Don't Just Read the Bible

Have you ever thought about how small the Bible was which was read by the man after God's own heart? He had access to those first five books, the books of Moses. Perhaps he had access to the book of Job. He would have known of the books of Joshua and Judges. The book of Ruth was more than

a record of a woman from Moab-it was a story about his own great-grandmother. There were thirty other Old Testament books which would eventually complete the revelation God gave the Jews, but David never had access to them. Only nine books-yet, the truths contained in them were enough to change the shepherd boy into being a man after God's own heart.

God knew the importance of the Bible in changing rebellious hearts and making them like His

own heart. Listen to the words God gave to David (and to all the kings) hundreds of years before Israel had a king. "Also it shall be, when he sits on the throne of his kingdom, that he shall write for himself a copy of this law in a book, from the one before the priests, the Levites. And it shall be with him, and shall read it all the days of his life ... that his heart may not be lifted above his brethren that he may not turn aside from the commandment..." (Deut. 17:18-20). There was enough in those first five books (those which Moses described as being the one the Levites had in Moses' day) to change the heart of

any man. Yet, hearts were rarely changed. How could this be? What was the difference in the heart of David and the hearts of almost all of the other kings? What was the difference between him and those high officials who crucified Jesus?

It was not that godly men read the Bible, and the ungodly leaders did not read the Bible. James, the Lord's brother, said, "For Moses has had throughout many generations those who preach him in every city, being read in the synagogues

> every Sabbath" (Acts 15:21). The ungodly Jewish leaders knew the Sabbath, the law, circumcision, punishment for adulterous women and washing of hands. The Jews preached Moses and read the law, but it only changed the heart of a few of them. Why?

> Hear the words of the man whose heart was like God's heart. "His delight is in the law of the Lord and in His law he meditates day and night... My voice

shall hear in the morning, O Lord; in the morning I will direct it to You, and I will look up...In fear I shall worship toward Your holy temple. Lead me, O Lord, in Your righteousness...Let the words of my mouth and the meditations of my heart be acceptable in Your sight...Lead me in Your truth and teach me..." (Psa. 1:2; 5:2, 7-8; 19:14; 25:5).

What was the difference? When David read the Bible, he longed for it to change him. There is a vast difference in reading the Bible every day and reading it like David did!



What's Needed in Syria

We are hearing a lot about Syria in the news these days, and none of it is good. What is happening in Syria is very serious! Here is a nation that has been engaged in a horrific civil war for more than five years, which has claimed the lives of more than 250,000 people. Whatever the cause of this

violence and however it might be reported, it ought to arrest our attention to hear of that many souls being killed!

But, I want you to know that I have the solution! Now, I'm not a diplomat or a politician or a in Syria is what is military strategist or a sociologist, but I know exactly what is needed in Syria to bring an abrupt end to the vicious brutality that has caused millions to flee for nation and every their lives. Here's the short of it: If "Syria" today could have what "Syria" of 2,000 years ago had, things would be much different!

Syria needs the fame of Jesus! At the end of Matthew 4, Jesus was making His way through northern Palestine, "teaching...preaching the gospel...and healing" (4:23). "Then His fame went throughout all Syria" (4:24). Other translations say, "The news about Him spread" (NASB); "And the report of him went forth into all Syria" (ASV). The only sure, proven and long-term solution for peace is the good news about Jesus and His kingdom. Isaiah prophesied of nations

beating swords into plowshares and spears into pruning hooks (Isa. 2:2-4). Syria needs the good news of Jesus Christ!

Syria needs strong churches! As Paul began his second missionary journey from Antioch of Syria, "he went through Syria...strengthening the churches" (Acts 15:41). These congregations had already been established and were growing, but they needed further encouragement to stay true to the Lord and to fight against the wiles of the devil. A strong

church can influence a whole community for good. Syria needs faithful and fervent congregations!

Syria needs servant-hearted Christians! On his way to Jerusalem, at the end of his third missionary journey, Paul "sailed to Syria...And finding disciples, we stayed there seven days" (Acts 21:3-4). Paul stayed in some hospitable Christian's home for seven days. When he left, "they all accompanied us, with

wives and children, till we were out of the city," which was a common send-off of God speed. "We knelt down on the shore and prayed...and they returned home" (21:5-6). These brethren served Paul's every need. Syria needs servants of Christ!

The situation in Syria could turn around instantly if the good news of Jesus could be spread by strong churches made up of servant-hearted Christians! Actually, the situation in America could turn around instantly and the situation in our homes could turn around instantly by the same process!



Time Waits for No Man...

There are many reminders of our age, like birthdays, doctor visits, aches and those pesky gray hairs. Amongst the other states, Florida is known as the place to be if you are over 65. The fabled find by Ponce de Leon in St. Augustine foreshadowed what By Josh Blackmer would become a "Snowbird" state. Inter-

esting research from a joint effort by Russia and Sweden suggests that they can slow the effects of aging by treating the part of the cell, mitochondria, that produces the power for the cell. dustry in 2016 was 62.46 billion dollars? Science has been the new fountain of youth for many years. My question to you is, would you do all you could to live longer? Would you be a part of Russian clinical trials aimed at defying the aging process?

If we examine the motivation for the extreme measures people are willing to take to live longer, we might find a healthier solution. I think the motivating factor is death. The close cousin to the love and infatuation with youth is the fear and anxiety connected with death. It is healthy and normal to take medicines and prescription drugs to maintain a normal life expectancy. It is unrealistic and unhealthy if you are booking tickets to Russia thinking you will come back looking like Dolph Lundgren from Rocky IV.

We are told that "it is appointed for men to die" (Heb. 9:27). Paul, who was a tent maker by trade, said, "For indeed while we are in this tent, we groan, being burdened" (2 Cor. 5:4). Having been around and mended tents, Paul uses it as an

analogy to the human body, essentially saying, "It is going to wear out." What does a Christian have waiting for him/her after death? A place that has been prepared by God (John 14:2-3). No more hunger, thirst or scorching heat-just the presence of God (Rev. 7:15-17). We will be changed to an immortal body, and in death, we will be victorious (1 Cor. 15:52-55). I don't see the downside. However, only

the victorious in this life will be victorious over death (Rev. 21:7). Even in the passage about the tents, Paul writes, "Now He who prepared us for this very purpose is God... we are of good courage, I say, and prefer rather to be absent from the body and to be at home with the Lord. Therefore we also have as our ambition, whether at home or absent, to be pleasing to Him. For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ" (2 Cor. 5:5-10). So, we have nothing to fear while living to please God. In the end, we can greet death as an old friend and not the harbinger of destruction.
