Gaps in the Walls, Must Be Filled

The Bible is filled with illustrations from the lives of ancient times which are then used to make great spiritual applications. When God spoke to Israel through His prophet Ezekiel, He used the expression of "a man standing in the gap" (Ezek. 22:30). We may not readily see what this man was do-

ing, but it was well understood by the men in Ezekiel's day.

Men in the gap, breaches in the city walls and ancient warfare. The cities in the Old Testament were protected by walls, watchmen on top of those walls and fortified gates. The most skilled soldiers were posted atop the walls to ensure the safety of my soldiers were able to break down the wall and create gaps so they could enter and plunder the city.

When such emergencies occurred, it was imperative that someone, even if he was not a highly trained soldier, stand in that gap and protect the city at all cost.

Gaps in the wall around the city of Jerusalem in Ezekiel's day. This imagery was used by Ezekiel to describe what was spiritually happening to Israel. Spiritual gaps were in the walls, yet not one person was willing to do anything about them. There were political gaps. The rulers were self-centered and unashamedly taking bribes to become wealthy (Ezek.

22:27). There were religious gaps created by their leaders who used their positions to take the possessions of the people and oppressed the poor, especially widows (Ezek. 22:25). They also covered their actions by acting like they were working on these gaps and claimed to see visions from God (Ezek. 22:23-28). They were even making up messages and saying, "Thus says the Lord." Inside the walls there were the citizens creating "gaps" by oppression and robbery (Ezek. 22:29). The gaps were

> obvious, but nothing was being done to close them. God said, "So I sought for a man among them who would make a wall and stand in the gap before Me...but I found no one" (Ezek. 22:29).

There are gaps in our homes when parents are too busy to stand for what is right. There are gaps in the church when preaching has so little Scripture.

> God looks for those to stand in the gaps. They must be vigilant. They must be courageous. They must be focused and determined to stand at all costs.

> The question is whether you are willing to be that person to deal with the reality of gaps in the wall. Consider this. God is looking for just one person to stand in the gap. Godly men and women have stood in the gaps in the past. God is looking for a man to stand, and that person can be you!

Marriage was created by God to be the closest human relationship that a person could have while living on this earth. Thus, when it comes to questions about marriage—including the choosing of a spouse our source of wisdom and authority is not human or cultural but Divine! What does

God teach about who a person should marry, and more specifically, who a Christian should marry?

First, one must marry one of the opposite sex. Read carefully the distinction that God made between male and female and how His design for marriage involves one male to one female (Gen. 1:26 -28; 2:18-25; Mark 10:6-9).

Second, one must marry one who is eligible subject. to marry. God restricts those who can enter marriage to: (1) a person who has never been married (1 Cor. 7:28; 9:5); (2) a person whose spouse has died (Rom. 7:2-3; 1 Cor. 7:39); (3) a person who put away his/her spouse for fornication (Matt. 19:9).

Third, a Christian must marry a Christian, and more specifically, a faithful Christian. That statement may catch some off guard and even engender a sharp disagreement. But, let us consider some Biblical teachings and warnings on this subject and let Divine wisdom and authority lead us.

In the Old Testament, God warned the Jews not to marry outside their faith. They were not to "make marriages" with those who were not Jews, and He gave two specific reasons: (1) "For they will turn [you] away from following Me, to serve other gods," and (2) "For you are a holy people to the Lord your God" (Deut. 7:1-6; cf. Ex. 34:10-16).

In the Old Testament, God's warnings to the Jews (if they married outside their faith) came true. Although God

instructed His people to "not intermarry," Solomon did, and "his wives turned his heart after other gods; and his heart was not loyal to the Lord his God" (1 Kgs. 11:1-4). Many of the Jews later intermarried, "so that the holy seed is mixed," and they were punished for their "iniquities" and "guilt" (Ezra 9-10).

In the New Testament, God instructs Christians to marry faithful Christians. Christians are to "seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness" (Matt. 6:33), and to "not be unequally yoked together with unbelievers" (2 Cor. 6:14-7:1). Would these instructions not include the choice of a spouse? It was specified that widows and apostles could marry "only" a brother/sister "in the Lord" (1 Cor. 7:39; 9:5). Would this not also apply to all Christians?

God's design for marriage is for a husband and wife to be "heirs together of the grace of life" (1 Pet. 3:7). This requires that both be faithful children of God. It matters!

Who Is God to You?

There is a sign in front of you. On it are seven concentric circles. Each circle slightly smaller than the next and evenly layered in descending order to the centermost circle labeled "you." This sign represents the people in your life and their level of importance to you.

Spend time

The "you" in the center is not the you in the mirror or the you that everyone sees. It is the you mentioned in Jeremiah 1:5, "Before I formed you in the womb, I knew YOU." It is the most intimate and real you. No pretense or false bravado. No makeup or designer clothes. Just you. Each circle outside of you reprecenter, the more important it is to you.

Let's go through the levels. Level seven is perfect strangers. Someone you met on the street and of whom you have zero knowledge. Level six is acquaintances. You've met them, forgotten their name and know very little about them beyond that. Level 5 is co-workers and neighbors, people you are paid to be around or paid to live next to. Some of them are nice, but if it wasn't for the money, you wouldn't be around them. For some of them you question if the money is enough. Level four is friends. They are people you choose to be around. They are beyond just nice people. You actually enjoy their company. Level three is family. We are back to not getting to choose this group, but you are obligated to do your best. These are people you are related to by birth, and they probably have some embarrassing stories to share about you. Level 2 is saved for immediate family. They do know you, and you know them. You may get cross from time to time, but there is nothing you wouldn't do for them. Level one is you your favorite person. It is important to note that some people

can be in more than one circle. For example, you may have a friend that is closer than immediate family, or you may have family members that are just acquaintances.

getting to know Where does God fit in your sign of circles? sents groups of people in your life. The closer to the God in His word. Who is God to you? For many people, the answer is different. If you know nothing about God, then He is a stranger. If you think He exists but know nothing about Him, then He is merely an acquaintance. You can see where this is going. The more mature and deep the relationship, the closer you are to God and the closer He is to you. You have friends that you could spend hours with and never knew time passed. But sometimes, in worship or prayer, every moment is an eternity. When, where or how we worship will not change how close you are or are not to God. Spend time getting to know God in His word. 


