60,000 Americans Likely to Die of Coronavirus

The "Grim Reaper of Death" is sweeping through our land. It now appears that the coronavirus will kill 60,000 fellow Americans. We probably are thinking more of death than we have in a long time. If you have not been thinking of it, it might be wise for each of us to realize how uncertain life is.

As a nation, we are concerned about how many will die because of coronavirus but seem to have no interest at all in others who are being killed. We became aware of COVID-19 in January, and about 16,000 Americans have died because of it. Think of that number and contrast it with the fact that during that same period of time over 236,000 abortions have been performed in America. Nothing is said about these deaths, but the news constantly updates virus deaths. We pray for God to use us to reach others. Knowing that this virus and the vast number who will die from it has many thinking about death opens doors before us. When you call others to check on them, why not humbly ask if they have thought about dying from this virus, and if they did would they be saved?



When Paul Was Quarantined: The Joys of Being a Christian

While he was

shut up, he was

not shut off from

his brethren!

Paul spent two years quarantined as a Roman prisoner. What a horrible experience that must have been! He must have been miserable and maybe even started to question God. Right? Wrong! Just the opposite! Paul was anything but miserable! In fact, although he was a prisoner, he still

found a way to enjoy fellowship with his brethren. The text states that he kept on (the tense indicates continual action) "welcoming all who came to him" (Acts 28:30). While he was shut up, he was not shut off from his brethren! It was during this time that Paul wrote a letter to his Christian friends in Philippi expounding the many joys of being a Christian.

While in quarantine, Paul focused on the amazing joy of fellowship with his brethren. He was separated from them by hundreds of miles and yet he still felt a closeness with them. "I thank my God...for your fellowship in the gospel...you all are partakers with me of grace" (Phil. 1:3-7). The word "fellowship" involved a joint participation and partnership together—in this case, it was a sharing in the blessings and the purpose of being fellow Christians. There

was a "togetherness" that they enjoyed, even though they

were not "together." A quarantine could not separate them.

While in quarantine, Paul focused on the selfless joy

of serving each other. Service is really easy to see, sometimes, in certain brethren, isn't it? Some brethren seem to be natural at "doing good unto others, especially those in the household of faith" (cf. Gal. 6:10). Paul commended Timothy as one who would "sincerely care for your state" (2:20). He praised Ephaphroditus, who "came close to death" in bringing the latest "gift" of "care" and "service toward" Paul while he was in prison (2:30; 4:10, 18). In fact, what the Philippian brethren

> were doing for Paul was merely a reflection of what they saw Paul doing for them, for he was literally "being poured out as a drink offering on the sacrifice and service of [their] faith" (2:17). A quarantine would not stop them from serving each other.

> While in quarantine, Paul focused on the anticipatory joy of being together again. ferred to his Christian friends as "my beloved and

longed-for brethren" (4:1). While Paul could have been pessimistic, focusing on the present circumstances and thinking he would never see them again, he lived with confidence that he would "continue with" them (1:24-26) and that he himself "shall also come shortly" to them (2:24). A quarantine was not only going to not get him down, it seemed to drive him even more to want to be with his brethren.

Although Paul was separated from his brethren, he was constantly thinking of them and of the joys of Christianity.

Seven Things the Lord Loves (Part 1)

those things that

He loves.

Solomon makes a list in Proverbs chapter six of seven things that the Lord hates. We often think of the list of seven deadly sins, but that is not a biblical list. That list is attributed to a fourth century monk. It should be stated that God hates all sins and no sin is greater than another. All sins will

separate us from God if it wasn't for the blood of Christ. While this list states the negative, in Hebrew Proverbs the opposite is usually understood to be true. Let's look To please the at this list as highlighting what God loves.

The first thing that God hates is a "proud Lord we must do look" or "haughty eyes" (Prov. 6:17). This is the idea of pride. We understand the problem that pride possesses to pleasing God. The proud will not subject themselves to God. The opposite of pride is humility.

We are to "clothe yourselves with humility toward one another" and "humble yourselves under the mighty hand of God," for "God is opposed to proud, but gives grace to the humble" (1 Pet. 5:5-6).

The second sin is a "lying tongue," the opposite of which is speaking truth (Prov. 6:17). Liars receive a scathing rebuke in the book of Revelation. They are listed among those that will burn in a lake of fire and not enter into heaven (Rev. 21:8, 27). We should be "laying aside falsehood, speak truth each one of you with his neighbor" (Eph. 4:25). We should also "speak the truth in love" (Eph. 4:15).

The third sin is "hands that shed innocent blood" (Prov. 6:17). The opposite of this is obvious. We should not kill innocent people. This also highlights another reason why abortion is sinful. However, another aspect in this is what we do with our hands. Our hands represent what we do. That is why men pray "lifting up holy hands" (1 Tim. 2:8). Lifting holy

> hands is not a posture of praise but a metaphor of a life lived in holiness. This passage speaks to the condition of the heart when leading the congregation in prayer. That is why the Bible says, "Cleanse your hands, you sinners; and purify your hearts, you double-minded" (Jas. 4:8). What we do with our hands is tied closely with the purity of our hearts or minds.

The fourth sin is "a heart that devises wicked plans" (Prov. 6:18). Jesus said, "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God" (Matt. 5:8). We must have a pure heart. We can have one by pursuing "righteousness, faith, love and peace, with those who call on the Lord from a pure heart" (2 Tim. 2:22). We need to "Watch over your heart with all diligence, for from it flow the springs of life" (Prov. 4:23), being careful with what influences we have on our hearts. To please the Lord, we must do those things that He loves and take them to heart. We will look at the final three next week.
