Among So Many

Our Lord had sent out the twelve on the limited commission of going to the Jews to tell them about the coming Kingdom. They had been given power to heal the sick and to cast out demons (Luke 9:1). When they returned to Him, they told Jesus of all that they had done. He took them away from the mul-

titude to a deserted place on the east shores of the Sea of Galilee. They did not know the lesson He was about to teach them. Do not look at

The multitudes followed Jesus and the apostles, and Jesus spent hours teaching them about the Kingdom. As the day ended, the disciples came to Jesus and told Him to send the multitude away that they might find food and lodging. How startled these men must have been when Jesus said, "You give

them something to eat" (Luke 9:13). With weak faith, they reminded the Lord that it would take at least 200 days' wages to feed so many. They told Jesus there was a young man who had five barley loaves of bread, two small fish and then added, "But what are they among so many" (John 6:9)?

Think about this for just a minute. They had just returned from days of healing, teaching and casting out demons but were still looking at the world without any faith. Eyes without faith see the world so differently from those with faith. What are the loaves and fish compared to their needs? The real truth is that a child's lunch and the Lord are no problem at all when He is there.

Is it possible that we react to situations in our lives without realizing that the "insurmountable" problems we are facing are meaningless when the Lord is with us? The storms of life are so immense when we look at them, but faith allows us to look at these storms and understand that the Lord is far

greater than all storms.

The Lord has always dealt with His people and purposely used "powerless" individuals to bring glory to Himself. Had God chosen mass armies to deal with the pagan armies all the glory would be given to men, and He would be left out. The land which flowed with milk and honey and giants living in cities with walls which reached heaven could so easi-

ly be conquered by "grasshoppers" with the Lord among them (Num. 13). Remember also the Lord's use of Gideon's army of 300 and the destruction of the Midianites.

So, as you face the storms of life, look at it through eyes so different from those of men without God. They say, "What are these (loaves and fish) among so many?" Eyes of faith, look not at the loaves and fish, but see them in the hands of Jesus with the hungry multitudes and see the twelve baskets filled with leftovers! "What is the Lord, among so many?"



"But, he's such a good man!"

If someone is a deeply sincere, devoted, religious person, who believes in the true God, worships God and prays to God, wouldn't you think that such a person would be in a better-than-average relationship with God and pleasing in His sight? Such human reasoning can be dangerous and leave one

with a false sense of security, an unscriptural conclusion and a lost condition of soul. How can that be?

The account of Cornelius in Acts 10 is highly instructive and must be studied to understand God's view of what makes a person right in His eyes. Cornelius was one of the most religious people in all of the Bible. The real question is-was he saved or average relationlost? Notice several characteristics about this man.

The Bible says he was "devout" (v. 2). He was a deeply religious and reverent man. Was he saved?

The Bible says he "feared God" (v. 2, 22). He turned from his pagan roots to venerate the true God. Was he saved?

The Bible says he "gave alms generously" (v. 2). He was a generous man toward God and man. Was he saved?

The Bible says he "prayed to God always" (v. 2, 30). He trusted in the one, true God. Was he saved?

The Bible says he led "all his household" to fear God

(v. 2). He was a faithful and strong family man. Was he saved?

The Bible says he was "a just man" (v. 22). He was "righteous" (NASB) and "upright" (ESV). Was he saved?

The Bible says he had "a good reputation (well spoken of) among all the nation of the Jews" (v. 22). Was he saved?

The Bible says he "immediately" followed certain "divine instructions" given to him (v. 22, 33). Was he saved?

> The Bible says he "called together his relatives and close friends" to hear the message from Peter (v. 24). He was evangelistic. Was he saved?

> The Bible says he "fasted" (v. 30). He was earnestly devoted to serving God. Was he saved?

> What a tremendously wonderful man and one of the most devout that is found anywhere in

Scripture. But, the Bible clearly teaches that this man was NOT saved! He was, in fact, lost! He was told to send for Peter. Why? He "will tell you words by which you and all your household will be saved" (11:14). Cornelius was not saved! Peter knew it! Cornelius knew it! And, God knew it!

Only when Cornelius heard the truth and obeyed the truth, including being baptized for the forgiveness of his sins (10:48; 2:38), was he saved. And not before! Human reasoning might lead us to believe he was already saved, and we would be wrong. We must use God's standard, not man's!

What Line Are You Going to Believe?

One line can make all the difference in the world. Many have followed the line of a storm. So much of the possible destruction and chaos is determined by that line and how you look at it. Does it really mean that? Are they really serious? These are questions we ask when determining what will be our

accepted reality, whether we like it or not. One other line that has garnered a lot of opinion is, "He who has believed and has been baptized shall be saved" (Mark 16:15). Here are some of the popular opinions.

"He who has believed and has been baptized, shall NOT be saved." This view is held by at least two groups. First, by those who do not believe in God or the Bible, and therefore do not believe there is any need of saving (Psa. 14:1). Also, those

who believe in a god but not in the God of the Bible or His Son (Rom. 1:23). This is an obvious contradiction to the Bible. The Bible clearly teaches that there is a God, and salvation is found through His Son (1 Tim. 2:3-6).

"He who has NOT believed and has NOT been baptized, shall be saved." This belief is held by those who teach that God will save everyone eventually in some way. This view contradicts Jesus when He said that "few" would find salvation (Matt. 7:13-14). It also contradicts the message of Paul when he mentioned those who would face the wrath of God (Eph. 5:5-6).

"He who has NOT believed and has been baptized, shall be saved." This view is held by anyone who does not think that faith is necessary for salvation. For example, in the case of baptism of infants or for the dead. Faith is an important part of baptism (Acts 8:35-37) and salvation (Rom. 10:9-10). Without it, it is impossible to please God (Heb. 11:6).

"He who has believed and has NOT been baptized, shall be saved." This view is commonly referred to as There is no room faith only. It contends that one is saved before baptism, that baptism is not essential to salvation. The Bible teaches otherwise. Jesus stated that faith alone is not sufficient (Matt. 7:21). The apostles also taught the essential nature of baptism (Rom. 6:17-18; Heb. 5:9; 1 Pet 3:21). James plainly states that faith with-

out works is a dead faith (Jas. 2:17, 26).

What if we take Jesus' words at face value? "He who has believed and has been baptized, shall be saved." There is no room for error with this line. It harmonizes with Jesus and the rest of the New Testament. One must "believe" (Acts 8:36-37) and one must be "baptized" to enjoy the forgiveness of sins (Acts 2:38; 22:16). Only those who come to Jesus in faith and act in harmony with His teachings can have the assurance of salvation. The words of Jesus and the Bible are clear.

Tracing your hupogrammon

One of my favorite Greek words is found in 1 Peter 2:21. In fact, this is the only time the word is found in the Greek New Testament. The English text says, "For to this you were called, because Christ also suffered for us, leaving us an example, that you should follow His steps." The word "example" in this verse (for what Jesus left us) is from the Greek word hupogrammon.

This compound word (from its verb form) literally means "write" (grapho) "under" (hupo). It involves a writing-copy that one was given to imitate. The word was often used of "the copyhead at the top of a child's exercise book for the child to imitate, including all the letters of the alphabet" (Robertson's Word Pictures).

Do you remember those letters that you used to trace, in order to learn how to write your letters? The example was at the top of the page, and you wrote yours right underneath. Jesus is the example for us at the top of our page. Look at Him. Imitate Him. Trace Him. – DS

Two different reactions

7 Characteristics of Successful Parents



Want to learn how to be successful in life? Well, success in life includes your role as a parent. Here are 7 characteristics of successful parents.

1. Successful parents don't expect perfection either from themselves or their children.

Parenting is an art, not a science. Successful parents understand that, like themselves, their children aren't perfect either. This frees them to love their children unreservedly.

2. Successful parents don't fear occasional failures.

They understand that mistakes are a normal, even healthy, part of parenting. They make the best decisions they can and when they're wrong, they learn from their mistakes, and they try to do better the next time.

3. Successful parents don't expect to have smooth sailing.

Children have their own opinions, personalities, and preferences. Inevitably, they cause us to say "Where did THAT come from?" or "What WERE you thinking?" Our responsibility to provide them with limits and guidance will sometimes clash with their growing desire for independence. Successful parents aren't surprised by them; they expect them. But successful parents understand that their responsibility to their children is not to always please them or make them happy – it's to make the hard decisions that will be for their best in the long run.

4. Successful parents don't go it alone.

Successful parenting means trusting yourself, but not being a lone ranger. No one has the experience or answers to every parenting challenge. But each of us has some of the answers and, together, we've got them all. So successful parents aren't reluctant to seek out the wisdom of others. They know that, at the end of the day, the decision is theirs, but before they get there, there is plenty of wisdom along the way waiting to help them.

5. Successful parents try harder.

They face the same pressures we all do – demanding jobs, spouses, and children who need them. But they live by this rule: "You get back what you put in." They have a clear sense of priority for their family and are willing to put in the time to achieve it. They give more than the "average parent" so their children will be more than just "average children." These parents work at nurturing and developing themselves to be the best parents they can be.

6. Successful parents enjoy being parents.

They enjoy parenting not because it's easy or instantly rewarding, but because of the sheer joy and privilege of cooperating with God in shaping another unique and precious life. Any parent of grown children will tell you "they grow up so quickly." Successful parents remind themselves of that and try to savor every day with their children. They immerse themselves in their children as much as possible and just enjoy them – even the days of dirty diapers, illness, and disappointments. They don't just LOVE their children, they LIKE them, and look forward to spending time with them.

7. Successful parents strive to be the person they want their children to become.

There are no formulas for parents. You can't just "program" children like a computer and be guaranteed of the result. But children are great observers and imitators. They watch, listen, and absorb values and habits from the people who have the greatest influence on them – their parents. So successful parents resolve that they will set the best example they can for their children.
