Agape Love

It is remarkable how we most often use the word "love" to describe an emotional feeling. When we use the expressions like "falling in love," "falling out of love" or "I don't love him anymore," we are limiting the meaning of love to the emotions which are stirred within us. The Greek language had

many words to describe the many facets of love. Our failure to understand one of these words, the Greek word agape, keeps us from properly dealing with others and robs us of one the great blessings of Christianity.

As a child, I always thought of love as an emotion, so when I read Jesus' words about loving your enemies, I struggled to obey him. My emotional attitude toward my enemy was so far removed from any concept I had of love. (By the way, this struggle is

also found in many marriages where a husband or wife is always mistreating their mate). What emotions does one have when people around him are mocking, verbally abusing or insulting him? It is to emotionally respond with anger and the desire to respond in kind to what they are doing—to hurt them like they are hurting us. How can you "love" those who wrong you? Does God really expect me to "love" them?

The answer is found in realizing that when Jesus talked about love (agape) he was not talking about the emotional response we had toward them, but about how we treated them. Agape love has far more to do we how we treat others than how we emotionally respond to them.

Paul discusses this in the closing verses of Romans chapter twelve. Christians were soon to be the objects of scorn, and Nero was about to blame the Christians for burning Rome. In addition to this persecution from the pagans, the Christians had been and were the focus of abuse and persecu-

> tion from the Jews. What reaction did God expect from the citizens of His kingdom?

> It was not a reaction of retaliation. The clearest direction can be summed up in Paul's words. "Be not overcome with evil, but overcome evil with good." The gravest danger we face is that when others treat us in ungodly ways, we feel we have a right to respond and repay them. Someone once said, "It

is never right to do wrong," and these words capture the apostle's thought. Enemies are under the eternal judgment of God. Why should we ever join them in doing wrong!

Our response? What does agape love demand of us? Not an emotional response, but simply to treat them with kindness—to respond as Jesus did toward His enemies. But how do I deal with the anger? I turn it over to God. Paul reminded them that vengeance is God's, and He will always repay. We win when we overcome evil with good!

Some readers will agree with this statement and some will disagree, but I want you to consider this thought for a moment— The most sacred time in the life of the Christian each week is when he or she communes with Jesus at His feast. Lord's") each week, this is not a matter that we can approach flippantly or nonchalantly (1 Cor. 11:27-30). Rather, this feast demands our closest attention and our We must grab deepest concentration. hold of and pur-

Those precious minutes each Sunday during which we partake of the sacred elements can be tough to keep our focus. Some have suggested over the years that those minutes during which the trays

are being passed should be shortened, as there is too much "dead time" in our service, as everyone has to sit quietly until "it's over." Others struggle with keeping their attention focused during those reflective moments. Some get frustrated when there are distractions throughout the auditorium while they are partaking. May I suggest to you, during this most sacred time, that we must grab hold of and purposefully direct our thoughts back to the cross. The words "remembrance," "examine" and "discern" in 1 Corinthians 11:23-29 emphasize that our thoughts, our minds and our hearts are required. We must concentrate. But, how can we overcome distractions?

Read. Minds wander easily, but with written words in front of us, we can stay focused. Read the accounts of Jesus' suffering and crucifixion in Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. Read Isaiah 53, Psalm 22 and other reflective passages. Read the words of a meaningful hymn. Take time during the week to write out your own personal meditation for communion, and then read those words as you partake. Don't just read these things as a "routine"; focus on the depth of each word.

> Pray. Give thanks to God for the suffering and sacrifice of Jesus, which brings us atonement, forgiveness and promise. Give thanks to God for His love, His grace and His mercy. Give thanks to God for the body and the blood of our precious Savior.

Redirect. Distractions are inevitable. But, back to the cross the power of the mind can overcome distractions and even use the distractions themselves to redirect

one's thoughts. Babies will cry while you're partaking, and when they do, imagine how babies must have been crying at the cross. People will whisper behind you and may even laugh at something, and when they do, imagine how people must have been whispering and laughing at the cross. People will goof off and play games, and when they do, imagine those soldiers playing games for Jesus' garments, while He suffered.

We must "remember" Him, "examine" ourselves and "discern" His body! Let us focus our minds as we commune!

Excuses

"For like a poisonous breath over the fields, like a mass of locusts over Egypt, so the swarm of excuses is a general plague, a ruinous infection among men, that eats off the sprouts of the Eternal" (Søren Kierkegaard). "It is better to offer no excuse than a bad one" (George Washington). "He that is

good for making excuses is seldom good for anything else" (Benjamin Franklin). You probably have your favorite, your go-to, excuse. We all have them to some degree. In general, it is easier to pass the blame than to bear the weight of scrutiny and guilt yourself. Let's look at a list of faithful people and compare them to common excuses in their lives.

One very common excuse to alleviate the need to obey scriptures is, "Well I don't want to condemn my family by obeying". Which is to say that your obeisance would condemn those that do not obey. The heroes of faith mentioned in Hebrews chapter 11 are to be an encouragement to us as we strive to walk acceptably with God. These were people who had passed the test of faith. Abel offered an acceptable sacrifice to God, but his brother did not (Heb. 11:4). Abel's offering did not make his brother wrong. Every individual must decide what they will do with Jesus. "Work out your own salvation with fear and trembling" (Phil. 2:12). Never use the excuse of someone else as the reason that you refuse the

Another excuse is, "It is too hard!" This is one that works for a lot of different occasions. We see Noah in this list as having worked hard for the Lord. Noah took the time to serve the Lord (Heb. 11:7). Look at all the preaching he did while preparing the ark. Noah would tell us that no work the Lord asks of us is too hard or without value. "And let us not be weary in well doing: for in due season we shall reap, if we faint

not" (Gal. 6:9). We see this example in Abraham (Heb. 11:8, 17). He tells us that no commands of God are too hard. The difficulty in obeying the commands of God are not the commands themselves but rather the difficulty lies in the heart. God's commands are not hard to keep if the heart is right.




