Until the Harvest

Before Jesus died, He revealed to the apostles what lay in their future. They were to be sowers of the word of God into hearts that were like wayside, thorny, stony and good soils (Matt. 13:1-9, 18-23). He also told them that in the field they were planting seed which would produce the kingdom of

God. He then told them they should expect Satan to come add

seeds of evil among the seed the apostles had planted (Matt. 13:24-30, 36-43). Pray, ask, sow,

That kingdom began, and Satan began his work by "planting weeds" in the church. He tried to change the very nature of the church into one which demanded all men, especially Gentiles, be circumcised. For the next generation, the church of Jesus struggled with tares (weeds) of Judaism. Take a mo-

ment and look around you. The church of Christ is eternal and will always be on the earth, but Satan has never ceased trying to hide it among the tares of religious division.

When the Owner of the field was asked about removing the tares planted by Satan, He said, "Let both grow together until the harvest, and at the time of harvest I will say to the reapers, 'First gather together the tares and bind them in bundles to burn them, but gather the wheat into my barns'" (Matt. 13:30). Good seed and tares will be here "until the harvest." So, what are we to do until the harvest? Jesus said, "Pray the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into His harvest" (Matt. 9:38). The time of the harvest is not yet, but He wants us to pray that laborers may be in the fields. He even told the apostles that they were laborers in that field (John 4:38). We need to pray for laborers and to be laborers.

What do we do until the harvest? We need to realize that all of us can be laborers in many ways. Paul spoke of those

who planted and those who watered. He then reminded us that it does not make any difference who does any of this work. He said he who sows and he who waters are to do their work realizing it is God who gives the increase (1 Cor. 3:7).

What are we to do until the harvest? Ask God to use you. Lift up your eyes unto the field. Plant, water and ask God to put you in situations

where you can be used as one who goes into the world sowing the seed. The fact that others might be better "sowers" or "waterers" than you makes no difference. Remember every seed sown and every drop of water added to the seed together makes for a great harvest.

There is so much that is happening in our world which can only be changed by those who are sowers and waterers, lights in the darkness and salt seasoning the earth. Pray, ask, sow, water, light and salt—let God use you!



Is God's "All" Your "All"?

Rarely would someone look up the definition of a word for which the definition is quite obvious, but consider for a moment the meaning of the English word "all." "All" is "used to refer to the whole quantity or extent of a particular group or thing." It emphasizes "every member or individual com-

ponent of" a particular group. Thus, the word "all" is fully inclusive and does not exclude any person or thing under consideration.

The Scripture uses the word "all" (or its counterpart "every") in some very specific ways, to which the child of God should pay very close attention. If God says "all" and if God means "all," then His child ought to understand "all" and see "all" the way that God sees "all."

God made "every nation of men" from one man (Acts 17:26). Thus, "all" people have been made in the "image" and "likeness" of God (Gen. 1:26).

God says that "all" are lost in sin and are falling "short of the glory of God" (Rom. 3:23).

God, in His great love, "desires all men to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth" (1 Tim. 2:4).

God came to earth in the flesh and "died for all" on the cross (2 Cor. 5:14), tasting "death for everyone" (Heb. 2:9).

ing power of "the gospel of Christ" (Mark 16:15; Rom. 1:16). God says that "all" people will die—"All go to one

place: all are from the dust, and all return to dust" (Ecc. 3:20).

God says that "all" will "appear before the judgment seat of Christ" to be judged for how they lived (2 Cor. 5:10).

God says that "all" will be "gathered" before Christ and will be sentenced to their eternal destiny (Matt. 25:31-46).

God says that "all" need and deserve to hear the sav-

God says that we have a responsibility to warn and teach "every man" (Col. 1:28).

Is your "all/every" the same as God's "all/ every"? "All" includes all nationalities, all ethnicities, all classes, all economic levels, all education levels, all religious persuasions, both genders, all sexual orien-

tations, all careers, all political persuasions, all ages, all personalities, all heights, all weights, all accents, all mask-wearers (and non-wearers), all social-media-users (and non-users), etc., etc. God's "all" includes every single person that we know and every single person we may ever meet!

While we get wrapped up and focused on various things by which we can identify (and thus divide) ourselves, let us be reminded that in the eyes and love of God, "all" people equally need our Christ-like attention and efforts.

Caught in the Very Act

They thought what they were doing was being done in secret, but they were caught. Early in the morning, the woman was taken out of bed by the Scribes and the Pharisees. The man never figured in the story. The woman caught in adultery was brought before a man they called Jesus. It was clear

that He was the target. She was just a means to an end. They didn't care about her except to use her to try and trick this new teacher that was gaining popularity. "They said to Him, 'Teacher, this woman has been caught in adultery, in the very act. Now in the Law Moses commanded us to stone such women; what then do You say?'" (John 8:4-5). To their bewilderment, He didn't respond. He just stooped and wrote in the dust of the ground. They persisted that He answer their question. His response was, "He who is

without sin among you, let him be the first to throw a stone at her" (John 8:7). Then, He bent over and continued to write in the dirt, completely ignoring those gathered around him. Then, she began to hear it, only a few at first. Here and there a thud with a sudden poof of dust. Little by little the crowd dispersed, the older men first. The men that had stood ready to stone her were now dropping the stones that would've done their dirty work. To her amazement, after a few moments, none of her accusers were left. That's when He looked up. "Jesus said to her, 'Woman, where are they? Did no one condemn you?' She said, 'No one, Lord.' And Jesus said, 'I do not condemn you, either. Go. From now on sin no more'" (John 8:10-11). She was free! Who was this man that held such power in His words? The text doesn't tell us if she even asked. Maybe she knew. We don't even know what Jesus was writing. This we do know—all those that came to Jesus in those early morning hours learned something.

All those involved learned something in those early morning hours.

The Scribes and the Pharisees were reminded of their own sins. The law required that the man be stoned also (Deut. 22:22). There were to be witnesses, and one of the witnesses was to cast the first stone. Also, at the time they were not allowed to execute anyone without Roman permission. This wasn't about doing what was right. Jesus was effectively calling their bluff. None of them could honestly

say that they had never done anything worthy of death (Matt. 7:3). Jesus flipped the story over on them. The woman clearly learned a lesson in mercy. They very thing she deserved was held from happening. Jesus, the face of God on earth, told her that He did not condemn her and to sin no more. As readers, we are reminded of the power of a word fitly spoken (Prov. 25:11). We may see ourselves as the Scribes and Pharisees, quick to condemn. Hopefully, we learn to drop the stones. Maybe we see ourselves as the condemned, and we learn to sin no more.

Consider the exchange between King Agrippa and the apostle Paul in Acts 26. As was his typical practice, Paul was preaching Christ as the fulfillment of God's prophetic plan (26:22-23, 26), and he pressed Agrippa to affirm his faith in that vital truth. Agrippa's retort to Paul was, "You almost persuade me to become a Chris-

tian" (26:28). In return (filled with disappointment but determination), Paul declared, "I would to God that not only you, but also all who hear me today, might become both almost and altogether such as I am, except for these chains" (26:29).

What kind of Christian are you? Are you an "altogether" Christian? It's not enough to be an "almost" Christian or a "mostly" Christian! When others see you, what kind of Christian do they see? -DS
