Finishing the Race and Receiving the Crown

The Bible uses many figures of speech to describe our journey to heaven. The parables of Jesus often take ordinary events to illustrate the nature of the kingdom and the part each of us plays. We are workers in the vineyard, sowers of the seed, merchants seeking a pearl of great price and

many others. The writers of the New Testament add another one which the world understands. The Olympic games which involved running originated in ancient The skates were Greece. They vividly remind us that like those participants in those races each of us is a spiritual athlete running in our spiritual race.

The writer of Hebrews describes the practice used by runners of putting weights on their feet as they prepared for their race. When those weights were removed, muscles had been strengthened and the freedom made their feet seem so light and ready to run.

I remember that pair of skates I received at Christmas. They were not lace-up boots like we have today but had straps and clamps to attach them to ordinary shoes. I specifically remember how light my feet seemed when I unclamped the heavy skates from my feet. I felt like I could jump higher and run faster than I had ever done. With those weights removed, I knew I could do things better than I had ever done before.

Read these words from God. "Let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which so easily ensnares us, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us" (Heb. 12:1). As we run our race, there are many weights, not necessarily sinful acts, which can hinder us. Jesus describes three things which can so easily keep us from reaching spiritual maturity—cares, riches and pleasure (Luke 8:14). Are these weights in your life which need to be set aside as you run the race?

> The Bible adds another aspect to the race we are running. "And if anyone competes in athletics, he is not crowned unless he competes according to the rules" (2 Tim. 2:5). Think of how races involve measured distances and specific lanes clearly marked in races you have seen. We are not at liberty to set the rules or run outside our lanes. There is a Judge who will determine how lawfully we run.

At the end of those ancient races, "medals" were given. Garland wreaths were placed on the heads of the winners. "Everyone who competes for the prize is temperate in all things. Now they do it to obtain a perishable crown, but we for an imperishable crown" (1 Cor. 9:24). Paul said that having finished the race he awaited the crown of righteousness (2 im. 4:8). Wreaths will wither, but our crown is a crown of life.

How are you doing in your race for the crown? Are there changes you need to make as you run your race?



When Paul Was Quarantined: Steadfast Service Unto Death

So, once this time of COVID-19 selfquarantine is over, what will you do then? What will happen if at some point in the future you are confined to quarters again? Such is exactly what happened with the apostle Paul. After his two years as a Roman prisoner at end of the book of Acts (28:30),

he was apparently released for a time (of maybe three to five years). But, after those few years, he was again taken into custody and imprisoned. What would you do? Paul realized that he would probably never be free again, but that did not stop him from focusing on the work of the Lord. In his final days, Paul wrote a second letter to his close friend, Timothy, urging him to remain steadfast in his service to the Lord.

While in quarantine, Paul focused on steadfast service that is unashamed of Christ and His truth. Paul urged Timothy to "not be ashamed" (1:8), following the example of Onesiphorus (1:16). Paul himself was "not ashamed" (1:12) of the gospel or the work that the Lord had given to him, thus he affirms that no worker in the kingdom would "need to be ashamed" (2:15) of the truth of God. We must not be ashamed today of Christ and living for Him!

While in guarantine, Paul focused on steadfast service that involves hard work and endurance. Paul did not describe the Christian life as a life of ease or a life in which a person could engage at his convenience. One who is "approved to God" is called a "worker" (2:15), and even more than that, he is to be "hard-working" (2:6). There is many a "hardship" that a faithful Christian will have to "endure" in his service (2:3), but only through steadfast endurance will he receive the eternal "salvation" (2:10) and "reign" (2:12) promised by Christ. We must labor diligently for the Lord today!

> While in quarantine, Paul focused on steadfast service that is offered from the right heart. Paul never led Christians to believe that their service to the Lord was merely an external effort or for the sake of appearance. For one's steadfast service to actually be acceptable to the Lord, it must be generated by a "genuine faith" (1:5), that is embedded in a heart that is "gentle," "patient" and "humble" toward all

(2:24-25). We must make sure our heart is right with God!

While in guarantine, Paul focused on steadfast service that labors until the very end and finishes the work that is to be done. Paul did not let up when he was nearing the end or suggest that he could take a break. He said, "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith" (4:7). We must have that same confidence!

Could the words "steadfast service" be used to describe our efforts as a Christian? Even while in quarantine?

Did you know that you can be both unrecognizable and identifiable at the same time? As Christians, we can be in both of these categories. We are to be dead to the old man of sin, "knowing this, that our old self was crucified with Him, in order that our body of sin might be done away with, so that we would no longer be slaves to sin" (Rom. 6:6). If the old man is dead, then we are fundamentally different to the point that our old friends still living in our old ways no longer know us. "In

all this, they are surprised that you do not run with them into the same excesses of dissipation, and they malign you" (1 Pet. 4:4). They would say, "We don't even know you anymore!" You are unrecognizable to them.

In dying to the old man, we are raised to walk in a new life. "Therefore we have been buried with Him through baptism into death, so that as Christ was raised from the dead through the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in new-

ness of life" (Rom. 6:4). When we do this, we "put on the new self, which in the likeness of God has been created in righteousness and holiness of the truth" (Eph. 4:24). Now we are known by God and His Son, and we have a relationship with Him. We pass from one state of being to another. "So then, you will know them by their fruits. Not everyone who says to Me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of

heaven, but he who does the will of My Father who is in heaven will enter" (Matt. 7:20-21).

How we live and conduct our lives determines how we are known. "For He rescued us from the domain of darkness and transferred us to the kingdom of His beloved Son" (Col. 1:13). We are now identifiable as belonging in the kingdom and not walking in darkness. It does not matter what others say we are or what they will admit about us. It only matters what He will say about us.

Take the next step

It's interesting how some folks try to use certain information in the Bible to prove a point that is not actually parallel. For example, during these times of quarantine, some have tried to justify worshiping from home by stating that the early church didn't worship in church buildings but in homes. While the early church did worship in homes (Rom. 16:5, 14, 15; 1 Cor.

16:19; Col. 4:15; Phile. 2), the local congregation was actually gathering together in homes to worship and fellowship. "Gathering together" (what they were doing in homes) is not the same as "not gathering together" (what we are doing in homes).

Right now, we are in an unusual time when elderships had to make some unusual decisions about gathering together. However, when this unusual time has passed, the will of God for His church to "gather together" for worship still remains (1 Cor. 11:17, 18, 20, 33, 34; 14:23, 26), whether that is congregations "gathering together" in homes or in church buildings. Let's make sure that we don't misuse the Bible when we are looking to justify a practice. – DS
