

Understanding the "Patriarchal Age"

father during the

Patriarchal Dis-

pensation

God is

in the business

to "give life"

We may have assumed too much about what we commonly call the Patriarchal Dispensation. While it is true that Abraham and the sons of Jacob are called patriarchs (Heb 7:4; Acts 7:8-9), God also calls David, who lived over 500 years after the Patriarchal Dispensation ended, a patriarch (Acts 2:29).

I was told as a child that during that ancient age God spoke to the fathers, but this expression is used to refer to the period of the Mosaic Dispensation when ets (Heb. 1:1). The assumption I made was that God spoke first to "father Adam," then spoke to "father Seth," and then in each succeeding generation He spoke to each of the fathers one after another. I understand that God did communicate orally to men during that age but probably not in the way I once viewed it.

Last week in our in-depth Monday night study of the Bible, we looked at the ages of the ancient to see how much "overlap" that would have been by each of the twenty generations from Adam to Abraham. (By the way, this class is open to anyone who wants to come or who want to attend using Skype—just let me know.) We think the "begats" found in Matthew chapter one help us trace the lineage of Jesus, but Genesis chapter five has the "begats" from Adam to Noah and Genesis chapter eleven has the "begats" from Noah to Abraham. One striking difference in the Genesis "begats" and Matthew's "begats" is that Genesis tells exactly how old each person in the lineage was when each had his son. It is therefore possible to know the exact number of years there was from Adam to Noah and from Noah to Abraham. That Monday night study was so enlightening to all in the class. Consider the following truths revealed in the Genesis accounts.

(1) Adam lived for 930 years and obviously knew his God did not need children and grandchildren for so many years. What He spoke to the fathers by the Old Testament proph- to speak to every can easily be overlooked is that Enoch, who walked with God, could have known Adam for over 250 years before God took him. Even Methuselah (eight generations from Adam) could have known Adam for 66 years. By the way, Methuselah died the same year the flood came.

> (2) Noah lived nearly 350 years after the flood came and Terah, the father of Abraham, could have known Noah for the first 44 years of his life. Shem, the son of Noah who was in the ark, lived so long after the flood that his life overlaps 120 years of Abraham's life and twenty years of Isaac's life.

> Monday night classes are different and allow a deeper look into the text. We discovered more than this article discusses. It is a different class-come and see. I believe you would enjoy it. You can attend using Skype on your computer.



Death Is Not of God

Often times, when a friend or loved one has passed, we are at a loss for words. We don't know what to say, so we search for something we believe could provide comfort. However, sometimes what we say may actually confuse, complicate or even compound the grief. It is usually best to stick to short

expressions of our heart (ex: "I am sorry." "I love you." "I am hurting for you." "I am praying for you." "You are special to me."), and it is best to avoid stating things that we do not actually know or cannot prove.

An example of that last category of statements is when we attribute what has happened to be of God. We may say something like, "God must have needed him more than we do. We just never know when God is going to call us up. It's all in God's good

When we say something that attributes a person's death "to God," we are stating something that we do not know, that we cannot prove, and is typically something that is outside the scope of Biblical teaching. Let's consider God and death for a few moments.

"God" and "death" are two things that do not go together, Scripturally speaking. How do we know? We know that "death" is the consequence of man's sin, not God's actions. "The day you eat of it, you shall surely die" (Gen. 2:1617). "The wages of sin is death" (Rom. 6:23). "Just as through one man sin entered the world, and death through sin, and thus death spread to all men" (Rom. 5:12). Don't misunderstand. This is not stating that every death of a person is connected to their personal sin. No! But, it is connected to the introduction of sin into the world in Genesis 3. Sin brought about spiritual death and physical death. Thus, death is not the result of God's action but of man's choice in the Garden.

> Additionally, note that death is the result of Satan's work and not God's work. Jesus identified the devil as "a murderer from the beginning" (John 8:44). Death is to be laid at the devil's feet and attributed to him, not laid at God's feet and attributed to Him. God and death do not go together.

In fact, just the opposite is taught in Scripture. "God" and "life" (not death) are tied together in Scripture. God "breathed into [man] the breath of life; and man became a living being" (Gen. 2:7). "In Him was life" (John 1:4). God is in the business to "give life" (Rom. 8:11), not death. That is such a critical difference to understand.

"Death" is an appointment that we all have (Heb. 9:27), but that is because of man's introduction of sin into the world at the working of Satan. We may not know what to say at death, but let us not attribute it to "the Prince of life" (Acts 3:15), who "gives life to all things" (1 Tim. 6:13).



Wendell and Betty Winkler's Advice on Marriage



Wendell Winkler was a preacher of the gospel for over 60 years before his passing in 2005. He was a prince among preachers, and he influenced and trained hundreds of gospel preachers. He and his wife, Betty, were married for 55 years. On Valentine's Day in 2004, they responded to a request from brother Neal Pollard for some advice on marriage. Neal reported, "Their suggestions were broken into two categories, the first being positive things couples can do for their marriages and the latter being habits, actions, and attitudes that hurt a marriage. Here are the answers from a couple who seemed as happily married as any two people I have known."

Positive things:

- 1. Put your companion first.
- 2. Build the confidence of each other, never making the other feel inferior.
- 3. Maintain a beautiful togetherness [laugh, cry, plan vacations, and work together]. Walk through life together. Do not ride off in opposite directions [in interests, finance, recreation, etc.].
- 4. Adjust to your companion's interests [if he fishes, she learns to fish; if she loves to shop, he learns to shop].
- 5. Be united in your goals and aspirations [for your children, for your retirement].
- 6. Cooperate with each other [in disciplining your children, etc.].
- 7. Make your companion a partner in all things.
- 8. Be open, free, and uninhibited in your communication.
- 9. Close each day on a positive note.
- 10. Practice 1 Corinthians 13:4-8.

Things to Avoid:

- 1. Excessive debt.
- 2. "Me" and "I" syndrome instead of "we."
- 3. Suspicion and distrust.
- 4. Failure to understand what is involved in "headship" and "submission."
- 5. Misarranged priorities.
- 6. Failure to be commendatory.
- 7. Failure to notice and apply the little things.
- 8. Refusal to eliminate annoyances.
- 9. Failure to keep romance in the marriage [never become too old to hold hands].
