# **Beware of "Cotton Candy"**

I remember the very first time I ever saw cotton candy. When I was very young the highlight of every year was the county fair in Huntsville, Alabama. Today when there is Disney World, Universal Studios and "Six Flags Over Everywhere," it is hard for anyone to imagine just how special those "scary"

rides were at the fair and how much I loved cotton candy!

I do not remember how old I was, but I vividly remember that stand which sold this new, amazingly sweet treat. I did not know that cotton candy had been introduced to the world at the 1904 World Fair in St. Louis and was called Fairy Floss. (No, I was not at that fair—not that old). At that fair, more than 68,000 boxes were sold for the equivalent of six dollars in today's money. I do know how much I loved it.

My impressions of it? (1) It was so fascinating and attractive. (2) Everyone was talking about how good it was. (3) At first taste, it was so sweet, but then it disappeared in my mouth. (I did not know it was mostly air mixed with two tablespoons of sugar). (4) It promised so much and gave such instant gratification that I wanted more and more.

Now think of the many parallels between my impression of cotton candy and the nature of sin. Sometimes great lessons come from the simplest sources.

Sin and cotton candy are so fascinating and attractive. Think about the fruit in the first garden. Think of David's view of Bathsheba from his rooftop. We so often sin when our hearts lust for what we see (Jas. 1:14). However, there is far more to sin when we look at the larger picture.

Sin and cotton candy are enjoyed by so many. That expensive cost of the floss in St. Louis did not keep individuals from buying it. So many thought that if others found it so

> "rewarding" they just had to try it, regardless of the cost. There are many on that broad way toward destruction (Matt. 7:13-14). There is that Divine instruction about following the multitude (Ex. 23:2).

> Sin and cotton candy both promise so much and deliver so little. There is almost no nutritional value to cotton candy—it is nothing but air. Sin properly understood is in reality nothing but "fluff"

that brings eternal destruction. When sin is finished it brings death and bondage (Jas. 1:15; 2 Pet. 2:20).

Sin and cotton candy both create a longing to have more and more. Every sin can become an addiction which brings us into bondage and is so addictive. Sin seems to satisfy but only for such a short time. The real choices are instant gratification or eternal reward.

Isn't it strange how often great spiritual or eternal truths come from such simple sources!

# A Logistical Nightmare for Man But Not For God

In Exodus 13, it states that "when Pharaoh had let the people [of Israel] go... God led the people around by way of the wilderness of the Red Sea. And the children of Israel went up in orderly ranks out of the land of Egypt...And the Lord went before them" (13:17-21). Chapter 14 states that

when they came to the Red Sea at night that the Lord parted the waters—"So the children of Israel went into the midst of the sea on the dry ground, and the waters were a wall to them on their right hand on their left" (14:21-22). What would that have been like?

least 2-3 million At Mount Sinai, the Lord instructed Moses Jews who came to number the people, and it was found that the males, who were 20 years old and above and who were able to go to war (Num. 1:2-3), numbered 603,550 (1:46). This did not include any males under 20 or any women or the tribe of Levi. Therefore, it has been estimated that there were at least 2-3 million Jews who came out of

Egypt. That is a huge nation that was on the move.

Have you ever stopped to think about what it must have been like for that many people to leave Egypt, cross the Red Sea, make their way to Mount Sinai and have any semblance of order about them? What about the logistics of just making sure everyone had food and water?

At one time, the Quartermaster General in the Army gave the following statistics. He determined that Israel would have needed 1,500 tons of food each day-which would require two freight trains a mile long each to carry. They would have needed 4,000 tons of firewood per day to cook their meals—which would require at least 2-3 more freight trains a mile long each to carry. In order to have enough water to drink, cook and wash, they would have needed 11,000,000

> gallons each day—which would require a freight train of tank cars that was three miles long every day.

> For that many people to cross the Red Sea, the opening would have to be huge. If it was narrow and they only crossed double file, the line would be 800 miles long and would require 35 days and nights to pass. The opening had to be a good three miles wide, so that they could march across 5,000 abreast

in one night. And, when they got ready to camp at the end of each day, it would require a campground that was 750 square miles (two-thirds the size of the state of Rhode Island).

This would have been an absolute logistical nightmare for Moses to figure out. But, with God, we read the events as if it was the easiest thing in the world. Do you realize that the God who did this is your God? When things in your life seem to be insurmountable and you feel overwhelmed, just remember what God did for Israel. He will do it for you, too!



In a Godly Home, the Husband... (Family Series Part 1)

The relationship between man and woman and the subsequent family is one of the oldest relationships on earth. Only slightly older is the relationship between man and God.

It was God that placed the husband as the head of the family. "Wives, be subject

to your own husbands, as to the Lord" (Eph. 5:22-25; 1 Cor. 11:3). Being the head of the family does not mean that the man is superior to woman. Nor is the husband to lord over his wife. It is simply the role that was placed on the males. In regard to submission, it is something that is reciprocated and a sign of mutual respect (Eph. 5:21). The wife is not to be treated in any way less than the way Christ loves and is concerned for His church. It also does not necessarily mean that the husband "makes all the decisions." (There is more to headship than simply making decisions).

Headship gives direction. Your head gives your own physical body a sense of direction, without which life would be impossible. Christ as the head of His spiritual body, the church, provides it with a direction for action. The husband as the head of his family is to provide direction for all under his guidance. In Joshua's declaration, "but as for me and my house, we will serve the Lord" (24:15), he was setting the stage for what was

expected of his family. As the head of the family, he was setting the standard for how the household should be governed in light of a belief in God. Noah is another example of one who was obedient to God. That obedience was able to save his family and the future of mankind. In both cases, direction is given to the family through example and instruction.

Another part of being the head of the household is 1 Cor. rendering service. This was exampled to us by Jesus. He showed us that the role of the master (teacher, leader, head) involves service to his people. On the night of His betrayal, He washed the feet of the disciples and concluded with this statement, "For I gave you an example that you also should do as I did to you" (John 13:15). When some of the disciples tried to exalt themselves over others Jesus said, "and whoever wishes to be first among you shall be your

slave" (Matt. 20:27). We must follow the example of Christ-like servant leadership.

God has specified several other responsibilities for the husband not necessarily connected to the role of headship. Husbands should love their wives (Eph. 5:25-30). Husbands should treat their wives with respect and consideration (1 Pet. 3:7). Husbands are to care for their families (1 Tim. 5:8). In doing this, the husband can fulfill the role that was set out for him since its creation. How is the leadership in your home?
