God's Final Words in the Old Testament

What more

needed to be

said after 37 of

the 39 OT books

were written?

Thirty-seven of the thirty-nine books of the Old Testament had been written when Zechariah began his work as a prophet. What had God not reveal to His chosen nation? What more needed to be said before the close of that part of the Bible? The answer to these questions emphasizes the importance

of the words of this prophet.

In the final three chapters of Zechariah, God's messenger looks to the future to show the Jews that God had some remarkable actions He would take in the New Testament age. It is obvious that these chapters are Messianic because in them God affirms the deity of Jesus and the fact that He would be pierced. "Then they will look on Me whom they have pierced" (Zech. 12:10). Do not overlook

the importance of the use of the word "Me" in this prophecy. When that soldier pierced the side of Jesus, he likely did not realize he was fulfilling a prophecy made over 500 years earlier about God being pierced, but John quotes Zechariah's words as being fulfilled by that action (John 19:34, 37).

This same verse in Zechariah speaks of Pentecost. "I will pour on the house of David and on the inhabitants of Jerusalem the Spirit of grace and supplication." Joel is not the only OT prophet who foretold the outpouring of the Spirit.

In chapter thirteen, the Messianic aspect of God's final words to the Jews is seen even more clearly. "In that day a fountain shall be opened for the house of David and for the inhabitants of Jerusalem, for sin and for uncleanness" (Zech. 13:1). One cannot read the New Testament without knowing who that Fountain is. Peter said, "You were not redeemed with corruptible things...but with the precious blood of Christ" (1 Pet. 1:18-19). The last book of the New Testament describes

those who had washed their robes white and made them clean in the blood of the Lamb (Rev. 7:15). Before God closed the Old Testament, He wanted the Jews to know that someday full redemption would come from the Fountain opened in Jerusalem.

God was just about finished with the writing of the Old Testament prophets. When the final two books were finished, God would stop sending proph-

ets to the Jews for the next 400+ years! For two thousand years that had been prophets, but when Zechariah penned his words all OT prophecy was about to end. Yet, God wanted them to know that the time would come when there would be New Testament prophets to reveal His plan for all mankind. The remarkable thing is that even as He foretold the coming of more prophets, He foretold there would be a day when, having finished their works, there would be no more prophets. "It shall be in that day...! will also cause the prophets ...to depart from the land" (Zech. 13:2). More about this next week.

Three Ways Thanksgiving Should "Pay"

Do you have much for which to be thankful? Sometimes in moments of despair and distress, it is hard to keep our minds focused on the positive and the copious reasons that we have to be optimistic and thankful persons. Perhaps a look at a passage in Luke 17 can help us to be reminded

of some simple steps we can take to be more thankful.

If you were a leper in the first century and someone healed you wholly and instantly, would you be thankful? There's no better word to describe the emotions that would flood your soul! Do you know what is even better than being healed of the horrible physical malady of leprosy? Being healed of the deadly spiritual malady of sin! The question for us is—do we respond like the nine unthankful lepers or like the one thankful leper in Luke 17?

In Luke 17, all ten lepers wanted the same thing of Jesus—"Have mercy on us!" (17:13). All ten lepers obeyed what Jesus told them to do—"Go, show yourselves to the priests" (17:14). All ten lepers received the same wonderful gift—they were "cleansed" (17:14). But, were all ten lepers thankful? One would think so, but the evidence is not there, because the response of thankfulness was not forthcoming. Except from "one of them" (17:15). What are three things that

we can do, which this one thankful leper did, to be more thankful and to express our thankfulness to our Savior? Look at verses 15 and 16.

First, pay attention. The leper "saw that he was healed." The other lepers were apparently too busy and too selfish. Let us not become so busy with life and so selfish in our own desires that we forget to pay attention and intentionally notice each and every way that the Lord blesses us.

Do we respond like the nine unthankful lepers or like the one thankful leper? Second, pay a visit. The leper "returned" to Jesus. Sometimes we might be like the nine lepers—we probably notice the blessings but don't "return" to the Lord, from whom all blessings come, to acknowledge (at the very least) the fountain of all of these blessings. Let us spend more time with the Lord, and make sure that time is filled with thanking and not just asking.

Third, pay homage. The leper "with a loud voice glorified God, and fell down on his face at His feet, giving Him thanks." Three things jump out: (1) he paid homage with a loud voice, (2) he paid homage with great humility, and (3) he paid homage over and over (as the present tense verbs emphasize). Let us seek to also overflow with exuberant praise to the one who overflows us with blessings.

Do you have much for which to be thankful? Even in times of despair and distress, let us turn back to our Savior!



The Privilege of Prayer

Prayer is a resource and an honor that not all enjoy. Through the power of prayer, we can receive forgiveness from God, boldness from God, peace from God, opportunity from God, strength from God, healing from God, wisdom from God, and tranquility By Josh Blackmer from God. For those that do not have the

privilege of prayer, their prayers will be an abomination to God. Their prayers will fall on deaf ears. Their prayers will be hindered. Their prayers will not be answered favorably. We might be praying people, even pray fervently; but do we have the right to pray, to expect God to heed us when we pray?

God will not hear the prayers of those that will not heed His word. Those who turn their ears from the law, their prayers are an abomination (Prov.

28:9). Such is the case of those who will not endure sound doctrine (2 Tim. 4:3-4). God will not hear the prayers of those whose sins separate them from Him. Sins can separate one from God so He will not hear (Isa. 59:1-2). Such is the condition of those who will not seek God's forgiveness (Rom. 6:23). God will not hear the prayers of those that treat others unjustly. Those who fail to consider the poor (Psa. 41:1-3). Those who fail to treat their wives as they should (1 Pet. 3:7). Those who fail to make things right with those they have offended (Matt. 5:23-24) Those who fail to forgive those who sinned against them (Matt. 18:21-35). God will not hear the prayers of those that pray without faith. Without faith it is impossible to please God (Heb. 11:6). Those asking with doubt in their hearts ensures failure (Jas. 1:5-8).

The privilege of prayer is not for everyone. It is afforded to those whose hearts are in the right condition. God hears the prayers of the sinner seeking truth and righteousness. This is what we learn from the example of Cornelius. He was a good

> man, but still in need of salvation (Acts 10:1-2; 11:14). His prayers and alms had been noticed by God (Acts 10:4,31). God saw to it that he had an opportunity to hear the words whereby he could be saved (Acts 11:14). God heard the prayer of a sinner like Cornelius because he was hungering and thirsting for righteousness (Mat. 5:6). He was asking, seeking, and knocking (Mat 7:7-8). God hears the

prayers of those that have Jesus as their high priest. He is now a merciful and faithful high priest, able to aid His brethren (Heb. 2:17-18). He makes it possible to approach God's throne boldly (Heb. 4: 14-16) He is able to save to the uttermost, since He ever lives to intercede (Heb. 7:25). Jesus has now become our Advocate and Mediator. Our advocate with the Father (1 Jn 2:1. He is the one mediator between God and man (1 Tim. 2:5). He makes intercession for us at the right hand of God (Rom. 8:34). What a privilege to carry everything to God in prayer.

"Leaving the elementary principles of Christ"

Where are you? A human being must start with the easy food and gradually progress to the more complex, but a human being NEVER reaches a point where he can survive without regular food intake. The same applies to Christians. A babe in Christ must start with the easy parts of the Bible and gradually progress to the more complex, but a Christian cannot survive only on the milk (Heb. 5:12-6:6) and a Christian NEVER reaches a point where he can survive without regular Word intake. Where are you? Are you feasting? Are you growing? Are you progressing? "Let us press on to maturity" (6:1)! - DS

The ravens will pick it out

There are some Bible verses that just grab you when you read them and almost shake you up. Proverbs 30:17 is one such verse. "The eye that mocks his father, and scorns obedience to his mother, the ravens of the valley will pick it out, and the young eagles will eat it." Whoa!

> Why would God put something so graphic in the Bible? Because God is serious about children obeying their parents! Read the rest of Proverbs. "My son, keep your father's command, and do not forsake the law of your mother... Listen to your father who begot you, and do not despise your mother when she is old... A wise

son makes a glad father, but a foolish son is the grief of his mother" (6:20; 23:22; 10:1). It is the responsibility of children to obey and honor their parents! It is the responsibility of parents to train and discipline their children to do so! (Read about the rod of correction in Proverbs 13:24; 15:5, 10; 22:15; 23:13, 14; 29:15, 17.)

The home is the training ground for one's relationship with the Father in heaven! One's behavior toward his parents will be reflected in his behavior toward God. - DS




