

New Study on Tuesday Morning

I just "googled" on the internet and asked this question. How many different denominations are there? There were various answers because there is no precise, uniform definition as to what a denomination is which makes it difficult to answer, but the answer given is astounding.

What would be your answer to this question? You

look around where you live and there are older religions which have been around for centuries. Then, there are newer denominations beginning in the community church movement. As you drive around you see new churches beginning often as small groups in local abandoned shops. You watch the news and hear how even the older denominations are splitting over moral issues like homosexuality and

the sanctity of marriage. Just how many denominations are there with doctrines and practices which separated them from others. What would be your answer to the question?

The answer given? There are at least 34,000 and possibly 41,000 denominations in our world! Contrast this with the reality that in the first century there were no denominations at all. Every church was like every other church (1 Cor. 4:17), and any departure from uniformity was confronted and dealt with. There was just one body of believers. Some may think such could not exist but read the words of Paul. "Now I beseech you, brethren, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye all speak the same thing, and that there be no divisions among you; but that ye be perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the same judgment" (1 Cor. 1:10). God does not demand the impossible, but if such were followed today there would not be a single denomination.

How did all of this come about? Beginning this Tuesday morning, we will find the answer. The class is open to everyone, and if you have any interest in finding the answer make your plans to become part of this study. Let me encourage those of you who have attended the Tuesday class to make sure others be an interesting know about the class. It will be a great way to let neighbors and friends find the answer.

> What did "Christendom" look like in the centuries immediately following the establishment of the church? What did it look like a thousand years after the church began? We know what it looks like today-from one uniform church to over 30,000 different churches-how did all of this come about? Read those words of Paul again and think of the fact that we are not all speaking the same thing with the same judgment about God's truth.

> It will be a great study. Make your plans to be at this one-hour weekly study beginning Tuesday at 10:30.



Jesus Suffered for Us! Meditate on That!

The word "suffer," in some form, is found 81 times in the New Testament. It is used of the trials through which Christians go, the physical calamities that come upon individuals, the eternal punishment awaiting the wicked, etc. But more than anything else in the New Testament, the word "suffer" is

used (at least 27 times) of Christ and what He endured on behalf of mankind (i.e., on behalf of you and me). Slowly read through and consider what is said.

Christ Himself foretold what awaited Him in the days ahead. He knew that He would "suffer many things...be rejected, ad be killed" (Mark 8:31; cf. Matt. 16:21; Luke 9:22). Later He said again that He would "suffer many things and be treated with contempt...at their hands" (Mark 9:12; Matt. 17:12;

cf. Luke 17:25). He desired to eat the Passover with His disciples, "Before I suffer" (Luke 22:15). Upon His resurrection, Christ "presented Himself alive after His sufferings" (Acts 1:3) and reaffirmed that it was "necessary for the Christ to suffer these things" (Luke 24:26, 46). Amazingly, none of this was a surprise to our Savior, for "God foretold by the mouth of all of His prophets, that that Christ would suffer" (Acts 3:18; cf. 26:23). Peter even referred to the Spirit who inspired those prophets as "the Spirit of Christ," who "testified beforehand the sufferings of Christ" (1 Pet. 1:11).

As one would expect, the suffering of Christ was a central theme in the preaching of the apostles and early Chris-In fact, Paul's "custom" involved "explaining and tians. demonstrating that the Christ had to suffer and rise again" (Acts 17:3). The writer of Hebrews and the apostle Peter referenced the "sufferings" of Christ (by that term) more than any other New Testament writers. Christ came to this earth, being "made a little lower than the angels," with His eye

> on "the suffering of death" (Heb. 2:9). He "suffered" (2:18), yes, He "suffered outside the gate" (13:12), and the text says that "He learned obedience" and was made "perfect" "by the things which He suffered" (2:10; 5:8).

> Peter was particularly sensitive to this matter for a number of reasons, but certainly so because he was "a witness of the sufferings of

Christ" (1 Pet. 5:1). The apostle not only focused on the fact of Christ's sufferings, but he gave particular emphasis to the reason "for" it. "Christ also suffered for us" (1 Pet. 2:21), yes, He "suffered for us in the flesh" (4:1). Why did He suffer for us? "Christ also **suffered once for sins**, the just for the unjust, that He might bring us to God" (3:18). There you have the whole point. Christ suffered and died. Not for Himself! But for us! And not just "for us," but "for our sins." And, why did He do that? "That He might bring us to God!" Thanks be to God for the love of our Savior and for all that He suffered for us!

Wisdom Will Protect

In these times it seems science trumps spirituality, philosophy over piety, and glamour glitters more than goodness. While that is true, it isn't new to our time. There have always been these sentiments from one generation to the next. There may have been golden eras when things were

better than they are now, but Adam and Eve enjoyed the only truly perfect age. So today things aren't great. They don't look like they are going to get any better. How do we prepare the generations to come for the unforeseen horrors that lay before them? What new moral, social and philosophical advances will our children need to be prepared for? The answer is we don't know. However, we can take comfort in these words, "there is nothing new under the sun," "His divine power has granted to us everything pertaining

to life and godliness," "I [Jesus] have overcome the world" (Eccl. 1:9, 2 Pet. 1:3; John 16:33). How do we prepare the generations to come for the unforeseen horrors that lay before them?

We must keep them grounded in God's wisdom in order to prepare them for what they will encounter. There is a section of scripture that highlights this truth. It begins with, "Discretion will guard you, understanding will watch over you" (Prov. 2:11). If we are teaching our children God's wisdom, then it serves to protect them from so many of the evils that are common to men. "To deliver you from the way of evil, From the man who speaks perverse things; From those who leave the paths of uprightness to walk in the ways of darkness" (Prov. 2:12-13). We don't need to know every evil that we will encounter in order to be ready for spiritual warfare. We only need to fill ourselves with the word of God, and we will be able to stand against the foe.

God's word and the church must be two pillars in our families.

This section of proverbs ends with, "So you will walk in the way of good men and keep to the paths of the righteous. For the upright will live in the land and the blameless will remain in it" (Prov. 2:20-21). Not only is there a need for us to know the scriptures, but we must walk with others that keep them as well. We must teach our children the importance of their spiritual community—to prefer those of like precious

faith. There is strength in numbers. "Let love be without hypocrisy. Abhor what is evil; cling to what is good. Be devoted to one another in brotherly love; give preference to one another in honor" (Rom. 12:9-10).

The two things that we must instill in our children are God's wisdom and community with the saints. If they know righteousness but try to live with darkness their souls will be vexed. Ask Lot (2 Pet. 2:8). God's word and the church must be two pillars in our families. With these they will be ready.

"Lord, make me a servant"

The lyrics are simple. The song is short. The message is soulsearching. "Lord, make me a servant, Lord, make me like You; For You are a servant, make me one, too. Lord, make me a servant, do what You must do To make me a servant; make me like You."

Could you sing this song and truly mean it? The song makes three requests to the Lord: (1) Make me a servant. (2) Make me a servant like You. (3) Do what You must do. Truly, Jesus was a servant. In words, He taught, "The Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve" (Matt. 20:28). In actions, He demon-

strated service by washing all twelve of His apostles' feet (John 13:1-17). Are you willing (yea, even eager) to be a servant? To be a servant like Jesus? To take "the form of a bondservant" and "humble yourself" (Phil. 2:7-8)? Jesus said, "I have given you an example, that you should do as I have done to you" (John 13:15).

Think about the words you sing. Do you really want God to do what He must do to make you a servant like Jesus? -DS

Worship "posture" of Christians

Nehemiah 8 is an interesting illustration of seeing the people's heart through their outer posture. Ezra stood on a wooden platform for the purpose of reading the Book of the Law to the people. "And when he opened it, all the people stood up" (Neh. 8:5). Out of respect for the Word of God, the people could not remain seated. Then "Ezra blessed the Lord," and

> the people answered, "Amen, Amen!" At that point, "they bowed their heads and worshiped the Lord with their faces to the ground" (8:6). Out of humility, reverence and a deep sense of unworthiness in the presence of God, they fell on their faces.

In the New Testament, Christians are not given specific instructions regarding posture during worship. Instead, the focus is on the heart. Outer expressions can be manipulated and feigned, but not the heart. When you worship God, does your heart (i.e., your inner spirit) stand in respect and bow in humility—all at the same time? God is looking at your heart during worship. What does He see? -DS


