A New Way of Looking at the Devil?

My grandfather, John Acel Jenkins, was an amazing person. He preached the gospel for over 50 years while supporting himself as a wallpaper hanger and a barber. As far back as I remember, he and my grandmother lived about a block away, and I spent lots of time with him in my early years. His

great spirituality is reflected in the heritage of "Jenkins" preachers who have carried on his spiritual values.

I remember when I was beginning to be able to read that I loved reading the Bible. He would often give me something to discover in the Bible and even though I found the right answer, he had another "answer" based on his personality. For example, I remember him asking me who the first farmer was in the Bible. Because of the Bible classes at the West

Huntsville church, I likely knew the answer, but he told me to go to the Bible and find the answer. It did not take long to read those first four chapters of the Bible and learn that it was Cain. So, with my Bible opened to Genesis 4:2, I went to him. His reply, "Wrong answer." I read those chapters again, and I went back to prove he was wrong. I finally gave up, and his witty answer was, "Adam was the first farmer. He raised 'Cane."

He once asked me where baseball was found in the Bible. I tried to find it but finally gave up. He told me it was mentioned first in Genesis 1:1. I read it but did not see it until he said, "Baseball is mentioned in the first verse when it mentions 'the big inning.'" He helped me learn how to research things in the Bible.

One other lesson he taught me was to think about how you spell devil. It was obvious, so I spelled it correctly to him. He then asked what I would have if I took the first letter off the word devil. I got that one right. The word devil without

> the "D" is evil. He spent some time talking about evil and how it is all related to the devil.

I wish all grandfathers would have the impact my grandfather had on me.

"What would you have if you took the first two letters off devil. His answer (using his unusual wit) was, "Remove the 'DE' from devil, and you have 'vile.'" He then spent time reminding me that is what Satan is and what he brings to us and you must never forget it. What if you remove the "DEV" from devil?

You have "ill" and all the spiritual sickness there is in the world comes from Satan. Remove "DEVI" and what do you have? When I said, "L," he asked what that rhymes with, and it did not take long for me to guess, "It rhymes with hell." He reminded me that place is prepared for the devil and his angels.

He also asked me where football and tennis were found, but I will leave it up to you to find. Thank God for my grandfather teaching me the joy of discovering things in the Bible. I hope all grandfathers can do this for their grandkids.



"I Just Feel"

Feelings are wonderful things. They are able to get down inside of us and touch us in ways that we cannot explain. Falling in love involves your feelings. Witnessing the birth of your child involves your feelings. Cheering your favorite team to victory involves your feelings. Feelings can be good,

and feelings can be bad. What we like most is when our feelings make us "feel good."

The trouble with our feelings is (or, at least, one major trouble with our feelings is) that they cannot be trusted as a reliable authority. How often have feelings for a person led someone in the wrong direction? How often have feelings for a stock or our authoritative investment led someone in the wrong direction? Feelings are wonderful, but they cannot be used as our authoritative guide toward truth and pleasing God.

Don't misunderstand. While some have tried to divorce feelings from Christianity, such would be a catastrophic mistake. Our feelings (or call it, "emotions") are involved in our worship—we must worship "in spirit" (John 4:24). Our feelings are involved in our salvation—the removal of sins brings "rejoicing" (Acts 8:39). Our feelings are involved in our study of God's Word—it is "sweet" to the soul (Psa. 119:103). But, feelings are not a trusted guide in these arenas.

Can you hear Nadab and Abihu saying, when they learned that their efforts to worship God were not acceptable to Him, "But, we just feel in our hearts that this is the way that God wanted us to worship Him!"? Could their feelings have superseded the divine will regarding acceptable worship? Of course not! They were punished, regardless of their feelings.

Can you hear Agrippa saying, when he was pressed by Paul to obey the gospel, "But, I just feel in my heart that I'm

> ok. I believe in God. I believe His word. I just don't feel that becoming a Christian is necessary for me"? Could his feelings have overridden the divine will regarding God's plan of salvation? Of course not! He left Paul and turned his back on God's salvation.

Can you hear the Pharisees saying, when Jesus told them that they rejected the commandment of God by holding to their traditions, "But, we

feel in our hearts that the way we've always done things has been good enough for us, and so many lives have been changed for the better"? Could their feelings have overruled the divine will for their lives? Of course not! They would be uprooted by God for causing others to fall into the ditch.

To let our feelings dictate what we believe and what we consider truth is dangerous in any field of life, but most especially when it comes to our souls! Brethren, let us "buy the truth," and "not sell it" out to our feelings (Prov. 23:23)!

corporate ladder, and the snippy bickering of a thousand petty conflicts can thoroughly trample any sunny disposition you may have once possessed as a child. It seems inevitable that we will be formed into a scowl. After receiving our fair share of mistreatment, we can end up approaching life with a preemptive, chronic frown. We brace ourselves for unkindness, and we are slowly transformed into a grouch.

Not so, for a Christian. A Christian must resist this darkening of the demeanor (Col. 3:12). A Christian doesn't indulge in the pettiness of the world. A Christian is known for kindness (Gal. 5:22). It's not an optional accessory. If you're a Christian, then that means you are kind. A Christian is loving. It's what defines him (1 John 3:10). The difference is obvious. Those who truly belong to God are loving, in particular, toward other Christians. This means unkindness can be a deal-breaker. As far as Jesus is concerned, we can't draw the line anywhere. Even when it comes to our very enemies, the appropriate response is love (Matt. 5:44). He goes on to explain that there's nothing necessarily admirable about loving the loveable (Matt. 5:46). There's nothing unusual about loving the loveable. Loving the unlovable, that's where you'll find a Christian.

You'll also notice there are no excuses. 1 John 4:7 doesn't say, "Beloved, let us love one another unless you're in a really bad mood." Ephesians 4:32 doesn't say, "Be kind to one another unless the other person is unkind to you first or if

we have a genetic disposition for anger in your family." Scripture is not open to our good reasons. It might be difficult, it might feel downright impossible, but we are commanded to be kind to everyone.

Love is the key ingredient. If we remove it from any situation, we are reduced to nothing more than an irritating noise (1 Cor. 13:1). If we do not love, we degrade our position. Even if we're right,

we're wrong because we didn't set out to do the right thing with love. For a Christian, at the heart of every action is a basic question. When dealing with conflict and annoying personalities and even your enemy, it comes down to this very simple question. Do you love them? This question would stifle gossip, deception and maliciousness. This is the first brick that goes into place determining everything else. Love, or the lack of it, will determine whether or not any action we take after that is godly or not. Action without love is easy.


