The Arrows of God

In our day of modern warfare, when a skilled sniper can kill an enemy from two miles away, we tend to forget in Bible times how devastating a skilled marksman could be with nothing more than his bow and quill filled with arrows. An unexpected volley of arrows from a troop of warriors could bring

immediate death when it arrived.

One event from ancient history illustrates this so well. Alexander the Great came against the enormous Persian army and was told that when the the lightning and Persians shot their arrows there were so many that it would darken the sun. (Such did not faze Alexander. He replied, "Wonderful, today we get to fight in the shade"). The constant threat of death from the arrows of the enemy is why the Bible describes the wrath of God using the imagery of His arrows.

In the seventh Psalm, David described the anger of the Lord manifesting His justice. "God is a just judge, and God is angry with the wicked every day...He bends His bow and makes it ready...He also prepares for Himself instruments of death; He makes His arrows into fiery shafts." There is no way to compare the arrows of the Persian army and the fiery arrows of the army of God. In the midst of great adversity, David found such peace when he thought of God's arrows.

The eighteenth psalm was penned by David on the very day God delivered him from all of his enemies, especially King Saul (2 Sam. 22:1). In his destress, the shepherd boy had cried out to God, and his cry entered into the ears of God. Read the words of the psalmist in the vivid, poetic words given by the Holy Spirit. "He heard my voice...the earth shook and trembled...because He was angry. Smoke went up from His nostrils, and devouring fire from His mouth...The Lord thun-

dered from heaven, and the Most High uttered His voice."

Then, David mentioned the arrows of the Lord. "He sent out His arrows and scattered the foe, lightning in abundance." Who has not been startled by the flashing of lightning and its attendant thunder! David saw these as manifestations of God's arrows coming to his deliverance. Forget the Persian arrows,

forget the arrows of Saul's army—God comes to the aid of His children who call out to Him.

Do you want to be find peace when surrounded by life's storms? Just take time to read about God's arrows prepared to come to your aid. Let me also suggest that when you see the lightning and hear the thunder in the summer storms and those preceding hurricanes and tornados you take time to look at them as David did. God's arrows are awaiting your cry for His help. Meditate on these things.

If you do not know, where do you think the following verse would be found in the Bible? "You shall not follow a crowd to do evil." It would make sense for that particular verse to be in a letter written to Christians in the immoral city of Corinth, but that's not where this verse is found.

At Mount Sinai, the ONLY people there (to our leaven, that you knowledge) were God's people. All of these Jews had just witnessed multiple miraculous manifestations of the power of God, and now they are only in the presence of fellow Jews. Why, in that context, would God need to tell them, "You shall not follow a crowd to do evil"? Could there have been "evil" men among them who they needed to avoid? Perhaps. Or, is it possible that God was

concerned that they still had a little Egypt in them?

Does one have to be in the presence of an evil crowd to actually follow that evil crowd? Consider Lot's daughters for a moment. These two young ladies witnessed the divine destruction of their hometown and everything that they had ever known. What a life-changing experience! What would ever cause Lot's daughters to get their father drunk, so that they could "lie with him" and provide him with a "lineage" (Gen. 19:30-32)? Would this not be a reflection of the environment in which they had been raised and was now manifesting itself, even when they had escaped that evil place?

Go back to Exodus 23:2-"You shall not follow a crowd to do evil." These Jews had spent their entire lives in the pagan nation of Egypt. They had been surrounded by idol-

> atry and immorality for centuries. It is hard for that not to have a lasting impact on individuals, even after

> Make the application. What ungodly influences have there been in our lives in the past that still have their seeds lodged in our hearts? What crowds might we be following, although we haven't been around those "crowds" in years? Consider this

Bible principle: "Do you not know that a little leaven," even some that stays lodged in our hearts after many years, "leavens the whole lump?" God then instructs, "Therefore purge out the old leaven, that you may be a new lump" (1 Cor. 5:6-7). While this is written to a church, there is application even to the life of an individual Christian today. What "old leaven" (i.e., remnants of your own Egypt) do you need to search out in your heart and "clean out" (NASB)? Is there a better day to start that cleaning than today?

In a Godly Home, the Wife... (Family Series Part 2)

None could argue with the importance of the wife and mom in the family dynamic. It is this role that embodies so much of the heart and soul of what it means to be family. "He who finds a wife finds a good thing" (Prov. 18:22). "An excellent wife, who can find? For her worth is far above jew-

els" (Prov. 31:10).

When we look to the Bible to define the role of the wife, we see that she is to subject to the husband (Eph. 5:22). As we studied before, this is not a demotion or a position of lesser estate. It does not mean that there should be a rivalry between the sexes or that either sex intends to walk on the rights of the other. We understand that nothing can have two heads and succeed. Someone must take the lead,

and someone must follow. The wife's role is a partnership. She is to be a supporter, a helper, a confidante. If these roles are switched it doesn't work. If the man is not taking the lead, the woman takes up the reigns and it doesn't work. We were programmed for these roles.

God has specified several other responsibilities of the wife not necessarily connected to the role of submission. Wives should love their husbands and children. "[Older women] that they may encourage the young women to love their

husbands, to love their children" (Tit. 2:4). I would propose to you that this is not emotional love but how to agape love in the family setting. That is a learned love.

Wives should be one with their husbands. It is a defining aspect of the marriage relationship (Gen. 2:24). It is also something that both are responsible for in the relationship (1 Cor. 7:3-5). Neither is to deny it of the other.

Wives should also respect their husbands. I understand that guys don't always make this easy, but there should be a mutual respect. "Nevertheless, each individual among you also is to love his own wife even as himself, and the wife must see to it that she respects her husband" (Eph. 5:33; 1 Pet. 3:4-5).

wives should be virtuous. Older women are to teach the younger "to be sensible, pure, workers at home, kind, being subject to their own husbands, so that the word of God will not be dishonored" (Tit. 2:5). The proverbial woman" also portrays these virtues in the example we are given in Proverbs 31:10-31.

It is easy to see the importance that the role of the wife and/or mother plays in the family. It is important for the emotional health of everyone in the family. It is for this reason that the Proverbs speak so highly of an excellent wife. When God made woman, it could be said that He crowned His creation with that which is most precious.




