An Eternal Crown

The football season is about to end. High school state champions for various size schools have been recognized. The colleges have crowned division champions and conference champions. This year there were 40 winners in the bowl games. Next week the national collegiate team will receive its tro-

phy. Then, next month there will be the Super Bowl trophy.

The awarding of trophies and crowns is not a recent practice. The victors in the ancient Olympiclike contests were awarded a wreath, a garland of leaves (the Greek word is stephanos). They used another word (diadema) to describe crowns of gold worn by rulers. This word is found only in Revelation. It was first worn by the dragon and beast, then by the victorious King of kings who triumphs over all evil rulers and wears many crowns (Rev. 12:3; 13:1; 19:12).

It is remarkable how often our life and its eternal rewards are described using the garland crowns of ancient times. It is ironic (or is it providential) that the same concept is still found in sports around the world in the 21st century. The garland trophy given to us is so different from the ancient ones.

That crown given to the ancients is described as a perishable one. "Now they do it to obtain a perishable crown, but we for an imperishable crown" (1 Cor. 9:25). Those crowns made of woven olive branches would soon dry out and become brittle. Ours is so different. It is eternal. Paul continues by describing how he ran to become victorious.

The Bible mentions at least four aspects of our eternal crown. It is so different from all other crowns.

What is our crown made of? That dragon and that beast may have a golden diadem made by a man, but our gar-

> land crown is made by God. "Be faithful until death and I will give you a crown of life" (Rev. 2:10). Our crown is eternal, it is a garland crown of eternal life.

> It is a crown of righteousness (2 Tim. 4:8). Paul came to the end of his life. He had finished the race and approached the finish line. He had overcome the power of sin and Satan, and God declares him righteous. His life's choices were vindicated. Our righteous God awards a righteous crown.

It is a crown of glory. "When the Chief Shepherd appears, then you will receive the crown of glory which does not fade away" (1 Pet. 5:4). Our glorious God will reward us with His glory. What an amazing crown.

Finally, we are not given a crown, but we become a crown. Isaiah described us when he said, "You shall be a crown of glory in the hand of the Lord" (Isa. 62:30). We honor Him by faithful service, and He honors us by making us His crown!



My God Is Holy, Holy, Holy

When the prophet Isaiah had the privilege of peering into the heavenly realm of the Almighty God and to see Him sitting on His throne and to see the activity of the heavenly beings around Him, the prophet was overwhelmed with awe at what he saw

and heard. The cry of those in the presence of Jehovah penetrated the ears and the heart, "Holy, holy, holy

is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of His glory!" (Isa. 6:3). Isaiah's immediate and instinctive response was to yield to the Lord, "Use me!" What an experience! What a heart!

The apostle John apparently saw the same awe-inspiring scene and heard the same glorious praise. The ceaseless cry of those in the presence of Jehovah penetrates the ears and the heart, "Holy,

holy, holy, Lord God Almighty, Who was and is and is to come!" (Rev. 4:8). What an experience that must have been!

In both the Old Testament and the New Testament, we find only one quality of God in triplicate: His holiness. He is almighty and gracious and loving and faithful. But none of these characteristics are shouted in triplicate around His throne. His holiness is His defining quality—identifying both who and what He is. It is that guality, above all others, that ought to impact and shape my life in striving to serve Him.

There are certain things that my holy God calls upon me TO DO. He tells me to submit to Him (Jas. 4:7), to yield my will to His will (Jas. 4:15), to seek His church first in my life (Matt. 6:33), to worship Him every week (Heb. 10:25; 1 Cor. 16:1-2; 11:17-34), to put others ahead of myself (Phil. 2:3-4), to serve my brethren (Gal. 5:13), to honor my elders (Heb. 13:17), to seek the lost (Luke 19:10), to teach others the gospel of Christ (Mark 16:15), etc. There are a number of reasons for

me to do these things, but perhaps above all others is that my God is holy, holy, holy! If I want to be like Him and honor Him, then I must also be holy in all of my conduct (1 Pet. 1:15). That impacts my thoughts, my choices, my words, my actions—my whole life.

Likewise, there are certain things that my holy God calls upon me NOT TO DO. He tells me to abstain from fleshly lusts (1 Pet. 2:11), sexual immo-

rality (1 Thess. 4:3), alcoholic beverage (Eph. 5:18; 1 Pet. 4:3), filthy language (Col. 3:8), covetousness (Heb. 13:5), anger (Col. 3:8), hatred (Gal. 5:20), yes, every form of evil in general (1 Thess. 5:22). I will be eager to refrain from these things because my God is holy, holy, holy, and I want to (1) please Him and (2) be like Him. Striving to be holy, like Him, impacts my thoughts, my choices, my words, my actions—my whole life.

May my instinctive response to God's holiness be like Isaiah—a yielding heart that says, "Here am I, Lord. Use me!"

There are four aspects of our eternal crown. They are so different.



Are Your Words Healthy?

You might be one of them, one of the many that take the opportunity of a new year to evaluate their health. This is not a bad idea but consider another point. How is your teaching? Specifically, what you teach. Is it healthy?

We have all heard or read about "sound doctrine." The word hugiaino, translated "sound," liter-

ally means healthy in the New Testament. It is used today in a similar way when referring to those of sound mind. What we teach needs to be examined in We should speak pose that godliness is a means of gain" (1 Tim. 6:3-5). light of some key passages.

Paul wrote to Titus with this imperative, "But as for you, speak the things which are fitting for sound doctrine" (Tit. 2:1). This is something we should consider. The words we speak concerning the

truths of the Bible should be healthy. We should be careful not to propagate or promote untruths. It is easy to hear, read or post things that sound good but upon further inspection are not true. This is so important that it is among the qualifications of elders listed in Titus: "For the overseer must be above reproach as God's steward, not self-willed, not quick-tempered, not addicted to wine, not pugnacious, not fond of sordid gain, but hospitable, loving what is good, sensible, just, devout, selfcontrolled, holding fast the faithful word which is in accordance with the teaching, so that he will be able both to exhort in sound doctrine and to refute those who contradict" (1:7-9).

To Timothy Paul wrote, "If anyone advocates a different doctrine and does not agree with sound words, those of our Lord Jesus Christ, and with the doctrine conforming to godliness, he is conceited and understands nothing; but he has a morbid interest in controversial questions and disputes about words, out of which arise envy, strife, abusive language, evil

suspicions, and constant friction between men of depraved mind and deprived of the truth, who sup-When someone is purposefully not holding to healthy teaching, they are labeled as "conceited." It is easy to see the opposite of healthy teaching in this passage.

Lastly, in his second letter to Timothy: "For the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine; but wanting to have their ears tickled, they will accumulate for themselves teachers in accordance to their own desires, and will turn away their ears from the truth and will turn aside to myths" (4:3-4). Sometimes it doesn't matter what we say or teach. People will only hear what they want to hear. There are people who are looking for the truth. Sadly, there are more people who are looking for teaching based on their own desires. We should speak and teach truth, healthy doctrine.

What kind of friend are you?

Sometimes in friendships, there is "the giver" and "the taker." "The giver" is the one who goes out of her way to check on her friend, to be there when times are tough, to be available at a moment's notice, to lend a listening and sympathetic ear, to help whenever and whatever the need might be, etc. "The taker," on the other hand, is the one who is "always" taking

advantage and asking for help, expecting a willing hand, venting personal grievances, focusing on inequities, complaining about the slightest slights, keeping a ledger of who has done more in the friendship, controlling most of the interaction that takes place in the friendship, etc.

So, what kind of friend are you? Jesus was a friend who cared (Matt. 9:36). Jesus was a friend who listened (Mark 5:33-36). Jesus was a friend who served His friends without being asked (John 13:1-17). Jesus was a friend who graciously handled interruptions (Mark 1:35-37) and disappointments in His friends (Luke 9:38-41). As a friend, Jesus was a "giver." Are you? - DS

Is it wrong to suneudokeo evil, even if I don't do it?

Was it right of the Jewish leaders in Jesus' day to "approve" (Greek: *suneudokeo*) of their forefathers killing God's prophets (Luke 11:47-48)? Of course not! Was it right of Saul of Tarsus to "consent" (Greek: suneudokeo) to the murder of Stephen (Acts 8:1; 22:20)? Of course not!



and teach truth,

healthy doctrine.

That same Greek word is found in Romans 1:32, after a long listing of "unrighteous" deeds. The text states that "those who practice such are worthy of death," but they are not the only guilty ones in this text. The "righteous judgment of God" is also directed against those who

"approve of those who practice" the evil deeds. The word "approve" is from the Greek compound word sun ("with"), eu ("well"), dokeo ("to think"). Thus, it literally means, "to think well with."

Read Romans 1. Do you "think well with," agree with or approve of any of the unrighteousness detailed in verses 18-32 (including the practice of homosexuality)? God's judgment is just as real against those who "approve" as it is against those who "practice." Give that some thought. - DS
