"There Was a Man Sent From God"

Other than Jesus, can you think of any person in the Bible who would be greater than Enoch, Noah, Abraham, Joseph, Moses, Joshua, Caleb, any of the judges including Samuel, any of the Old Testament prophets and even greater than David, the man after God's own heart? This is not a trick

question. The Bible says there is someone who is greater than any of those righteous men just listed.

Hear the words of Jesus. "Among those born of women there has not risen one greater than John the Baptist" (Matt. 11:11). We may have overlooked the importance of this great man.

John had an immediate and far-reaching person in the Old impact when he began his work. He obviously did not look like those religious leaders among the Jews who

wore special clothing and designed their clothes so that would appear to men to be holier than others (Matt. 23:5). Their prayers were ornate and used as a public display of their pretended righteousness (Matt. 6:5).

What did John look like? Jesus asked the Jews of his day what did they see when they saw John in the wilderness. The Lord said he was not a man clothed in soft garments, for those who wear soft clothing live in the kings' palaces (Matt. 11:8). You know his clothing and his diet. He was clothed in camel's hair with a leather belt and ate locust and wild honey (Matt. 3:4). He did not look like any religious leader of his day, yet look at the impact he had. "Then Jerusalem, all Judea, and all the region around the Jordan went out to him and were baptized of him, confessing their sins" (Matt. 3:5-6).

Some thought John was Elijah who had come returned to the earth, perhaps because his clothing was like that of the prophet (2 Kings 1:8). Some thought he was that Proph-

> et who was to come and be like Moses (Deut. 18:18). Others thought he was the Messiah. John denied that he was any of these (John 1:20-21).

> Who was John and what made him so great? Two Old Testament prophets foretold his coming and described the work he would do which made his so great. That testament ends with a prophecy about his coming before the Messiah, and Isaiah described him

as the voice in the wilderness as the forerunner of the Christ (Mal. 4:5-6; Isa. 40:3-5). Jesus himself said that John was "...more than a prophet" (Matt. 11:9).

What made him so great? Almost all of those holy men of old talked about the coming of the Messiah in various ways. John not only talked about Him, John said He is here-"Behold the Lamb of God" (John 1:29).

By the way, there is someone other than Jesus who is greater than John living on the earth today—read Matt. 11:11.

Each week, the faithful child of God looks forward to that blessed opportunity to commune with the Savior around His table, as he remembers His Lord's death, discerns His Lord's body and examines himself. This series of articles has examined the Biblical importance of doing that properly every Sun-

day and has sought to offer some practical and Biblical ways to fulfill this each week. The last article began a listing of 21 different aspects of Christ's crucifixion upon which our minds can meditate as we partake. Per-We can focus on haps a Christian could focus on one of these (and read the Biblical passages) each week as he communes. We will continue where we left off.

9. Read and meditate on the three trials before Jewish authorities, including the vile treatment that Jesus received from His enemies and the vehement denial He received from a friend (John 18:12-28; Matt. 26:57-27:2; Mark 14:53-15:1; Luke 22:54-23:1).

10. Read and meditate on the three trials before civil authorities, including the false testimony, the contemptuous conduct and the viciously-frenzied mob (Matt. 27:11-25; Mark 15:2-14; Luke 23:2-25; John 18:28-40; 19:6-16).

11. Read and meditate on the merciless, violent, humiliating and unwarranted Roman scourging of Jesus, including the mockery of a crown of thorns (Matt. 27:26-31; Mark 15:15-20; John 19:1-5).

12. Read and meditate on Jesus' agonizing journey to Golgotha, when He was made to bear His own cross, along with two criminals (Matt. 27:32-34; Mark 15:20-23; Luke 23:26 -32; John 19:16-17).

> 13. Read and meditate on the nails being driven into His precious body and the excruciating events of those first three hours on the cross (Matt. 27:35-44; Mark 15:24-32; Luke 23:33-43; John 19:18-27).

14. Read and meditate on the dark and harrowing events of the last three hours on the cross (Matt. 27:45-50; Mark 15:33-37; Luke 23:44-46; John 19:28-30).

15. Read and meditate on the actions and events that took place immediately after His death, including the earth's shuddering response, the spear thrust through His side and His burial among the dead (Matt. 27:51-66; Mark 15:38-47; Luke 23:47-56; John 19:31-42).

There is so much heart-breaking, life-changing detail for our minds to discern as we commune each week. So far we have considered fifteen different aspects of His crucifixion upon which we can meditate. We can focus on a different one each week. More to come in next week's article.

Have we overlooked a man greater than any **Testament?**



Before the Election (Part 2)

So, they debated this week. The only thing that can be certain is that one of them will be president. No matter the outcome of the election, I will continue to trust God. He is still Lord, and He continues to uphold us with His righteous right hand (Isa. 41:10). Before the election we must remem-

ber that our true citizenship is not here.

Paul wrote these words to the church in Philippi, "For our citizenship is in heaven, from which also we eagerly wait for a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ" (Phil. 3:20). This was a city that was a colony of Rome and was a place where Roman soldiers would retire. Being a Roman citizen afforded you certain privileges (Acts 16:38). It was looked favorably upon, especially if you were born a citizen and did

not buy your citizenship. Not everyone was or could be a Roman. For the Lord to emphasize heavenly citizenship over Roman binds us all under a common banner. "So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are fellow citizens with the saints, and are of God's household" (Eph. 2:19). Many of the people that lived in the Roman empire were strangers and aliens to that ruling culture. Even more so, Christians felt as aliens and strangers to every culture as thy were ostracized and looked down upon. Peter mentions this, "Peter, an apostle of Jesus Christ, To those who reside as aliens, scattered throughout Pontus, Galatia, Cappadocia, Asia, and Bithynia, who are chosen according to the foreknowledge of God the Father, by the sanctifying work of the Spirit, to obey Jesus Christ and be sprinkled with His blood: May grace and peace be yours in the fullest measure" (1 Pet. 1:1-2). Again, "Beloved, I urge you as aliens and strangers to abstain from fleshly lusts which wage war against the soul. Keep your behavior excellent among the Gentiles" (1 Pet. 2:11-12a). This world is not our focus.

> We sing the song that says, "This world is not my home, I'm just a passing through." The question is, do we live and think that way? We should beware of becoming so attached to things in this world like parties, flags, documents, or ideals. Those things can render us fruitless and unprepared for the Lord's coming (Luke 8:14; 21:34). We must guard

against the love of this world, including politics. "Do not love the world nor the things in the world. If anyone loves the world, the love of the Father is not in him. For all that is in the world, the lust of the flesh and the lust of the eyes and the boastful pride of life, is not from the Father, but is from the world. The world is passing away, and also its lusts; but the one who does the will of God lives forever" (1 John 2:15-17). We should vote, we can have pride in our country, and it's not wrong to serve our country. However, zeal for my country should never outshine my Love for God and His kingdom.


