

Open Doors Will Be Closed

Jesus' words in the parable of the ten virgins have a great application in the way we live our lives. Those virgins who failed to bring enough oil for their lamps found themselves unprepared for the arrival of the bridegroom. When he came, the wedding celebration began, and they were not

included. His words? "And the door was shut" (Matt. 25:10).

The door was shut. What a vivid description to emphasize that in our lives there are opportunities which come our way, and we must react immediately or that open door may be shut for us. This is especially true of those times when our hearts are being convicted to obey the gospel, and we fail to them before they Him, but it is the easiest time. When Paul preached respond. Look at some of these events which come to us in the lives of almost every one of us.

The Open Door When We Are Young

Solomon said, "Remember now your Creator in the days of your youth" (Ecc. 12:1). One of the most wonderful experiences is to watch the innocent faith of toddlers grow and grow until that time when they choose to become Christians. Timothy is a Biblical example of this. We should not be surprised that when, as a very young man, he was taught by Paul he became a Christian. This was because his mother and grandmother's faith was seen by Timothy (even though his father was a pagan). The foundation of that faith was taught to him. Paul said that the knowledge of the Scriptures started when Timothy was a child (the Greek word used is infancy), and this resulted in Timothy obeying the gospel (2 Tim. 3:15).

Now suppose Timothy had not failed to remember his Creator. Listen to the rest of Solomon's words. "...before the difficult days come, and the years draw near when you say, 'I have no pleasure in them." Those who do not remember Him

> when they are young may find that as they get older the time arrives when that door is shut.

The Open Door Later in Life

Youth is not the only time we can follow the door to the Roman governor, Felix trembled. There was an open door. How did he respond? "Go away for now; when I have a convenient time I will

call for you" (Acts 24:25). As far as we know, that time never came. Is it possible that you are close to becoming a Christian, but you think a better time will come? It may never come.

The Final Door Permanently Closed

Remember this. When you draw your last breath the door truly will be shut, never to be opened again. God says, "Now is the accepted time; behold, now is the day of salvation" (2 Cor. 6:2). Do not let the door close before you!



You Can't Be Putting the Church First If...

Christ will not accept second place in our lives. As our Creator (Col. 1:16), our Sustainer (Col. 1:17), our Savior (Phil. 3:20) and our Lord (Acts 10:36), He expects and demands to "have first place in everything" (Col. 1:18). Second place is not an option (cf. Rev. 3:16).

It is evident that such priority and preeminence ap-

plies to His body, His church, as well. The Bible reveals that Jesus loves the church so much (i.e., it is of such preeminent importance to Him) that He "gave Himself for her" (Eph. 5:25). How important is the church to be to Christians today? Jesus states it plainly, "Seek first His kingdom" (Matt. 6:33). Second place is not an option! A serious question for every Christian, therefore, today is, Do I have the church

"first" in my life? There are a number of litmus tests to answer that question, but Scripture provides one very clear indicator.

If the church is first in my life (and if Christ is first), then "His righteousness" will be first (Matt. 6:33). "His righteousness" entails much in the Christian life, for Scripture teaches that "all Your commandments are righteousness" (Psa. 119:172). Rather than define or follow our "own righteousness," we must submit "to the righteousness of God" (Rom. 10:3). This includes what happens on the Lord's Day.

If the church and God's righteousness are first in my life, then gathering with the church on the Lord's Day will be first in my life. Five times in 1 Corinthians 11 (the latter half of the chapter being devoted to correcting the church's observation of the Lord's Supper), Paul talks about the first day of the week being when the church would "come together" (11:17, 18, 20, 33, 34). If I do not "come together" with the church each Sunday, can I truly say the church is first in my life?

If the church is first in my life, then "His righteousness" will be first

The focal point of the "coming together" (as emphasized by the aorist infinitive in 1 Corinthians 11:20 and Acts 20:7) is "to eat the Lord's Supper" (i.e., "to break bread"). On every first day of the week, the New Testament Christian is to gather with fellow Christians to engage in "communion" (1 Cor. 10:16) with them and with the Lord Himself (Matt. 26:29). If I do not "commune" in the Lord's Supper

with the church each Sunday, can I truly say the church is first in my life?

I cannot say that the church and God's righteousness are first in my life if, by choice, I am "forsaking the assembling of ourselves together" (Heb. 10:25). When I willfully absent myself from worshiping God on the first day of the week, I am choosing to put Him and His church in some place other than first. Fellow Christian, you can't be putting the church first if you're not putting the worship assembly first!

Open doors lie before us, but we must enter close



Lighthouses

Lighthouses have always been a comfort to those that see them. Lighthouses have been around since ancient times. The most famous was the lighthouse of Alexandria on the Nile River Delta. It was built between 280-247 BC almost three hundred years before Christ was born. It is estimated

to have stood 330 feet high and was one of the seven wonders of the ancient world. Lighthouses have two basic purposes—to provide navigational assistance and to warn of the dangers in the water.

Light is something that naturally serves those two purposes. John talks about Jesus as, "The Light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not comprehend it" (John 1:5). The word comprehend literally means that the darkness couldn't overtake

the light. John also wrote, "There was the true Light which, coming into the world, enlightens every man" (John 1:9). He sets out the two purposes of light at the very beginning of his letter—to shine into the darkness and to enlighten, or make known, to every man.

We might ask ourselves, are we continuing that same practice? Are we being the lighthouses along the shore? Are we keeping the lower lights burning? We have been told to be lights. "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden; nor does anyone light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on the lampstand, and it gives light to all who are in the house. Let your light shine before men in such a way that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father who is in heaven" (Matt. 5:14-16). When we became Christians, we were "called out of darkness into His marvelous light" (1 Pet. 2:9). For this reason, John warns us again, "This is the message we have heard from Him and announce to you,

that God is Light, and in Him there is no darkness at all. If we say that we have fellowship with Him and yet walk in the darkness, we lie and do not practice the truth; but if we walk in the Light as He Himself is in the Light, we have fellowship with one another, and the blood of Jesus His Son cleanses us from all sin" (1 John 1:5-7).

God has supplied everything for us to be able to shine that light into the darkness. If we have been made a part of His light, then we know enough to shine that light and warn others. This is not an optional action on our part. Light can't help but shine. So, we are light, or we are darkness. We shine when we live righteous lives before men (Eph. 5:11-16). We are to warn and help them not make a wreck of their lives. If we are to be true lighthouses, we cannot move, we remain constant, and we shine as bright as possible. We should be monoliths of truth. We should never do anything that would dim our ability to shine.

Yet, do you know that those are the exact words that God used to depict the world in which His first-century followers were living—2,000 year ago? The word

"crooked" emphasizes ones who are warped, having turned from the truth and toward depravity. The word "perverse" means that which is twisted and distorted. Yes, that is our world today!

So, what should we do about it? This text tells us to live as "children of God," untainted by our evil generation, "among whom you shine as lights in the world" (Phil. 2:14). Among a crooked and perverse people, God tells us to live right, do right and let the light of the gospel shine through us into the darkness of moral decay! Can it make a difference? Maybe not with the majority, but what about with just one person? What if one person today turned from the crooked and perverse to the straight and narrow because of you? – DS

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
