

Truths Found at His Cross

The theme for this year has been "At His Cross." The emphasis for this month is that each of us finds truth at His cross. As you stand at the foot of His cross, what great truths come into your heart? Sometimes our greatest understanding of truth comes in the midst of great trauma.

At His cross, I learn the truth about myself. There

were so many who were impacted by His death and each had his own reason for being there. I wonder if I would have stood beside those who mocked Him? Would I be among those who walked by and kept going with little interest in what was happening? Would I have stood beside His mother and sought to comfort her, or would I have not been there at all like those disciples who fled from the garden? The

answer to these questions might be discovered by seeing what emotions I have during the meditation I do when I commune with Him around the His table.

At His cross, I learn the sinfulness of mankind. Think of all the evil that filled the hearts of those evil men whose agenda brought about His death. Three times Pilate asked these men, "What evil has He done?" (Luke 23:22). There is no answer to this question, for He never did even one thing wrong. The Jews could not find any evidence as to why He should die until two false witnesses lied about what He had said about the temple. Why was the mob so enraged? Why were the words spoken to Him and about Him so filled with such blasphemy? Evil is a reality in our world and it has never been seen more clearly than at the foot of the cross.

At His cross, I learn the truth about my inability to save myself. My own "goodness" could not take away the guilt of only one sin. The only hope I have of heaven is that hanging

> on that cross was the One whose sinless life could redeem me. My sinfulness means I owed a debt, and on that cross was One who paid my debt. There was nothing I could do to remove sin and God sent His son to pay my debt. I feel my sinfulness and helplessness at the cross.

> At His cross, I learn about God's providential love which surrounds me now. Jesus died for

me, a mortal worthy of the torment of hell because of my rebellion. Now if God did that much for me when I was His enemy, how much more will He do for me now that I am His child? Mediate on these words, "But God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us...For if when we were enemies we were reconciled to God through the death of His Son, much more, having been reconciled, we shall be saved by His life" (Rom. 5:8-10). He loved me then and He loves me much more now!

In fact, they were so busy talking that many of them kept right on with their conversations for a few minutes after the man at the front was trying to get worship started. Jesus couldn't really hear what the man was saying because of the other folks around Him, but they eventually (mostly) settled down after a while.

Worship started and Jesus was in His element! He had been anticipating this for days! He heard babies crying and loved it! He saw children sitting with their parents and learning the joy of worshiping God, and He was overcome with emotion! He saw people of all ages and ethnicities joining to-

gether in song, and He wanted to shout for joy!

But then He started to get distracted from looking for a seat. Then another person. And another. And another. He wondered if these people were always late to worshiping God and why it wasn't a priority to them to be there on time. He supposed they were on time for other appointments.

Jesus heard a lot of commotion coming from the lobby area, and so He turned around and saw many folks just sitting out there on the benches (instead of in the auditorium worshiping) and many standing around talking. He even noticed parents had taken their children out of the worship to play in the lobby. His heart was saddened and now distracted.

He turned His attention back to the folks who were in the auditorium, and now many of them seemed preoccupied with looking down at their mobile devices. He was encouraged

Lessons From the Table (Part 2)

We have recorded in the Gospels the teachings of Jesus. These took place in the hills, from a boat, on the road, in the temple and from the table. Let us look at some of the lessons Jesus gave us from the table.

Jesus did not discriminate with whom He ate. Shortly after calling Matthew,

the tax collector, Jesus sat and ate with him and His disciples. The question arose about why He ate with tax collectors and sinners. Jesus answered, "I desire compassion and not sacrifice for I did not come to call the righteous, but sinners" (Matt. 9:13). At the table with Jesus we can learn compassion.

Jesus reclined at the table with Simon, a Pharisee. A woman of the city entered the house and began washing Jesus' feet with her tears and hair, and anointed his feet with perfume. Simon thought to himself that this woman was very sinful. Jesus said to Simon, "Do you see this woman? I entered your house; you gave Me no water for My feet, but she has wet My feet with her tears and wiped them with her hair. You gave Me no kiss; but she, since the time I came in, has not ceased to kiss My feet. You did not anoint My head with oil, but she anointed My feet with perfume. For this reason I say to you, her sins, which are many, have been forgiven, for she loved much; but he who is forgiven

little, loves little" (Luke 7:44-47). At the table with Jesus, we see repentance with great love and the value of forgiveness.

Jesus sat at the table in Bethany, at the home of Simon the leper. During that meal a woman came in and anointed Jesus' head with oil. Some objection is raised as to the waist of such a costly commodity. Jesus responded, "Why do you bother the woman? For she has done a good deed to Me. Truly I say to you, wherever this gospel is preached in the whole

world, what this woman has done will also be spoken of in memory of her" (Matt. 26:10,13). So it is to this day that we learn the value of a good deed, at the table with Jesus.

There are many lessons that Jesus taught around the table. We learn the value of humility, "For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted" (Luke 14:11).

We learn self sacrifice, "While they were eating, Jesus took some bread, and after a blessing, He broke it and gave it to the disciples, and said, 'Take, eat; this is My body'" (Matt. 26:26). We also learn true service, "If I then, the Lord and the Teacher, washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet" (John 13:14). We wish at times to have been with Him around the table. What would we have learned? More importantly than that we should desire to be with Him around His banqueting table and live in such a way to glorify Him.

How "fixed" is your hope?

that a couple of them were faithfully using it as their Bible, but several folks were playing games, surfing the web, scrolling social media, reading Facebook, etc. They seemed more intent on that than on worshiping. He noticed others during the sermon were sitting idly by without a Bible or anything in front of them, and just seemed like they were waiting for it to pass.

After worship, Jesus had so many things running through His head. He didn't even realize until after He had already left that only one person said anything to Him on His way out. He wasn't sure if those folks were truly glad to see Him or not, and He wondered what motivated some of them to be there at all. He had a lot to think about.

The Bible says that Jesus is there in the assembly every week, where He is singing praise (Heb. 2:12) and observing the communion (Matt. 26:29) (and, no doubt, engaging in every other avenue of worship), "there in the midst of them" (Matt. 18:20). To speak of Jesus coming to worship with the church one Sunday is not a hypothetical illustration, for His presence is a promised reality in every assembly.

The question is, what does Jesus see in you when the church assembles? Are you there? Are you on time? Are in you in the assembly or just "in the building somewhere"? Are you eagerly engaged in the worship, or are you distracted and distracting? What message does your assembly behavior send to the visitors? To the members? To Jesus? Think about it.

What Must I Do to Be Saved?

The Bible says...

- 1. Believe that Jesus is the Son of God
 - "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and you will be saved" (Acts 16:31).
- 2. Repent of your sinful ways
 - "Repent therefore and be converted, that your sins may be blotted out" (Acts 3:19).
- 3. Confess your faith in Jesus
 - "If you confess with your mouth the Lord Jesus...you will be saved" (Rom. 10:9).
- 4. Be immersed in water
 - "He who believes and is baptized will be saved" (Mark 16:16).
- 5. Commit to a lifetime of faithful service

"Be faithful until death, and I will give you the crown of life" (Rev. 2:10).
