

Creatures of Habit

On Wednesday nights after Bible classes, Judie and I often go to Sonic to get corn dogs as we drive home. Last Wednesday as I waited to order, the person did not say, "Welcome to Sonic. How can I help you?" Her first words to me were, "How many corn dogs do you want with your Diet Coke?"

I was startled, so I ordered a large Diet Coke and two corn dogs. When I got to the window to pay, she said, "Don't you want a Route 44 Diet Coke (it is larger than a large) like you usually get?" It is amazing we are creatures of habit. People see us, and we

often are not aware of how much they observe.

Think about these Bible characters and their customary actions in their lives. Just remember that not all habits are bad. Some of them lead to great spiritual growth. How many of these actions are part of your life?

Hannah, the mother of Samuel, had a habit. She was childless and wanted so much to have a child. The Bible describes her custom. "So it was, year by year, when she went up to the house of the Lord..." (1 Sam. 1:7). There were yearly feasts for the Jews, and her custom was to go *every* year. We have a weekly feast. What is your custom? Is it something that is part of your life every week?

Aged Daniel had been in captivity for seventy years when his enemies laid out a plan to destroy him by getting the king to forbid any prayers other than those to the king. "Daniel knew that the writing was signed, he went home. And in his upper room, with his windows open toward Jerusalem, he knelt down on his knees three times that day, and prayed and gave thanks before his God, as was his custom since early days" (Dan. 6:10). Look closely at what is said, "As was his custom since early days." What are your prayer habits?

Daniel habitually did the same thing every day for over seventy

years!

Look at what Jesus customarily did. "So He came to Nazareth, where He had been brought up. And as his custom was, He went into the synagogue on the Sabbath day" (Luke 4:16). How much are you like the Lord?

s! Paul shows a great example in what he customarily did. "Then Paul, as his custom was, went in to them, and for three Sabbaths reasoned with them from the Scriptures" (Acts 17:2). What is your custom about telling others about the Lord?

How did Judas know Jesus would be in Gethsemane? "Coming out, He went to the Mount of Olives, as He was accustomed, and His disciples also followed Him" (Luke 22:39). Do others know your spiritual customs?

Wise people should consider their spiritual customs! How wise are you?

Clear a Path

Is there anything that the old pioneers and armies had in common? There may be a few similarities that you can think of, but consider this one for a moment. Pioneers of old were those who came to a land for the first time. Now, think about what those pioneers would have to do. Today we

have highways and passages already made for us to make travel easy, but someone had to be the first to chop down trees and clear a path through the forest, in order that others coming after them could pass with ease. That's what early pioneers had to do, and similarly, armies sent out troops in front, in order to clear a path for the full army who would come marching after them. Think about that imagery for a moment. What does that have to do with us?

There is a Greek word used in Philippians chapter one that ties to this concept. The Greek word *prokope* is a compound word made up of *pro* ("in front of") and *kopto* ("to cut") —meaning "to cut forward." This word literally conveys the idea of cutting in front of or cutting a path forward, in order to advance the progress of that which would come in behind it. Pioneers did this—cutting forward for that which would come behind to have a clear and open path. An army's advance troops would do this—cutting forward for that which would come behind to have a clear and open path.

Now, look at the verse. "I want you to know, brethren, that the things which happened to me have actually turned out for the furtherance of the gospel" (Phil. 1:12). Paul said that the persecution that he was suffering at the hands of the Romans was cutting a path forward for something to come in behind him with a clear and open path. What was that something? What did Paul see as the purpose for his efforts? It was all "for the furtherance (the cutting forward) of the gos-

pel." Paul was endeavoring to fulfill the Great Commission and to reach lost souls. To that end, he was determined to do whatever it would take to open a path for the gospel to reach those souls.

What about you? Is there anything that you do that is cutting forward a path for the gospel to come in behind and reach lost souls? Is there anything that you could be doing?

That is a major purpose of living the Christian life! Our daily efforts to show kindness, to practice the Golden Rule, to control our tempers and to "let our lights constantly shine" are designed to cut a path forward for the saving gospel to come in behind us. Similarly, that's why we invite folks to worship with us. As you examine your daily life as a child of God, what are you doing (and what could you be doing) that is cutting a path forward for the gospel? We have no greater purpose on this earth! May God help us to open up that path!

Identity in Crisis

Who am I? This a common guestion. As we grow and mature into adulthood, it is important to ask this. We are taking steps and making choices that solidify a picture of self in our minds. It also becomes what we portray to others. Along the way there are things that would cause us to ask that ques-

Symptoms of this doubt in identity include: depressed mood or feelings of hopelessness or worthlessness, loss of interest in things once enjoyed, fatigue, irritability, changes in appetite or weight, issues with concentration, energy levels, motivation, and sleep.

Can we see how this could affect us spiritually? These symptoms previously mentioned can be experienced spiritually also. The writer of Hebrews talks about strengthening our souls as one would strengthen the body (Heb. 12:12-13). If we lack motivation, the zeal we once had or even the hope set before us, maybe we should ask ourselves, "Who am I?" There are four things we can do to help get our identity back on

First, look to God's word and start applying it and molding ourselves to the image of Christ (Phil. 2:5-11). If we lose focus, we can allow things into our lives that subtly subvert our new identity in Christ.

> Second, look for the joy you once had in the faith. There are many things we can do to find that joy in service. Many times, "I'm too busy" robs us of opportunities to serve and feel the joy of true servanthood. We are to serve God, and we can do that by serving others.

Third, ignore the external and internal judgment. Society around us will not be in line with the image we are trying to make for ourselves in Christ. We are sometimes our own worst critic when it comes to doubt and shame. Do not let those things define who you are.

Lastly, seek support from those around you. There are so many who are all trying to follow the same identity. Together there is strength in striving for the same goal. Do not let your identity become a crisis. We are designed with an identity in mind. Anything less is a crisis.


He went to The Skull for you!

When Jacob died, "he drew his feet up into the bed and breathed his last" (Gen. 49:33). He died in a place of comfort and peace. When Moses died, the Lord "buried him" (Deut. 34:5-6). He died in the presence and peace of the Lord. But Jesus enjoyed no such blessings!

In order to kill Jesus, "they brought Him to the place Golgotha, which is translated, Place of a Skull" (Mark 15:22). Luke says, "they came to the place called The Skull" (23:33). where the unburied skulls and bones remained. Whatever its meaning, this is the wretched place where our Savior willingly gave His life for us.

He did not just draw His feet up into His bed and take His last breath for us! He "suffered" unfathomable torture at The Skull, "outside the gate" of the city (Heb. 13:11-13) for us. And He did it while separated from His Father (Matt. 27:46)—not in His peaceful presence. Let all of that sink in. He went to The Skull for you! Where would you go for Him? - DS
