

"Herod, it IS lawful for you to have her"

Some wrongly

teach that John

only

The unlawful marriage of Herod was the reason for the death of John the Baptist. The king had taken the wife of his brother, and the forerunner of Jesus could not remain silent. His message was clear and simple, "Herod, it is not lawful for you to have her."

The death of John the Baptist oc-

curred less than two years before the crucifixion of Jesus. A careful study of this event will help us have greater insight into what the Bible teaches. There are two concepts which are widely believed and which are shown to be wrong by the teachings of John.

should have said, Moses did not allow divorce for every "It IS lawful for cause. This idea was a popular view in the time of Jesus. When Jesus said, "It has been said, 'Whoever you to have her." divorces his wife, let him give her a certificate of divorce" (Matt. 5:32), He was contrasting what He said with what the Jewish leaders were saying. It was not a contrast with what Moses taught. A study of Deuteronomy chapter 24 will show that Moses did not allow a man to put away his wife for every cause.

If such were the case, then John was wrong. If God allowed divorce for every cause, then John was wrong in calling Herod's marriage a violation of the will of God. John should have said, "It IS lawful for you to have her."

Baptism cannot change an unlawful marriage into one that is lawful. Some teach that when one is baptized whatever person they are married to at that time immediately becomes their mate. There was no need for John to tell the king that his marriage was wrong. He should have taught him to be baptized for the remission of his sins (Mark 1:4), and the moment he came up out of the water the situation was changed. Before the king's baptism, Herodias was the wife of

Philip, but at his baptism she no longer was the wife of Philip but the wife of Herod.

John could also have taught Herod that while she is not your wife (even though you had married her-Mark 6:17), just wait a little over a year until Pentecost and your baptism then will change your adultery into a holy marriage.

A few years ago, I was in a meeting in Mississippi where the elders were about to withdraw from a sister who had an unscriptural marriage. When she understood that the elders' teaching was that one's baptism would make adultery become a marriage, she came forward and told the church she did not understand her baptism years ago. She wanted to become a Christian now by being baptized. It presented a crisis for those elders and for all those who think baptism makes it lawful for Herod (or anyone) to keep another man's wife. It is not that hard to understand.



"Life in His Name"

The magnificent gospel recorded by John comes to its climax and states its purpose at the end of chapter 20. John penned this gospel account in order to prove to his readers that "Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God," and to elicit a response of faith-filled By David Sproule obedience (John 20:30-31). His ultimate de-

sire for his readers was that through "believing [they] may have life in His name." What an interesting way to

say that! "Life" is available to those who believe, but only "in His name." What does that mean?

First, note that life is available exclusively "in His name." No one could read this passage and reasonably argue that life could be obtained any other way than "in His name." Thus, once we understand the Scriptural use of "in His name," we will have heaven's exclusive path to "life."

"Life" is tied to doing all things "in His name." Paul wrote to the church at Colosse, "And whatever you do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through Him" (Col. 3:17). In its twin epistle, Paul wrote again, "...giving thanks always for all things to God the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ" (Eph. 5:20). Doing all things "in His name" is essential to secure "life"!

"Life" is tied to preaching "in His name." In His Great

Commission, Jesus instructed that "repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name to all nations" (Luke 24:47). So that is exactly what we find all of the apostles doing in the book of Acts, as they "taught," "spoke" and "preached boldly" "in the name of Jesus" (4:18; 5:40; 9:27, 29). Preaching God's Word "in His name" is essential to secure "life"!

"Life" is tied to believing "in His name." The apostle John wrote of the necessity to "believe in His name" (John 1:12; 2:23; 3:18). Then we find this wonderful verse in his first epistle, "These things I have written to you "Life" is who believe in the name of the Son of God, that you available

may know that you have eternal life" (1 John 5:13). Believing "in His name" is essential to secure "life"! "Life" is tied to being baptized "in His "in His name"! name." While some folks today would never tie "life" to "baptism," Scripture makes it abundantly

clear that God does. The book of Acts records the command of God to be "baptized in the name of Jesus Christ" (2:38; 10:48), and supplies the examples of those who were "baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus" (8:16; 19:5). Further New Testament evidence shows that identity with Christ is tied to being "baptized in the name of" Christ (1 Cor. 1:13). Being baptized "in His name" is essential to secure "life"!

Do you have "life in His name"? There is one Biblical way to secure it! Follow His plan and it will be yours!

The Way of the Cross Leads Home

Look to the cross

and focus on

what really

matters.

When the apostle Paul wrote to the church at Corinth, he wrote to a congregation that needed to get back on track. There was division, false teaching and sexual immorality. They needed to get centered and focused.

Many of us are like that. It seems that we are

prone to "major in minors" and to forget the most important things. It is easy to get distracted by what seems so important in the moment. When Paul addressed the problem of cohesion he asked this question, "Is Christ divided?" (1 Cor. 1:13). In order to deal effectively with this situation, as well as the other problems, he put before them his attitude toward his work and the work of the church. He said, "For I determined to know nothing among you except Jesus

Christ, and Him crucified" (1 Cor. 2:2). He uses the cross as a focal point and centering idea. There are many things that we should give our attention to, but they should be secondary to the message of the cross. The Corinthians were caught up in the mundane things of the world and were becoming like the world. They bickered about who they were baptized by (1 Cor. 1:12). So childish in comparison to the overall message of the cross.

Why should we center our minds and hearts on

"Christ, and Him crucified"? A proper understanding and realization of the message of the cross will always help us to focus on the things that matter most. How can we stand at the foot of the cross and not realize heaven's love for each of us? "For God so loved the world" (John 3:16). How can we be self-centered in light of such sacrifice? "Have this attitude in yourselves which was also in Christ Jesus" (Phil. 2:5). How can we fail to "comfort those who are in any affliction with the com-

fort with which we ourselves are comforted by God" (2 Cor. 1:4). How can we fail to love and build relationships with all who stand at the foot of the cross? "This is My commandment, that you love one another, just as I have loved you" (John 15:12).

Love took our Lord to this ultimate act of obedience. Centering our hearts and minds on the cross can have a transforming effect in the moment

of contention or despair. The crucified Christ was the ultimate goal of heaven in the plan for our redemption. Look to the cross, center your mind on it and focus on what really matters. Not those things that have distracted you. Not the heat of an argument or the feeling of being defrauded in some way. The cross can help us maintain focus and perspective in the moment and over a lifetime. Paul said, "That I may know Him and the power of His resurrection and the fellowship of His sufferings, being conformed to His death; in order that I may attain to the resurrection from the dead" (Phil. 3:10-11).

"Do you love Me?"

Can you imagine Jesus looking in your eyes and asking you, "Do you love Me?" Oh, what a captivating experience that would be! What a rush of emotions would fill your soul! How would you respond? 
