Advancing Age and Weary Saints

It is so difficult for us to imagine the following events happening. Think about a boxer who had thrashed his opponent in every round and is far ahead on the scoring cards of all the judges, then he refuses to fight the last round. Think about a marathon runner who has spent years in training for

the Olympics and is far ahead of all other competitors in the final race, then she simply stops one hundred feet short of the finish line, refusing to finish the race. Let the zeal you

Your response would be, "Such could never happen," but almost all of us have seen people doing this spiritually. Far too many Christians draw back in their devotion to the Master in their latter years. They were faithful to the Lord for many years, but for unexplained reasons they quit. Look at the following words from heaven encouraging us to never quit.

Jesus spoke to the church at Smyrna and told them, "Be faithful until death" (Rev. 2:10), and then gave the motivation for faithfulness—"...and I will give you the crown of life." We must run the entire race and never think about stopping short of the finish.

Jesus said, "He who endures to the end shall be saved" (Matt.24:11). These words are surrounded by descriptions of adversity—famine, earthquakes, lawlessness, wars and

false prophets. They describes the worst tribulation of all times which His disciples would soon face. His message? Do not give up! Endure! Endure to the end! Regardless of what it costs, finish the race!

Paul repeatedly urged Christians to endure whatever may come for the reward awaiting them is so great. "Be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing your labor is not in vain in the Lord" (1 Cor. 15:58).

> Pay special notice to the contrast he makes between the labor and the reward. "The sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory which shall be revealed in us" (Rom. 8:18).

> The writer of Hebrews described the end of those who give up. "We are not of those who draw back to perdition, but of those who believe to the saving of our souls" (Heb. 10:39). The reason we can-

not give up? Because Jesus, our forerunner, waits in heaven to give us eternal rest (Heb. 4:11; 6:19-20). Keep your focus on all that awaits you. The events of the past do not really matter! What matters is that which lies ahead! Don't give up!

Make application of this to your life. As long as God gives you breath, give yourself to Him even, though advancing years rob you of the energy you once had. Be determined that the zeal which burned in your heart to serve Him when you were baptized will be the zeal you have at your final breath.

down the road (especially in our spiritual lives) and plan how we will grow and develop in our relationship with Where will you

God over the coming weeks and years.

Long-term planning is certainly a difficult task, but it is essential in all parts of our lives, especially when it comes to our walk with God. Where do you want to be in your relationship with God in 5 years? 10 years? 20 years? Or, how about just at the end of this year?

Challenge yourself! Wherever you are in your faith, push yourself to do more and be more by the end of this year than you are right now. Set your sights on your goal, and then measure it off into weekly increments. What can you do each W.E.E.K. to reach your spiritual goal by the end of the year?

W-Worship more! There are three aspects to this: attendance, action and attitude. If your attendance at worship is not what it should be, increase it. If your attendance is maxed but your action and attitude in worship are not always

in tune, focus in on that and improve it! Measure this every week to see how you're doing.

E—Evangelize more! There are three aspects to this: influence, words and actions. If your influence is hindering the gospel, fix it. If your words are not being used to talk about Jesus, change it. If your actions are not leading you to offer, set up and teach Bible studies with unbelievers, focus on it. Measure this every week to see how you're doing.

> E-Encourage more! There are three aspects to this: the written word, the spoken word, the word-in-action. Challenge yourself to encourage your brethren more this year by writing (text, email, cards, letters, notes), speaking (phone call, visit, handshake at services) and actually doing (acts of kindness and service on a regular basis). Measure this every week to see how you're doing.

K—Kneel more! There are three aspects to this: praying, reading, studying. Challenge yourself to pray more than you do right now, to read (or listen to) God's Word more than you do right now, and to dig deep into Bible research and meditation than you do right now. Measure this every week to see how you're doing.

Where will you be in your relationship with God by the end of this year? Set yourself a goal today, and then measure it each W.E.E.K. We cannot be too busy for God!

There are many who rant against religion-organized religion, more specifically. Not the gilded, diluted, empty, dime-store, bobble-head knock offs that are on every corner. They are the strong delusion. They cheapen what is holy, change truth to a lie and cry peace when there is no peace. We can be part of the solution or part of the problem.

> We must be exemplary in what true religion is (Matt. 5:16; Jas. 1:26-27). We must conduct ourselves in such a way that God is glorified, and that no word or deed betrays the truth of who God is. We must also teach, educate and influence the way people think about religion (Acts 5:42). Truth has always had opposition. From Genesis to Revelation, people have tried to change what the Creator has instructed the created. We must be patient with people and

teach the truth in love as people come out of the cloud of confusion (Eph. 4:14-15; 2 Thess. 2:9-10). The issue is not religion or Jesus. The issue is their concept of religion and Jesus.

You can have religion without Jesus but you cannot have Jesus without religion. It is deity that determines the system of worship. It is deity that dictates how an unholy man should approach a holy God. The sincere plea, "Give me Jesus, not religion," can be a cry for truth. teer at the community center. And, most of the time, wearing different hats is not a big deal.



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
