The Bible is filled with emphasis on the little things we can so easily overlook. In recent weeks, we have mentioned Gideon's small army, the little oil the widow of Zarephath shared with Elijah, Moses' rod, the widow's mites and the little "pegs" God used for His purposes. God does not need the

grandeur of mortals to show His glory. He can use little things.

Little ants and laziness. America has largely become a nation of people who have become dependent on others instead of knowing the blessing of working hard and reaping the fruit of our labor. Yet, the Bible plainly says, "If anyone will not work, neither shall he eat" (2 Thess. 3:10). America's attitude of laziness was also part of the ancient world. Solomon said, "Go to the ant, you sluggard! Consider her

ways and be wise, which having no captain, overseer or ruler provides her supplies in the summer and gathers her food in the harvest" (Prov. 6:6-8). Wisdom comes from little things.

Little children and humility. The disciples of Jesus often struggled as to who would be the greatest in the kingdom. In one simple act, our Lord showed them the true path to greatness. "Then Jesus called a little child to Him, set him in the midst of them, and said, 'Assuredly I say to you, unless you be converted and become as little children, you will by no

Little garments and love. Hannah promised God that that she would give her firstborn child to Him (1 Sam. 1). After he was weaned, she brought Samuel and gave him to Eli, and only saw that child once each year. Hannah would "...make him a little robe, and bring it to him year by year" (1 Sam.

> 2:18). What a treasure those little robes must have been. Every stitch made by his mother's hand was a stitch of love. There are so many little things we can do for others to show them this same kind of love.

> Little sips of water and His eyes. When we are reminded that God sees everything, some immediately think of His remembrance of idle words, hidden sins and angry words spoken to family members

in our homes and in our cars. However, we must never overlook that He sees every cup of cold water given to others (Matt. 10:42). Remember the judgment scene in Matthew 25? He sees food prepared and taken to the least disciple; He sees visits we make to the sick, especially the least among us; and He sees our hospitality to the least among us. It is these little things we might overlook which determine whether we are on the right or left hand.

For Jesus warned, "...if you do not

part," but salvation also requires man to do "his part."

believe that I am He, you will die in your sins" (John 8:24). Believing that Jesus was "raised from the dead" is essential (i.e., is the foundation) to being "saved" (Rom. 10:9), but salvation is "not by faith only" (Jas. 2:24).

Man is saved by works (of faith), but not by works alone. Scripture unequivocally affirms that "faith" which "does not have works" is "dead" and

cannot "save," for "a man is justified by works" (Jas. 2:14-26). True faith, Jesus declared, is "the work of God" (John 6:28-29), for genuine faith leads one to repent of his sins (Acts 2:37-38), confess his faith in Jesus (Rom. 10:9-10) and be immersed into Christ (Gal. 3:26-27), in order to have every sin washed away by the gracious blood of Jesus (Acts 22:16; Rev. 1:5). Only then is man saved by "the working of God" (Col. 2:11-12).

The church of Christ teaches and practices the plan of salvation detailed in the New Testament. Does your church?

Only by Christ's prescribed plan of salvation can man be freed from sin.

Consumer Christianity

"The customer is always right" is a business moto we have all heard. We, as consumers, have become more powerful with the popularity of social media. Back in the 1900's, a business did not have to worry about a disgruntled customer. Who were they going to tell? Now, Fortune 500 compa-

nies have been forced to make big changes in their business models because of what customers posted with their phones. Hello, United Airlines! These companies have also been able to use the media outlets to market and fine-tune their products to the consumers in almost "real-time." The power of the consumer has grown to drive change in a more profound way.

How has consumerism affected religion? In one way, families are "shopping" for churches to

attend. They want the one that fits their family needs. Theology and how a particular group teaches or if they teach truth has become of secondary or tertiary importance to the perceived needs of the family unit. We are no longer looking for truth. We are looking for what we can get out of it. Churches are picking up on this and are marketing their religious groups to those who are shopping. The pulpit gets softer, the music gets louder and lines in the sand get replaced with broad ideas of acceptance in the name of God's grace. The consumer is always right, and God, well, He understands. When it is brought down to its most basic element, consumer Christianity isn't anything new. It's just packaged differently. The Bible talks about it this way. "Now I urge you, brethren, keep your eye on those who cause dissensions and hindrances contrary to the teaching which you learned, and turn away from them. For such men are slaves, not of our Lord Christ but of their own appetites; and by their smooth and flattering speech they deceive the hearts of the unsus-

> pecting" (Rom. 16:17-18). "Brethren, join in following my example, and observe those who walk according to the pattern you have in us. For many walk, of whom I often told you, and now tell you even weeping, that they are enemies of the cross of Christ, whose end is destruction, whose god is their appetite, and whose glory is in their shame, who set their minds on earthly things" (Phil. 3:17-19).

Those who follow their appetite rather than the pattern are consumers. If I make worship about what I get out of it instead of what I am offering to God, I am a consumer. If I make my service to Him about who sees me doing it on social media instead of genuine service, I am a consumer. If the church must serve me and my needs instead of me looking out for my neighbor, I am a consumer. The cry of the consumer in judgment will be, "Didn't we #feedthepoor and didn't we #praiseJesus!" He will say, "I never knew you."

"I want you to know—I'm doing you a favor!"




