

When Do You Start to Teach Your Children?

Anyone can take

time to read the

same stories Lois

& Eunice read to

"So you shall

put away

the evil from

among you."

Last week we discussed the great need there is in the church for developing leaders—elders, deacons and preachers. The truth is that we are not training enough men to preach and many congregations are suffering because of a growing lack of leadership. Our homes no longer are places where these

leaders were developed in the past. Young men are not being challenged as they once were.

We talked about Hannah and her view of the fact that Samuel was simply given to her by God, and she willingly gave him back to God. Take time to look at a New Testament example of a young man who was given back to God to serve Him.

Who would have ever thought that great young Timothy church leader would come from a home where the father made no contribution to the spiritual growth of his child? Timothy's father was a pagan, one who did not even believe in the true God, yet there were other influences in his life which had a far greater impact. The few details we have about his background should be a real encouragement to you sit mothers whose husbands today are in many ways like Timothy

Timothy's faith began with his grandmother, Lois. Paul speaks of the faith Timothy had and describes it in this

way. It was a "...genuine faith...which dwelt first in your grand-mother" (2 Tim. 1:5). It did not stop there. It also dwelt in Lois, her daughter, before it dwelt in Timothy. Parents, you may not realize that you are part of determining the eternal destiny of your grandchildren, even before they are born.

What did Lois and Eunice do to duplicate that genuine faith in Timothy? It began far earlier than most realize. Paul says, "That from childhood you have know the Holy Scriptures

which are able to make you wise for salvation through faith" (2 Tim. 3:15). The Greek word for "childhood" in this passage is the same one used to describe baby Jesus as an infant lying in a manger.

What parent or grandparent is there who cannot take time to read the same stories Lois and Eunice used to create faith in His gifts to us? Yet we overlook so many opportunities to speak to them

and they never see themselves as future leaders in the church. Moses described the process to be used. "These words which I command you today shall be in your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, when you walk by the way, when you lie down and when you rise up" (Deut. 6:6-7).

The church needs leaders. Think about what you can do to help develop more leaders.

Stone Rebellious Children?

Sometimes it is wondered how a loving God could command that a "rebellious" son be stoned to death under the Law of Moses. That just doesn't "fit" in what some people expect to be in the Bible. Let's look at it briefly.

First, the discussion is found in Deuteronomy 21:18-21. The focus is on a "stubborn and rebellious

son who will not obey the voice" of his parents, and in his contempt for their authority, he "will not heed" his parents even after "they have chastened him" (21:18). This is not a matter of a child not finishing his supper or jumping on his bed like a trampoline. His refusal to "obey" (21:20) is called "evil" (21:21)—it was a capital offense. In other words, there was unrepentant and flaunting sin inside their

home, and all of their efforts to quell it were fruitless.

Second, put this into the whole context of the law. The law of God condemned murder, stealing and adultery (Deut. 5:17-19). The verse right before that demanded "honor" for parental authority, in order that "your days may be long" (5:16). Now, which of these commands was more important? Which of these commands would be punishable if not obeyed? Just the ones we consider "the big ones"? Consider the larger scope of passages dealing with rebellion

against parental authority: "He who strikes his father or his mother shall surely be put to death...He who curses his father or his mother shall surely be put to death...Cursed is the one who treats his father or his mother with contempt" (Ex. 21:15, 17; Deut. 27:16). God took submission and obedience to parental authority very seriously, for if one rebelled against his own parents, where would that lead him in regard to the government and the law (yeah, even to God Himself)?

Third, recognize the involvement of the local authorities and the community. The parents were to take the rebellious son "to the elders of his city," who were the local authorities who would weigh and judge the matter. If he was found guilty, "all the men of his city" were to "stone him to death" (Deut. 21:20 -21). Think about our own system of judges and juries today, which shows the serious nature of the

child's sinful (and unlawful) behavior. Note also that "all Israel shall hear and fear," providing a powerful deterrent for other sons who may be inclined to rebel against their parents.

Finally, recognize that whatever was involved in the son's actions was "evil" (21:21). Nine times in Deuteronomy, God gave instructions to deal with egregious sin in the camp of Israel and concluded by saying, "So you shall put away the evil from among you." Evil is not something that can be tolerated. It must be expunged. That is the focus of this difficult text.

Stay Woke

Maybe you have heard this before. The idea of "woke" carries with it the idea of being aware of injustice, especially social injustices. This idea isn't a new one. "For you are all sons of light and sons of day. We are not of night nor of darkness; so then let us not sleep as others do, but let us be alert and

sober" (1 Thess. 5:5-6). Paul's admonition to remain awake is than wh not talking about a physical condition. What are some of the ways that the Bible encourages to maintain a woke condition?

"Be on the alert,

"Therefore, prepare your minds for action, keep sober in spirit, fix your hope completely on the grace to be brought to you at the revelation of Jesus Christ. As obedient children, do not be conformed to the former lusts which were yours in your ignorance,

but like the Holy One who called you, be holy yourselves also in all your behavior; because it is written, 'You shall be holy, for I AM holy'" (1 Pet. 1:13-16). Holiness is directly tied to being awake and aware. So easily we can be lulled to sleep by the world we live in. Sometimes we call it "auto pilot" or "just coasting." In these states, we haven't made critical decisions, we are just letting things happen.

"Devote yourselves to prayer, keeping alert in it with an attitude of thanksgiving" (Col. 4:2). Paul mentions prayer as an aid to staying awake. How many times has the opposite happened to us? We fell asleep praying. However, devotion to prayer should help us stay awake to God and His will. Prayer with thanksgiving is one that is introspective and has taken to acknowledge what God has done for them.

"Do this, knowing the time, that it is already the hour for you to awaken from sleep; for now salvation is nearer to us than when we believed. The night is almost gone, and the day

is near. Therefore let us lay aside the deeds of darkness and put on the armor of light. Let us behave properly as in the day, not in carousing and drunkenness, not in sexual promiscuity and sensuality, not in strife and jealousy. But put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh in regard to its lusts" (Rom. 13:11-14). How many have gotten tired in the afternoon after a large carbohydrate lunch?

We didn't need to eat that much, it just looked so good. It is possible for us to make provision for the flesh to the point that we have fallen asleep spiritually. Our focus is on the flesh and we are vulnerable.

"Behold, I am coming like a thief. Blessed is the one who stays awake" (Rev. 16:15). Are we going to be ready? Will Jesus say to us as He did to His disciples, "You could not keep watch with me one hour" (Matt. 26:40)? This life, compared to eternity, is much less than one hour. Stay Woke.

Please...bring your Bible...use your Bible...follow along...take notes...mark in your Bible...find at least one useful piece of information...realize more people are listening than just you... engage the preacher with eye contact and facial reactions while he's preaching...let something in the lesson spark a thought for your own Bible study later. Could your boredom say something more about you than the preacher? It's God's Word. Let's love it. – DS

Do not keep silent

Paul lived and preached in the immoral city of Corinth for 18 months. While there, he tried reasoning with and persuading both Jews and Greeks (Acts 18:4), but "they opposed him and blasphemed" (18:6). The gospel converted some (18:8) and was opposed by others (18:12). In the midst of this tumultuous time, the Lord spoke directly to Paul: "Do not be afraid,

but go on speaking and do not be silent; for I am with you..." (18:9-10).

Do you ever feel opposed by those who reject the gospel? Do you ever feel like it would be better (and certainly easier) to just back away and keep silent? The words of Jesus to Paul are

very similar to the words of Jesus to His disciples when He gave the Great Commission (Matt. 28:19-20). May we always remember that when we are go out to tell others the good news about Jesus Christ that we do not need to be afraid, we do not need to be silent, but we need to keep on speaking, for the Lord is with us! What joy! What comfort! What motivation! – DS


