Have You Been Taught by God?

There is marked contrast between the covenant God had with Israel and the one He now has with mankind. Judaism was a national religion while Christianity is characterized by the *personal* relationship one has with God. We are so blessed that this has changed, but it demands we seek to have

that personal intimacy with God.

Judaism was designed for one to be chosen by God from the day of birth. In that Old Testament, every child was one of God's chosen people from the draw you to Him day of his physical birth. The very fact that one's parents were Jewish meant that at birth they were part sen you to be a people for Himself, a special treasure above all the people on the face of the earth" (Deut.

7:6). That infant did not know God; he had never heard of God; he did not believe in God, yet he was a "child of God."

God promised that in the New Testament age all of this would change. Six hundred years before Jesus was born, Jeremiah contrasted the covenant Jewish infants had with God with the new covenant Jesus was to bring. That Jewish child had to be taught of God and faith in Him had to come years after his birth. That was about to change. Jeremiah described it in these words. "No more shall every man teach his neighbor, and every man his brother, saying, 'Know the Lord,' for they all shall know Me, from the least of them to the greatest of them, says the Lord. For I will forgive their iniquity, and their sin I will remember no more" (Jer. 31:34). One became part of God's chosen nation and later learned about God. Today, one becomes part of the kingdom of God by being born again (John 3:3). One must know God before he enters His kingdom.

Christianity is a taught religion. Jesus described it this way. "No one can come to Me unless the Father who sent Me draws him; and I will raise him up at the last day. It is written in the prophets, 'And they shall all be taught by God.' Therefore everyone who has heard and learned from the Father comes to of God's chosen people. "The Lord your God has cho- Are you listening Me" (John 6:44-45). His plan is to send His messengers to every person in every nation and use these messengers to teach men about God before they

become His chosen people (Matt. 28:19; Mark 16:15).

It is true that "whoever calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved" (Rom. 10:13). But look at what follows these words. "How then shall they call on Him in whom they have not believed? And how shall the believe in Him of whom they have not heard? And how shall they hear without a preacher" (Rom. 10:14). One cannot call on God before he hears!

God is seeking to draw you to Him by teaching you. The real question is, "Are you listening to God?"



Two Different Washings, Two Different Women

Some Bible students find interest in realizing that Jesus' feet were anointed with oil and wiped with a woman's hair on two different occasions. Sometimes these two events get confused as one event, because of the similarities between them, but they are definitely two distinct times in the life of Je-

sus. Let's consider them.

The first anointing took place in Luke 7:36-50. Luke is the only gospel record to include this event. Unfortunately, some Bibles place a footnote with a cross-reference to Matthew 26, Mark 14 and John 12. This is an obvious mistake on their part (when the passages are all studied in context) and has led to confusion for some Bible students.

The second anointing took place in John

12:1-8, more than a year after the first anointing in Luke 7. This anointing is also recorded in parallel accounts in Matthew 26:6-13 and Mark 14:3-9. Again, some translations have a cross-reference to Luke 7, which confuses a Bible student with misinformation. Let's compare these events.

The first event took place in Simon the Pharisee's home (Luke 7:36, 40), somewhere in Galilee. The second event took place in Simon the leper's home in Bethany (Matt. 26:6; Mark 14:3). Two different Simons. Two different homes. Two different cities.

The first woman is described as "a woman in the city who was a sinner" (Luke 7:37), but she is not named. The second woman is identified as Mary, the sister of Lazarus and Martha (John 12:3; 11:2). Both women brought fragrant oil, both anointed Jesus' feet, and both wiped His feet with their hair (Luke 7:37-38; John 12:3). The first woman also washed "His feet with her tears...and she kissed His feet" (Luke 7:38).

Both of these women recognized the greatness of Jesus

It may be that the first woman recognized her sinful condition before the sinless Jesus and was seeking forgiveness, since Jesus did forgive her "many" sins (Luke 7:47-50). But, Jesus specified that the second woman (Mary) was preparing "My body for burial" (Mark 14:8). Two different women. Two different occasions. Two different purposes.

Some have mistakenly tried to identify the first woman as Mary Magdalene, but there is NO Biblical evidence whatsoever to warrant such a claim. Any attempt to do so teaches something that the Bible absolutely does not.

Studying the Bible can and should be fun. There is so much to learn and so much to apply. Both of these women recognized the greatness of Jesus and their need to take a place of humility before Him. And, in doing so, both of these women were commended by Jesus. May we recognize our place before our Master and willingly serve at His feet!



Do We Need God to Be Moral?

In 2019, the Pew Research Center (PRC) questioned 38,426 people in 34 countries. One of the goals was to find the connection between God and morality. The basic question is this: Can a person be morally good and not believe in God? Globally, the response was that 51% don't believe the

relationship with God is necessary to have good morals. However, from country to country it varied greatly. For example, in Sweden, 90% don't think that belief in God is connected with morality. Law and Legal Positivism in the Nuremberg Trials"). A good and virtuous German of the Nazi party in the 1940s was very different from the majority of the world. During the Nuremburg Trials, it was stated that what the Nazi party did was against Natural Law. Others might believe that law establishes morality. However, there are things you can legally do in the United States today that were socially and legally prohibited in the 1950s and 60s. Law is not an objective moral code. "Law tries

to create a basic, enforceable standard of behavior necessary in order for a community to succeed and in which all people are treated equally" (Ethics.org.au, "Ethics, Morality, and Law-What's the Difference?"). Others might believe that a moral code is set up by socially accepted practices in a group, much like tribal laws found in isolated indigenous groups. Incidentally, our society was founded on Biblical principles, but that has been changing for a while.

Here is the crux of the matter. If we are trying to be good by our own standard of good, then we don't need God. The result of that line of thought is that there is no objective moral code. Every man will do what is right in his own eyes (Judg. 17:6). But, if you believe in God and that He created all things, then you must recognize that He is the origin of all order, which includes morality. "It is not in man who walks, to direct his steps" (Jer. 10:23). God is the origin of all that is right and good. Society or accepted practice is not.

Let brotherly love continue
