with the letter demanding immediate surrender is found in Second Kings chapter nineteen. Without a single arrow being shot, there were 185,000 Assyrian soldiers What would you killed in one night. If you do not know this story, take time to read it and have your faith in God's providence overwhelming increased.

Some time later, the prophet Isaiah came to Hezekiah and delivered this message from God. "Set your house in order, for you shall die, and not live" (2

Kings 20:1). Hezekiah's response to this message is found in the rest of this chapter. It is at times like this that we can focus on the really important matters of life and death.

What would you do if you knew that you had just a few days, perhaps just a few hours, to live? What would you do if a doctor you trusted told you to call in Hospice for he had done all he could for you? What would you do if you knew that within a week's time your life would end?

A failure to think about the certainty of death causes

many to be like that rich farmer Jesus told us about. The farmer foolishly said, "Soul, you have many goods laid up for many years; take your ease; eat, drink and be merry" (Luke 12:19). What he did not know was that he would die the same night he said these words. What would he have done differently had he known he was within hours of death? Had you been in his place, what would have done?

> The truth is that while we have not heard the words of a prophet or even the message from a doctor, this could be the last day we would ever live. If this were true, how would you spend today?

Are there words you would say to others? Are there apologies you would make? Would you want to make sure that you had told your mate how precious they are to you? Are there messages you would give to your children to prepare them for what

lies ahead? Are there incidences in your life where your angry words and harsh behavior demand apologies right now? Are there words of appreciation you would want to say to anyone? Are there prayers to God about sins in your life that you would pray?

What would you do if you absolutely knew this would be your last day to live? There is no way to know this, but whatever you might do in such a situation is what you ought to do today. Think about it. Someday will be your last day!

Leprosy is a slow and shameful death. It is no wonder that while Jesus was on his way to Jerusalem 10 lepers from a small village cried out to Him, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!" (Luke 17:13). Jesus simply told them to show themselves to the priest, which is what must be done in order

to be called clean again (Luke 17:14; Lev. 13, 14). As commanded, they begin their journey up to Jerusalem. On their way they are healed. One turns back to praise God and falls on his face before Jesus and thanks Him (Luke 17:15,16). Jesus then asks the question of the Samaritan who had returned, "Where are the nine?" (Luke 17:17).

Being ungrateful is an attribute of those who forsake God. "For even though they knew God, they

did not honor Him as God or give thanks" (Romans 1:21). Being ungrateful is an attribute of the rebellious. "For men will be lovers of self, lovers of money, boastful, arrogant, revilers, disobedient to parents, ungrateful, unholy..." (2 Tim. 3:2). Israel was one of the greatest examples of ungratefulness. From the time they left Egypt, they were already complaining to Moses. We saw that a whole generation had to die in the desert because of their rebellion. In his song and farewell address, Moses reminds the people, "You neglected the Rock who begot you, And forgot the God who gave you birth" (Deut. 32:18).

We have been so blessed by God. "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places in Christ" (Eph. 1:3). "Every good thing given and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shifting shadow (Jas. 1:17). There is a certain "satisfaction" (shall we call it?) when one of our enemies falls into hard times or experiences some calamity in life. There is a sense in which we may think, "They had it coming! Serves them right!" But we need to be ever-so cautious.

> Read these words from Proverbs 24:17-18. "Do not rejoice when your enemy falls, And do not let your heart be glad when he stumbles; Lest the Lord see it, and it displease Him, And He turn away His wrath from him."

Notice that these verses teach that God's "wrath" may be headed the way of our enemy, which is exactly in God's purview, for "vengeance" belongs to Him (Rom 12:19). But, if we "rejoice" at his misfortune, such an action may "please" us but, simultaneously, "displease" the Lord. Let us be careful how we respond and remember that agape "love" (Matt. 5:44) is "kind" (1 Cor. 13:4), which should lead us to "pray" for our enemies, rather than ROFL at them. - DS

Consider God's Creation— Think About God's Greatness

Christians in the 21st century think too little about God's creation; consequently, we think too little about God. We are so enamored with ourselves—our schedules, our work, our technology, our extracurricular activities, etc., that we often fail to see the stars and smell the roses. Today, perhaps more than any time in history, man misses the apparently simple things in life that should cause us to meditate continually upon the greatness of the Creator. Of course, nothing is more important for Christians to meditate on than God's Word (Psalm 1:2; see Lyons, 2011), but in conjunction with God's special revelation (His Word), we ought to ponder about how God's amazing natural revelation testifies to His infinite power, intelligence, and care.

Time and again, Holy Writ points to God's creation as proof of His greatness. Since the time of Job, Noah, and going as far back as Adam, man has learned some wonderful things about God by considering His amazing creation. Paul wrote: **"Since the creation of the world** His invisible attributes are clearly seen, being understood **by the things that are made**, even His eternal power and Godhead" (Romans 1:20, emp. added).

Perhaps no other book of the Bible leads man to deeper meditation on God's greatness than the book of Psalms. Yet, interestingly, oftentimes this same inspired book turns man's attention to **God's creation**. In Psalm 8, for example, the psalmist praised the excellent name of the Lord Who set His "glory above the heavens," Who made the Moon, stars, man, and even "the beasts of the field, the birds of the air, and the fish of the sea that pass through the paths of the seas." What did the psalmist conclude? "O Lord, our Lord, how excellent is Your name in all the earth!" (Psalm 8:9). In Psalm 19:1, we are reminded that "[t]he heavens declare the glory of God; and the firmament shows His handiwork." In Psalm 33, we learn of one of the reasons that humanity is to fear and stand in awe of the Lord (33:8) —because "by the word of the Lord the heavens were made, and all the host of them by the breath of His mouth..... For He spoke, and it was done; He commanded, and it stood fast" (33:6,9).

Consider the climax of the book of Job, when God spoke to the patriarch out of a whirlwind. Instead of informing Job of the exact reasons for his serious suffering, God spoke to him about His creation. Beginning in Job 38:39 and going through chapters 39, 40, and 41, God spoke to Job about several different animals, including the lion, the hawk, Behemoth, and Leviathan. Of all of the things God could have said to Job, He spent some 77 verses talking about some of His animal creation. He chose to teach Job about His all-powerful, all-knowing, supreme nature by describing some of His magnificent animal creation.

The prophet Isaiah once wrote about being allowed to see a vision of the throne of God. In the Lord's presence were angelic beings crying out one to another, "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts" (Isaiah 6:3). What is the basis of this praise? What is one reason we should be driven to worship God? Isaiah revealed one of the pillars of God's praise in the very next line: "**The whole earth is full of His glory**" (6:3).

Indeed, the beauty, splendor, and design of God's creation should drive us closer to the Creator. His "fingerprints" should make us stand in awe of Him. They should drive us to our knees in worship of Him. And they should compel us to tell others about Him. As the psalmist sang, we should "declare **His glory** among the nations, **His wonders** among all peoples. For the Lord is great and greatly to be praised" (96:3-4).
