262,000,000 Americans Struggling with Addiction

and drugs

The recent elections in this land focused on what politicians considered the worst problems in American. Their agenda was to say that they were the most qualified to deal with whatever problem they considered the most threatening. However, is it possible that all of them failed to see Ameri-

ca's greatest problem might be the problem of addiction?

Think for a moment of the problem of alcohol addiction. It is estimated that there may be more than 16,000,000 Americans addicted to alcohol. It is addiction greater not just a problem for the individual who is drinking, but his drinking affects those around him. Alcohol is a factor in 73% of all felonies, 73% of child beating cases, 41% of rapes, 81% of wife batterings, 72% of stabbings and 83% of homicides. One study showed that 50,000,000 Americans are impacted by the drinking of others.

Add to this that ever-increasing problem of drug addiction. The best estimates show that there are at least 7,000,000 drug addicts in our land and over 20,000,000 drug users. The World Health Organization report shows that Americans use more cocaine and marijuana than any nation on the earth. At least 16% of Americans will use cocaine in their lives as compared with the second leading nation, New Zealand, where 4% will use cocaine. This addiction to drugs is the underlying reason for so many crimes like thefts and robberies.

Look at the title of this article. The combined number of drug and alcohol addicts in this land is only slightly over 10% of the number of people in our land. Yet, the title shows that almost ninety percent are struggling with the problem of addiction. How are there 262,000,000 of the 325,000,000 Americans struggling? How can this be? What can this addiction pos-

Those who are mentally challenged and America has an many young children are not part of this addiction. Remove them from the total population and that leaves 262 million who struggle with addiction. What than the addicis this addiction? It is the addiction to sin. tion to alcohol

Read these verses carefully. "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God...for by what a man is overcome, by this he is enslaved" (Rom.

3:23; 2 Pet. 2:19—New American Standard Version). Consider the power of sin. It holds the world in its grasp and only by the knowledge of the Lord can we escape it (2 Pet. 2:20). Sin reigns over us and has become our master (Rom. 6:12, 14). The very parts of our bodies become the instruments in this bondage (Rom. 6:13).

Wake up, America! We have an addiction problem that is far greater than the addiction of drugs and alcohol—sin. There is freedom in Christ for you, for me and for every addict!

How many deeply religious conversations would have taken place with family members and coworkers? How many friends would have been invited to worship? How many links to articles and

sermons would have been shared? How many Bible studies would have been offered and conducted? How many baptisms would have resulted if everyone mimicked you?

How encouraging would your home congregation have been this year if every member mimicked you? How many cards would have been mailed out? How many phone calls would have been made? How many friendly texts or emails would have been sent? How many home visits would

> have been made? How many warm handshakes and hugs would have been given? How many meals would have been shared together? How many church members would have been personally contacted and built up if everyone mimicked you?

> You get the idea, right? How fervent would singing in worship have been this year if everyone mimicked you? How sacrificial would the total con-

tribution have been if everyone mimicked you? How many chapters in the Bible would have been personally read and studied throughout the year if everyone mimicked you?

The Lord's church does need fancy programs to reach lost souls, to encourage fellow Christians, to improve our worship, to cause Christians to read their Bibles, etc., etc. No! It just needs Christians who are deeply committed to Jesus Christ! Paul could say, "Imitate me," because he was deeply committed every day to "imitating Christ." Are you?

Death Over Dinner

What do you talk about over dinner? There is an international initiative that started at the University of Washington called, "Let's Have Dinner and Talk About Death." The plan is to initiate conversation about end-of-life care and wishes from loved ones. According to this group, people are not

having this conversation. When asked why have it at the dinner table, they said, "The dinner table is the most forgiving place for difficult conversation." They describe the event as taking place with family and friends. Everyone is privy to the subject before the dinner begins. It is encouraged to talk about those who have passed and to talk about your own wishes for your end-of-life care. They suggest that you answer some of the important questions about end-of-life care. As a result of this dinner, it is encouraged to

have a living will drafted as well as a list of your wishes so that your loved ones will know.

While having one's earthly affairs in order is a good thing and helpful to those we leave behind, there is something far more important about this eminent event. "And inasmuch as it is appointed for men to die once and after this comes judgment" (Heb. 9:27). Paul spoke with fondness concerning his death, "having the desire to depart and be with Christ, for that is very much better" (Phil. 1:23). With that perspective,

death is a transition to the long awaited reward of faithful service. There may be a twinge of fear due to the unknown, but the confident faith drowns out that small voice of fear. We are left with the hope that faith will become sight. For those of us who have made the choice to follow Christ and to faithfully live that life, this confidence is assured in judgement.

There may be some around the dinner table who are not so assured. This is where death over dinner may be a great

event for your friends and family. With the guise of talking about end-of-life plans is legitimate, it will also lend itself to "after this life" discussions. I am not suggesting that these conversations be confrontational or intervention style ambushes. However, they will allow us to talk about those things that do not come up in normal conversation. Children, for example, need to know about death and be able to talk

about it in a way that allows them to explore the subject with family. Remembering loved ones and talking fondly about them is therapeutic for those still grieving the loss. Most importantly, it is a time to remember the frailty of life. "Lord, make me to know my end and what is the extent of my days; let me know how transient I am. Behold, You have made my days as handbreadths, and my lifetime as nothing in Your sight; surely every man at his best is a mere breath" (Psa. 39:4-5). Maybe you will talk about this over dinner one night. You may have friends and family that need to have this conversation.

He knows just what I need

Did you know that God is in the restaurant business? Yes, He is! Jesus said that "your heavenly Father **feeds**" the birds (Matt. 6:26). Did you know that God is in the fashion business? Yes, He is! Jesus said that God "**clothes** the grass of the field" (Matt. 6:30). What was Jesus' point? Why talk about how God "feeds" birds or "clothes" grass?

Jesus asked, "Are you not of more value than they?...Will He not much more clothe you?"

Then, He drew this conclusion, "Therefore do not worry, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?'...For your heavenly Father knows that you need all these things" (6:31-32). Read that last statement again: "Your heavenly Father KNOWS!"

What's going on in your life right now? Where are you hurting? What needs do you have? What concerns weigh heavy on your heart? Repeatedly in this text Jesus tells us, "Do not worry!" Because YOUR heavenly Father KNOWS what you need! He knows! – DS

They're not always wrong!

There is a certain element within our culture that has created in many of us an automatic reflex that disagrees with and is offended by every action that someone in authority takes. It doesn't matter what the action is—we're not going to like it, we're going to automatically think it is wrong. This is the mindset many have toward the boss, toward parents, toward

police officers, toward government representatives, toward referees and even toward elders in the church. It is as if these authority figures are presumed wrong until or unless they can prove themselves right.

While not all authority figures are "created equal," and while some have proven themselves to be untrustworthy, and while Christians should be mindful to "test all things," still Christians have a responsibility to be shaped by Christ and not by our culture. Christians are called to "treat others the same way you want them to treat you" (Luke 6:31). Agape love "bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things" (1 Cor. 13:7). Just because we may not immediately like a decision does not mean that it is wrong. How would Jesus respond? – DS


