"Little" Sins, "Big" Sins and Full Grown Sins

When you sin,

repent. Do not

ever let any sin

become full

grown!

Sometimes we mistakenly think of the magnitude of sins in a wrong way. We talk of "little" sins as being those which really do not "count" because they seem so innocent when compared to major blunders which only the most ungodly do. The Catholic Church even has the same view of sins which

are characterized as venial and mortal sins.

When one has this mindset, he struggles to figure out how eating fruit from a tree in the Garden of Eden could be so wrong. How could such an "innocent" act be compared to the sin mentioned in in the next chapter where a brother kills his own brother? Surely, murder must be a greater sin than eating fruit.

The same mindset struggles to deal with the "little" sin Saul committed in First Samuel chapter thirteen. Saul had been king for only one year when he was confronted by the Philistine army which had 30,000 chariots and 6,000 horsemen. Saul's army had only 3,000 soldiers. The prophet Samuel told the king that he would come to the battlefront and make sacrifices to God to seek His blessing in the conflict. For some unknown reason, Samuel was delayed, and Saul's army was about to flee even before the battle was begun. He knew he could never defeat the Philistines without the Lord's help and, though he was not a priest, he went ahead and offered the sacrifice. How could such be wrong? If it was a sin, it had to be a "little" one. Yet God did not see it this way. Saul's "little" sin caused the kingdom to be taken from the lineage of Saul. Our view of "little" and "big" sins is often so wrong.

While the Bible does not use these words to describe sin, it does speak of "full grown" sins (Jas. 1:15). This verse describes the enticement of sin and the entrance into sin as

> the birth of sin. However, sin does not remain a "baby" sin. If it is not dealt with, it grows and grows in our lives. We often fail to realize that any sin can become an addiction. Peter described this process when he talked about Christians escaping the pollution of sin through following Christ but then are again "...entangled therein and overcome" (2 Pet. 2:20). Sin has remarkable power, and when we have

waited until it grows we sometimes leave the Lord.

Joseph was enticed by Potiphar's wife. He ran! Had he stayed he might have fallen into the bondage of sin. David was tempted and did not run! Look at the ruin such brought to his life and family.

"Little" sins may seem rather innocent when we are first enticed by them, but yielding to "little sins" from a heart set on ignoring God opens the door to the bondage of sin. When you sin, repent. Do not let it become full grown!



"Rejoice in the Lord Always"

One of the more challenging verses in Scripture to apply to one's life is in Philippian 4:4, "Rejoice in the Lord always." Many a Christian has wondered how this is possible. Yes, we are commanded to "rejoice in the Lord" in Philippians 3:1, but 4:4 adds the word "always." Later in the chapter Paul

would report that he "rejoiced in the Lord greatly" (4:10). How is that even possible?

May I suggest to you that our thoughts may be focused on the wrong words in the passage. We first notice the challenge of "rejoice," which is sometimes problematic, depending on people and circumstances. But, then there's the word "always." In the evaluation of some, the Lord took it too far with that word. Still, we are focused on the wrong words. Look at the three words in between to find the key to fulfilling this imperative—"in the Lord." The only way to truly "rejoice" and to "rejoice always" is to do so "in the Lord"!

What does that mean to the Christian today...to our everyday lives? How can I learn to "rejoice IN THE LORD always"? Nine times in this four-chapter book of Philippians, the prepositional phrase "in the Lord" is found. We've noticed three already (3:1; 4:4, 10). The other six provide a great explanation to realizing how this challenge is possible.

To rejoice in the Lord always, I must learn to "trust in the Lord" (2:19). The word "trust" in this verse means to have "hope in the Lord." Truly putting my hope and my trust in the Lord will help me to rejoice in the Lord...always.

To rejoice in the Lord always, I must learn to be "confident in the Lord" (2:24, NIV). While some translations have the word "trust" again (like v. 19), it is a different Greek word, which means "to be convinced, sure and certain." Hav-

ing a settled confidence in the Lord will help me to rejoice in the Lord...always.

To rejoice in the Lord always, I must "stand tween to find the fast in the Lord" (4:1). The word means to stand firm, to hold one's ground, like a soldier determined not to budge one inch from his post. Standing firm with and for the Lord will help me to rejoice in the Lord...always.

> To rejoice in the Lord always, I must genuinely focus on my "brethren in the Lord" (1:14). I must learn to "receive [them] in the Lord" (2:29), meaning to welcome them favorably unto myself. I must learn to "be of the same mind in the Lord" (4:2), by learning to adopt the "mind" of Christ, which strives for unity through humility (2:5, 2), and strives to "walk by the same rule" or "standard" (3:16). Focusing on my brethren in the Lord will help me to rejoice in the Lord...always.

"Here is one thing I do."

I have received a lot of advice from many different sources. I have found that I go back to those sources of good and great advice-those who I feel have guided me well in life, love and my pursuit of perfection in Christ. But, what if one of those sources said, By Josh Blackmer "Here is one thing I do"? I, personally, would

get ready to listen with anticipation. My expectations are high that I will hear something that could go on a t-shirt or tacky bumper sticker next to my stick figure family. What would you do if Paul the apostle, inspired by the Holy Spirit, said, "This one thing I do"?

The context of this statement is in Philippians chapter 3. Paul begins this chapter by warning against seeking after righteousness according to the flesh or the law (3:1-11). He, of all people, could be

boasting in his pedigree and earthly standards of righteousness, but he didn't. All of those things are trash and refuse in comparison to the knowledge of Christ and righteousness that comes from God on the basis of faith in Jesus. He was seeking after those things that would lead to the resurrection of the dead (3:11).

Here is where we narrow in on the "one thing." He said he was chasing after to lay hold of or capture that for which Christ had captured or seized him (3:12). Here is the one thing. "Brethren, I do not regard myself as having laid hold of it yet; but one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and reaching forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus" (3:13-14). He is not saying, "I don't know if I'm saved, but I keep trying." He is saying, "You can't stop!" You have to forget what was behind, what you gave up, what you counted for loss (Luke 9:62). We must "lay aside every encumbrance and the sin

which so easily entangles us, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us" (Heb. 12:1). You must keep stretching out for the prize ahead. That is, being called up with God in Christ, the resurrection of the soul.

He not only lays down this imperative but also gives us the "how." "Let us keep living by that same standard to which we have attained. Brethren,

join in following my example, and observe those who walk according to the pattern you have in us" (3:16-17). There is the need to "keep going, don't stop." Yet, do it in keeping with the standard that has been set. Such a standard can be taught and imitated. You cannot win the prize unless you have competed according to the rules (2 Tim. 2:5).

So the advice is this. Keep striving and stretching out for the prize before us, forget what is behind us and live this life according to the pattern to receive the call from above us.
