Can I Buy Your Bible?

Just how many Bibles have been printed since Gutenberg invented the printing press? The number is staggering. Over 5,000,000,000 Bibles have been printed. To appreciate this number, consider that the world's population is fast approaching 7,800,000,000. So, could I buy your Bible?

The stipulation in the purchase would be that you would never again have a Bible—it would in no way ever influence your life again. Let me ask you ask again, how much would you sell your Bible for?

You know the beginning of Psalm 19 states that the heavens declare the glory of God, but it does not stop there. The second half of the psalm shows how, that without a Bible, there is no way anyone the one you have would ever know His will for us.

The Bible is described as being perfect, sure, right, pure, clean, desired, more valuable than the finest gold, sweeter than honey, warning about evil, giving great reward, keeping us from error, understanding error, cleansing us from secret sin and keeping us from presumptuous sin. Before answering my question, read the second half of this psalm to see what you would be losing if you sold me your Bible.

This description of the Bible found in the last half of the psalm does not end with those attributes listed above. It also coverts our souls, brings great wisdom, causes our hearts to rejoice, enlightens our eyes in a world of darkness, teaches us about truth and righteousness, keeps sin from having dominion over us, allows us to stand innocent before God-the list seems endless. So, let me ask again, can I buy your Bible?

What would your world be like without your Bible? Change the positive attributes into negative ones. It would imperfect, no conversion, no surety, no wisdom, no knowledge

of right, no joy, no enlightenment, no association with eternal truth, no understanding of righteousdifference in not ness, no eternal gold, no fine gold, no sweetness, no reward, no knowledge of error, dominated by sin, standing before God with all our guilt. Are you sure and not reading you will sell me your Bible?

> David was a man after God's own heart. He only had access to nine books of the Bible, yet look at how he treasured it. Imagine how he would treasure it if he had the sixty-six books of the Bible you have!

> One final thought. What if there were no Bible in your language? What if you were illiterate and could not read the one you have? Think of what you would never have in your life? Yet, in reality, what is the difference in not having a Bible and never reading the one you have? You can know that God exists by looking at His glorious heaven and earth, but real understanding will never come until you read the Bible you have!

21 Biblical Meditations During Communion (Part 2 of 4)

What is the

having a Bible

Christians are instructed to partake of the Lord's Supper every first day of the week and to remember the Lord's death, discern His body and examine themselves as they partake. The first article in this series examined the importance of doing that; this article will begin to suggest some practical

and Biblical ways to fulfill that joyful experience every week.

I must keep my heart engaged while eating The Bible can be of the bread and drinking of the cup. With so many things to distract me, one easy way to keep my heart my faithful and mind focused the entire time is to read from the resource for Bible. If I bring it with me to worship every Sunday, it can be my faithful resource for meditation and dismeditation and cernment. There are so many different aspects of discernment. Christ's crucifixion on which our minds can focus. So, perhaps we keep a list (like the following) in our Bibles and focus on a different aspect (and read the associated Bible passages) each week. This kind of list could last me for weeks.

- 1. Read and meditate on the pre-creation (i.e., eternal) plan of God to send Christ to die for me (1 Pet. 1:17-21; Rev. 13:8; Gal. 4:4; Eph. 1:4; 2 Tim. 1:9).
- 2. Read and meditate on the prophetic utterances of Isaiah, who foretold of the rejection and suffering of Christ more than 700 years before its cruel fulfillment (Isa. 53).

- 3. Read and meditate on the knowledge that Christ would have had (before ever leaving heaven to come to earth) of the tremendous sufferings that He would endure (Psa. 22).
- 4. Read and meditate on the multiple predictions that Jesus made Himself of the things He would suffer (Matt. 16:21-23; 17:22-23; 20:17-19; Mark 8:31-33; 9:31; 10:33-34; Luke 9:22, 43-44; 18:31-33; John 12:27-33).
 - 5. Read and meditate on the selfless acts of Jesus in the upper room, including His identification of two friends who would hurt Him (Matt. 26:21-25, 31-35; Mark 14:18-21, 27-31; Luke 22:21-23, 31-34; John 13:1-30, 36-38).
- 6. Read and meditate on the anguish of Jesus as He instituted the Lord's Supper, when He told His friends, "This is my body" and "This is my blood" (Matt. 26:26-30; Mark 14:22-26; Luke 22:19-20; 1 Cor. 11:23-30).
- 7. Read and meditate on the prayer-filled sorrow, distress and heart-rending agony of Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane (Matt. 26:36-46; Mark 14:32-42; Luke 22:39-46; John 18:1-2).
- 8. Read and meditate on the intimate betrayal by a friend and being arrested like a violent criminal (Matt. 26:14-16; 47-56; Mark 14:43-50; Luke 22:47-53; John 18:1-11).

Before the Election (Part 1)

There is a lot of debate about what should be happening right now. People are talking about how we should vote. Many in our nation, on both sides, are planning violent actions if the vote doesn't go the way they think it should. With all of the heightened emotions and stress there are some

things that we should remember. We are blessed by the country we live in, no matter your opinion of current events. It isn't perfect, but it could be worse. Throughout time and even in the present there are worse places to be living. Before the election, we need to remember that God is ultimately in control.

Daniel wrote, "It is He who changes the times and the epochs; He removes kings and establishes kings; He gives wisdom to wise men And knowledge to men of understanding" (Dan. 2:21). Daniel would've had reason to be upset with the state of his political climate. Another that might have had reason to be concerned about politics was Paul. He wrote, "Every person is to be in subjection to the governing authorities. For there is no authority except from God, and those which exist are established by God" (Rom. 13:1). Jesus has been given authority (Matt. 28:18). He is head over all things (Eph. 1:20-22; 1 Pet. 3:22). He is King of kings and Lord of lords (1 Tim. 6:15). He is ruler over the kings of the earth (Rev. 1:5).

The question now becomes, do we trust God and His sovereignty? No matter who wins on election day, will you be able to stand with confidence and say in your heart, "I trust God and know that He is in control"? If we can't do that without reservation, then we have lost perspective.

How many times did you plan something and it not work out the way you planned it? How many times did it work out better than how you planned it? Do we still believe "that God causes all things to work together for good to those who love God" (Rom. 8:28)? Do we remember that if God is for us, who can stand against us (Rom. 8:31-34)? Have we forgotten that nothing will separate us from the love of Christ (Rom. 8:35-39)? No

matter what rulers may do, for good or ill, we are in

God's hands! Why would we fret and worry about

something which we have very little control over?

What do we do? Cast your vote. That is your civic duty. However, something more powerful than voting is praying. It may or may not turn out the way we want it. Who are we to tell God how things should go? Daniel and Paul both had reason to be upset and out of sorts due to the politics, but that is not what we see. We see individuals deeply trusting in the sovereignty of God. Before the election I will commit to trust in God no matter what happens. I will pray and, so far as it depends on me, I will live at peace with all men (Rom. 12:18).

When Satan tests you, God will toughen you!

The Christians to whom Peter wrote his first letter were suffering terrible persecution because of the name which they wore (1 Pet. 4:16). Their "adversary, the devil" was truly prowling around, "seeking someone to devour" (5:8). These Christians were urged to "resist" him and remain "firm in your faith" (5:9). But, WHERE IS GOD? Sometimes

when the devil is testing us, we want to know what God is doing? "Why isn't He helping me?!"

Read the next verse. "After you have suffered a little while, the God of all grace" (thank God for His grace!) "will Himself" (not by proxy of someone else) do FOUR things for you (5:10). (1) He will "perfect" you—mending you and making you whole like a fisherman does his nets. (2) He will "establish" or "confirm" you—making you secure in your footing for Him. (3) He will "strengthen" you—emboldening you with greater might to resist Satan's attacks. (4) He will "settle" you—grounding you firmly on the foundation of His love and power.

Where is God? He is working to bring you out stronger than you went in! – DS

Who's rebuking who?

The Lord Jesus was teaching some things "openly" with which Peter was not comfortable (namely, about His suffering, rejection, death and resurrection), and so "Peter took Him aside and began to rebuke Him" (Mark 8:31-32). Can you imagine? Rebuking the Lord because of what He was teaching publicly?

"But when [Jesus] had turned around and looked at His disciples" (no doubt to consider what they needed and the truths they needed to understand), "He rebuked Peter" (8:33). Peter's actions were not acceptable! Jesus told him, "Get behind Me, Satan! For you are not mindful of the things of God, but the things of

men" (8:33). Peter THOUGHT that he was being mindful of the things of God, but Jesus told him it was just the opposite.

Is it possible that you or I might not be comfortable with some of the truths of Jesus? Are we especially uncomfortable if they are taught "openly"? If that is the case, the message of Jesus to us is that we are "not mindful of the things of God, but the things of men." Think about it. -DS




