8 Reasons to Dress Modestly

As the proud father of two wonderful teenage daughters, I understand quite distinctly the challenging times in which we live, especially when it comes to modesty. Too many people (including Christians) are allowing our culture, our times and our peers to set the standard for us, without realizing

(apparently) the damage that is being done by an immodest, "we-bare-all" way of life.

Some folks would rather that preachers just stay away from topics like modesty altogether. So, this preacher is going to do his best to keep himself away from the topic...and just let God address the matter. Here are eight Biblical reasons that Christian keep their bodies ladies, young women and girls need to keep their bodies modestly attired.

Modesty is commanded by God. "Likewise, I want women to adorn themselves with proper clothing, modestly and discreetly" (1 Tim. 2:9). (This list could end right there!)

If modesty is commanded by God, then immodesty is condemned by God. "As a ring of gold in a swine's snout, so is a lovely woman who lacks discretion" (Prov. 11:22; cf. 7:10).

Modesty is commended by God. "For Adam and his wife," who "were naked" (Gen. 3:7), "the Lord God made tunics of skin, and clothed them" (Gen. 3:21).

Immodesty is a reflection of the heart. "Do not let your adornment be merely outward...rather let it be the hidden person of the heart, with the incorruptible beauty of a gentle and quiet spirit, which is very precious in the sight of God" (1 Pet. 3:2-5).

Immodesty is a sin, for it puts a stumbling block before men. "It is inevitable that stumbling blocks come, but woe to him through whom they come!" (Luke 17:1; cf. Matt. 5:28; Rom. 14:13). Christian ladies.

Immodesty can influence younger women and girls to dress immodestly. "Let your light shine before others" (Matt. 5:16), and "...admonish the young women...to be discreet, chaste" (Tit. 2:4-5).

The "gratifying" anatomy of a woman's modestly attired. body is for her husband's enjoyment, not for others. "Let her breasts satisfy you [the husband] at all times" (Prov. 5:19; cf. 1 Cor. 7:1-2).

> The body is "the temple of the Holy Spirit" and not the tavern of the devil. "Your body is the temple of the Holy Spirit who is in you...therefore glorify God in your body and in your spirit, which are God's" (1 Cor. 6:19-20), and "give [no] place to the devil" (Eph. 4:27).

> This is not some silly, inconsequential, soapbox topic! This affects the souls of the "wearers" and the "observers."

In These Last Days

What would you do with your last days? Many with terminal illnesses have had to face this reality. We, the healthy, go through life thinking very little about the end. King David wrote, "LORD, make me to know my end and what is the extent of my days; let me know how transient I am. Be-

hold, You have made my days as handbreadths, and my lifetime as nothing in Your sight; surely every man at his best is a mere breath" (Psa. 39:4-5). James writes, "Yet you do not know what your life will be like tomorrow. You are just a vapor that appears for a little while and then vanishes away. Instead, you ought to say, "If the Lord wills, we will live and also do this or that" (4:14-15).

While the brevity of life will help us to keep things in perspective, we must realize that we are living in the last age of the earth. "God, after He spoke long ago to the fathers in the prophets in many portions and in many ways, in these last days has spoken to us in His Son, whom He appointed heir of all things, through whom also He made the world" (Heb. 1:1-2). It is evident that we are in the last days. There has been confusion about this. Even in the time of Paul, some were writing letters to the Thessalonians telling them that Christ had already come (2 Thess. 2:1-3). Paul assures them that the Lord will come as a thief in the night, no one will

know when, and with trumpets and shouting, everyone will know that it is happening (1 Thess. 5:2-3; 4:16).

Christ teaches us how to live in light of His pending arrival. "Therefore be on the alert, for you do not know which day your Lord is coming. But be sure of this, that if the head of the house had known at what time of the night the thief was coming, he would have been on the alert and would not have allowed his house to be broken into. For this reason you also

must be ready; for the Son of Man is coming at an hour when you do not think He will" (Matt. 24:42-44).

The Lord is not slow about His promise.

With these two immutable facts before you, the frailty of life and the pending second coming, live each day as it were your last. Do not forget the words of admonition from Peter, "Know this first of all, that in the last days mockers will come with their

mocking... saying, 'Where is the promise of His coming? For ever since the fathers fell asleep, all continues just as it was from the beginning of creation.' For when they maintain this, it escapes their notice that by the word of God the heavens existed...the earth was formed out of water and by water...the present heavens and earth are being reserved for fire...But do not let this one fact escape your notice...the Lord is not slow about His promise...the earth and its works will be burned up" (2 Pet. 3:3-10). Are you ready?

Bind them on your fingers

What if God's words were (figuratively) "bound to your fingers" when you readied to send a text or post a thought? How would that affect your choice of words and your intended tone? -DS

Spring cleaning year-round

Some people really get into "Spring cleaning." Others treat it like the plague. Some wait for that "convenient season" to roll around every year before taking on some much-needed task.

Regardless of what you think of that seasonal housework, there is a different kind of "spring" cleaning that is needed

year-round. In a forthright discussion about the dangers of the tongue, the Lord's half-brother concluded, "Out of the same mouth proceed blessing and cursing. My brethren, these things ought not to be so" (Jas. 3:10). Having used the literal word "mouth," he then gives the mouth a new (i.e., figurative) "name." "Does a spring

send forth fresh water and bitter from the same opening?...[N] o **spring** yields both salt water and fresh" (3:11-12).

Is your "spring" putting forth "fresh" words and "bitter" words? "Blessing" and "cursing"? "Filthy" (Col. 3:8) and "pure" (Prov. 15:26)? "Corrupt" and "edifying" (Eph. 4:29)? Does your "spring" need cleaning? Let's scrub away every syllable that does not reflect Jesus! – DS





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
