early the next morning they came into their temple, and this time Dagon had fallen again and his head and both of his hands were separated from his body. The only thing which remained was the torso of Dagon (1 Sam. 5:1-5). God then brought a plague of tumors on the Philistines, so they immediately sought to return the ark to the Jews.

Is there any significance to this story? Perhaps the words of Psalm 115 and 135 give insight. David described the folly of worshiping idols when he said, "They have mouths but they do not speak; eyes they have, but they do not see; they

> have ears, but they do not hear; nor is there any breath in their mouths." Dagon's shattered head and helpless hands visually showed the foolishness of idolatry.

> What does this have to do with us? While we may not think of America as having idols, Paul showed that whatever we covet after becomes our idol (Col. 3:5). It is tragic to see our nation thinking

that a man's life consists of how many material possessions he can get (check Luke 12:15). Houses, cars, luxurious clothing, electronics, traveling and vacations have become the gods of so many around us. These dominate our society so much we become like those who unknowingly are idolatrous.

Has not our God shown so many in the recent hurricane that these gods are unable to help us in the midst of the storm? By the way, just remember that the rabbit's foot did not help that crippled rabbit who still has three lucky charms!

When a cardboard box contains delicate materials, the outside will often be stamped, "Handle With Care." There are some Bible subjects like that—requiring care when handling. But it is important to remember that "Handle With Care" does not mean "Don't Touch and Stay Completely

Away"—as applied to a cardboard box or a Bible subject.

The subject of sexual relations within marriage is one of those subjects (1) that makes us a bit uncomfortable, therefore, (2) we stay away from it and (3) often miss the beauty that God wants us to see and understand. The first several verses of First Corinthians 7 provide some insight and instructions husband and his into the physical relationship between a husband and wife. All Christians (especially married ones and those who will one day be married) would do well to read them, understand them and apply them as necessary.

A husband and wife are the only ones who have a right to have sex with one another. The city of Corinth was morally bankrupt and sexual immorality (illicit sexual intercourse) was common. Paul explained that one reason for a man and woman to marry was to enjoy sexual relations and avoid sexual sin. Let each have "his own wife" and "her own husband" is describing God's plan for a married man and married woman to enjoy each other sexually.

A husband and wife have a mutual responsibility for sexual relations within their marriage. "The husband must fulfill his duty to his wife, and likewise also the wife to her husband" (7:3, NASB). Note the imperative—this is not a suggestion. Selflessness is to be practiced in a marriage, including when it comes to the marriage bed. Agape love, which permeates all aspects of marriage, "does not seek its own" (1 Cor.

> 13:5). Mr. Husband and Mrs. Wife, God tells you to fulfill your responsibility in your bedroom.

> A husband and wife have a mutual authority in their sexual relations. Mutual authority is not found in all parts of marriage (cf. Eph. 5:23). But, when it comes to God's special gift, the husband and the wife do not have "authority over [his/her] own body," but the spouse does (1 Cor. 7:4). Neither has

the right (authority) to refuse the other. This is not condoning force or bargaining, as there must be "consent" to engage and "consent" to restrain (7:5). But, every husband and every wife needs to read these verses carefully—you have a responsibility to fulfill your spouse's sexual needs whenever he or she needs those fulfilled, and you do not have the right to deny, for that authority over your own body is no longer yours.

God designed a precious bond only to be enjoyed by a husband and his wife! Let's be sure to "handle with care."



How to Deal with Difficult People

They are out here, lurking in unsuspecting places. They could be anybody—a boss, a coworker, a family member or any random person with whom you cross paths. Before you know it, you have encountered a difficult person. You are often times left won-By Josh Blackmer dering, "What was that person's problem?"

or "How could I have handled that situation better?" Before your next encounter with this person, please consider the following. With the focus

Jesus was no stranger to difficult people. It off of you, it is seems He attracted them like flies to a picnic. The less likely that gospels tell us several ways He handled them: rebuke (John 8:47), silence (John 8:6), questions (Mark 11:28 there will be -29), Scripture (Mark 10:2-3) and stories (Luke 7:40difficulty. 42). You generally can't go wrong with a WWJD approach to life. However, Jesus was able to look into the hearts of men and respond accordingly. While we may not be able to do the same, we are given some practical wisdom on the matter.

"But I say to you who hear, love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you. Whoever hits you on the cheek, offer him the other also; and whoever takes away your coat, do not withhold your shirt from him either. Give to everyone who asks of you, and whoever takes away what is yours, do not demand it back. Treat others the same way you want them to treat you" (Luke 6:27-31). Peter gives us similar advice, "Not returning evil for evil or insult for insult, but giving a blessing instead; for you were called for the very purpose that you might inherit a blessing" (1 Pet. 3:9).

The Proverbs also offer some insight into this plight. The wisdom found there would have us promote patience

> (Prov. 12:16). It would have us practice peacemaking (Prov. 20:3). It advises foresight in stopping the matter before it begins (Prov. 17:14). If possible, avoid contentious people (Prov. 22:24).

> While you are trying to "live peaceably with all men" (Rom. 12:18), here are some things to think about. Keep your communication with that person logical and fact based. Give them no reason to differ

with you. Make them the focus of the conversation. With the focus off of you, it is less likely that there will be difficulty. Stay away from hot topics and points of contention. Don't try to get them to see your point of view. The odds are that they will not. Abandon the idea of who you need that person to be. Accept them for who they are right now with no expectation of change. This can be very rewarding. Regrettably, we do have to interact with people like this. In all of this, never forget to pray and keep the fruit of the Spirit shining (Gal. 5:22-23).

Let the Bible define "love" for God

Do you love God? I hope that you do! What greater affirmation could be made? But, do you love God as God Himself defines what that love is?

God has promised that He "preserves all who love Him" (Psa. 145:20), "that all things work together for good to those who love God" (Rom. 8:28), and "the Lord has promised" "the crown of life...to those who love Him" (Jas. 1:12). But, do I love Him as He ex-

pects me to love Him?

Repeatedly in the Old Testament, it is established that God extends His mercy to "those who love Him and keep His commandments" (Deut. 7:9; 5:10; Ex. 20:6; Dan. 9:4). What did the Lord "require"? "To walk in all His ways and to love Him, to serve the Lord" (Deut. 10:12).

The same truth is affirmed over and over in the New Testament. "This is the love of God, that we keep His commandments" (1 John 5:2-3; cf. 2:4-5). "If you love Me, you will keep My commandments" (John 14:15, 24). Now that God has defined it, do I truly love Him? - DS

Husbands, what have you given up for your wife?

How often have you heard it said, "Marriage requires give and take"? I've said it myself in various counseling sessions. And, in some respects, we might say it's true. However, if you were asked to find a Bible verse for "giving" in marriage, could you do it? Very likely! But, could you find a verse for "taking" in

> marriage? That might prove a bit more difficult to find.

Husbands, as you reflect on your marriage, what have you given up for your wife? Some might say: "I've given up my dream job. I've given up my garage. I've given up my truck. I've given up

my Monday night football. I've given up my side of the closet." For a marriage to succeed, agape love must dominate in your relationship and in your home—a love that unconditionally and unselfishly seeks to meet your wife's greatest needs. You see, it's not about what "things" you've given up for your wife! The standard is much higher. Consider it carefully: "Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ also loved the church and gave Himself up for her" (Eph. 5:25). Jesus did not give up things; He gave up Himself. Have you done that for your bride? -DS
