Churches Without Elders, Still Have a Shepherd

We have often pointed out that there is a way of remembering the six words used to describe elders that can be easily remembered. Take the first letter of each of the six words and form a new word. Because an elder must have children, just remember this truth, "Elders must BE-POPS." Those six

words? B=bishops; E=elders; P=presbyters; O=overseers; P=pastors and S=shepherds. Each of these words emphasize an important aspect of what an elder must be and what he must do.

God's desire is for every church to have elders. Paul, on his first missionary journey, established many churches in Asia Minor. After he arrived at the most distant city, Derbe, he began appointing elders. "And when they had preached the gospel to

that city and made many disciples, they returned to Lystra, Iconium and Antioch...So when they had appointed elders in every church and prayed with fasting, they commended them to the Lord in whom they had believed" (Acts 14:21-23).

It is important to notice the importance of every church having elders. Because of abilities imparted when receiving the Holy Spirit through the laying on of the apostles' hands, these infant churches were able to develop elders more quickly than in our day.

Elders have no authority outside of the local congregation. Peter described their work and the limits of their authority. "Shepherd the flock of God which is among you, serving as overseers" (1 Pet. 5:2). God limits the work of the elder to the flock where he lives. He cannot rule over multiple churches.

Because elders must be spiritually mature men, some congregations do not have elders. One of the qualifications for

> an elder is that he cannot be a novice, a new convert (1 Tim. 3:6). Those who preach in those places and those who are leaders should set as one of their highest priorities to develop elders. Appointing men to be elders who are not spiritually qualified, just so a church can have men called elders, creates many problems. Until that time arrives, church leaders must ensure that the church is fed, restoring the

wayward is not neglected and the church is led to have peace—still waters and green pastures.

Even without elders to shepherd them, a church is still God's flock. One point overlooked is that Jesus is described as the "Chief Shepherd" (1 Pet. 5:6). Churches without an eldership still have this Shepherd. He may not be physically present, but He is in their midst overseeing them and providing food for every sheep. If you are a member of a congregation without elders, do not think that you have no Shepherd.

Take Heed, Lest I Fall

There are some people who teach that once a person is saved and becomes a Christian that it is impossible for such a person to fall away from the Lord. While such a doctrine can be very comforting, it finds no foundation in Scripture. The Bible does not teach that a Christian cannot fall, and it actu-

ally teaches emphatically against such a dangerous doctrine. Read 2 Peter 2:20-22; Galatians 5:1-4; James 5:19-20; Hebrews 3:7-19; 6:4-6; 1 Timothy 4:1; etc. In these texts (and others), the Lord clearly teaches that one can fall away, He warns against it, and He gives numerous examples of it happening. Every Christian we are "safe" in should truly "take heed lest he fall" (1 Cor. 10:12).

While many New Testament Christians to-**Christian life** day know that the Bible does not teach the impossibility of apostasy—and they themselves do not teach or believe the doctrine—there are some who, nevertheless, are living like such a doctrine is true. They would not admit that, but an examination of their lives would lead to that conclusion.

Would you take a moment and search within your heart? Does the way that you are living support the idea that you, as a Christian, could never fall? Or does the way that you are living indicate that you are diligently trying to make your call and election sure? Some of us may be on dangerous ground, believing that we are "safe" in our self-defined Christian life and going about trying to be of the world and of Christ at the same time. Such will not work. God warns us, "Let him who thinks he stands take heed lest he fall" (1 Cor. 10:12).

Can you truly expect that you won't fall if you don't read God's Word regularly and feed upon it like you do your physical nourishment (1 Pet. 2:2; 2 Tim. 2:15)?

Can you truly expect that you won't fall if you don't pray regularly and keep a constantly open line of communication with your God (1 Thess. 5:17; ground, believing Phil. 4:6-7)?

> Can you truly expect that you won't fall if you don't worship the Lord every first day of the week-both attending and actually worshiping, which are not necessarily the same thing (Heb. 10:25; Matt. 4:10; 6:33)?

Can you truly expect that you won't fall if you don't regularly and unselfishly serve others in the church (Matt. 25:31-46; Gal. 5:13; 6:10)?

Can you truly expect that you won't fall if you don't talk about the Lord and the gospel with unbelievers and try to teach them the way of salvation (Mark 16:15-16; 1 Pet. 3:15)?

Jesus said, "Blessed is that servant whom his master, when he comes, will find so doing" (Matt. 24:46). Is that you?

I Saw That Coming

Have you ever watched a terribly predictable movie? After twenty minutes, or less, the plot rears its boring head and you know everything that is going to happen. It wasn't your keen sense of deduction or mental prowess that ferreted out the details. In the place of subtle foreshadowing, these

movies leave a trail of whole loaves instead of crumbs. Hallmark is the worse peddler for predictability. In the Christmas season, a decent plot is sidelined for a quick, sometimes unlikely, romance with a Christmas miracle. These leave you thinking, "I saw that coming."

When you start reading through the Bible, there are some patterns that emerge that leave you thinking the same thing. It has nothing to do with the brilliance of inspired authors. It has to do with the predictability of humans. With some exceptions, we are terribly predictable. The cycle of sin that plays over and over throughout our history with God is quite repetitive. Start with Adam and Eve and the original sin (Gen. 3). In the time of Noah, "God looked on the earth, and behold, it was corrupt; for all flesh had corrupted their way upon the earth" (Gen. 6:12). When we get to the period of the Hebrew people learning to trust God, we see the same cycle. Soon after leaving Egypt, they begin grumbling about going back (Ex. 15). At Sinai, Aaron built a golden calf

and the people worshipped it (Ex. 32). The ten spies gave an unfaithful report and a whole generation was doomed to die in the desert (Num. 13-14). There was the rebellion of Korah in which the ground opened up and swallowed all the people and possessions of those rebellious people (Num. 16). When you get to the book of Judges, the people make a covenant with the Canaanites, then begin to serve Baal and the Ashtaroth (Judg. 2). Space would fail me to write of all the disobedience of God's people throughout the ages.

These have been used as examples in the New Testament to warn us against that same cycle. The author of Hebrews writes, "Take care, brethren, that there not be in any one of you an evil, unbelieving heart that falls away from the living God" (Heb. 3:12). "Therefore let us be diligent to enter that rest, so that no one will fall, through following the same

example of disobedience" (Heb. 4:11). "See to it that you do not refuse Him who is speaking. For if those did not escape when they refused him who warned them on earth, much less will we escape who turn away from Him who warns from heaven" (Heb. 12:25).

The end of the disobedient is terribly predictable. God warns us not to follow the same path (Matt. 7:13). When the time comes for our judgment, we want to be able to say with joy, "I saw this coming," as we enter into the promised rest.

Expiration date

Some expiration dates probably get your attention more than others. What about expiration dates on coupons? If you had a coupon for a free meal, would you pay attention to that expiration date? After that date, you'd be out of luck.

Would it get your attention to know that you have an expiration date on you? A date after which your saving will no longer be possible? Each of us has an expiration date—representing either the day that we die or the day that Christ returns. The problem is that you don't know what your date is. Your expiration date could be today, could be tomorrow, could be five years from now.

So, what do you do? The same thing you'd do if you had a coupon for a free car. Take advantage of that soul "savings" today—in case today is your expiration date. What do you need to do today? -DS

Create in me a clean heart

David needed forgiveness. After David had lusted for Bathsheba, sinned with Bathsheba, deceived Uriah and murdered Uriah, he was in a very bad place. Having added "sin to sin," he desperately needed God's saving grace.

But David asked for more than forgiveness. In Psalm 51, he

immediately asked the Lord, "Blot out my transgressions. Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity, and cleanse me from my sin" (51:1-2). David wanted the sin, with its guilt, removed from his account. But then he went further than that. More than just pardon from past sins, David pleaded for the ability to keep himself from sin-

ning again. He begged the Lord, "Create in me a clean heart" (51:10).

"Out of the heart" proceed "evil things" (Mark 7:21-23), so David asked that the Lord might create within him a clean heart that would not want to do these evils again. The next time we ask the Lord for forgiveness from past sins, let's ask Him to create a clean heart that will not want to do those same sins again in the future. -DS




